Tokyo Is Bombed Again

PEARL HARBOR—The Japanese capital has been slapped in the face again. The Japanese radio admits that again B-29 fortresses have attacked the city, but adds that only four of the huge planes were spotted overhead. The attack is said to have been carried out at 3:30 this morning, Japanese time. A single B-29 is said to have dropped bombs about two-andone-half hours later. Other superfortresses have been reported over Osaka and Kobe on the east coast of Honshu Isah, that is the main island of the Japanese homeland.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 15 (P)-An inquest into the death Wednesday night of a man and a woman at Yale, described by police as murder and suicide, was adjurned until Saturday after it was learned that the woman's 13-year-old son had witnessed the shooting.

The bodies of Mrs. Margaret Leighton and Clarence Kokulniak, both middle aged, were found in the woman's home, and police believe the man shot the woman to death, then ended his own life by suicide.

The woman's son, Francis Leighton, witnessed the shooting, police said. Her husband also lives at Yale.



Down in Wiltshire, at the historic Manton racing stable, there lives a chestnut colt that exemplifies patience and good manners. So far as the colt, Court Martial, knows life is mainly a round of eating, growing and being groomed. But the two-year-old, who stands 15 hands, 21/2 inches, has had an ambitious future mapped out by his wowner, Lord Astor. He will be entered in the 1945 Derby, St. Leger and 2,000 Guineas, three of Britain's five yearly classics, in the strong hope he will break Lord Astor's string of non-successes in important races. So far, Court Martial has run only twice. Each time he won without being pressed. He didn't see a racecourse until last August and then won by two lengths from 10 opponents, despite his amateurish touch of staring about as he ran.

In his second race a month later he was bumped on the stretch and nearly fell, but recovered enough to win by half a length. Now, in the winter books, he is quoted at 7-1 for the Guineas and 8-1 for the Joe Lawson, veteran trainer who has turned out nine classic winners, admits that stamina in Court Martial is a question mark. "His sire, Fair Trial, has yet to produce a strayer, and the dam, Instantaneous, hasn't produced a firstclass strayer either," said Lawson. "But there are always the exceptions to the rule."
