## LOCAL RED CROSS CAMPAIGN AWAY OVER OBJECTIVE

### Sofia Is Bomb Hit

**Cutting of Railway Line Affects Nazi War Machine in South-east Europe**  
NAPLES, March 16 (CP)—Royal Air Force bombers attacked in force the railway yards of Sofia capital of Bulgaria, and the important railway line connecting that centre with Belgrade, the Yugoslav capital, is believed to have been severed by bombs. Sofia is doubly important to the Nazi war machine now that the Red Army has cut communications to the north.

### SESSION IS PROROGUED

Legislature Concludes at Victoria After Putting Through Many Bills.

VICTORIA, March 16 (CP)—The session of the Legislature was prorogued yesterday. Among the bills approved was an Act extending to merchant seamen serving in the war zones the same exemption on land and municipal taxes and remission of succession duties as previously given to members of the armed services. The House also adopted an amendment to the Marriage Act authorizing the presumption of death after seven years absence of a spouse and permitting remarriage.

### Local Soldier Listed as Dead

The latest Canadian Army casualty list records Gunner John Campbell, Royal Canadian Artillery, as having died on active service. His wife, Mrs. Bernice Frances Campbell, resides on Fraser Street, Prince Rupert.

### Cassino Is Wiped Out

**Lists Being Kept Open For Another Two Weeks Although Drive is Actually Over.**  
The annual Red Cross campaign in Prince Rupert came officially to a close last night with the total subscriptions to that time showing \$15,652.21 or an over-subscription of some 50 per cent above the local objective of \$10,500. The subscription lists are being kept open for another two weeks and, by the time all donations have been accounted for, it is anticipated that the total may reach \$17,000. Local Red Cross officials are well pleased with the success of the campaign which was, of course, due to the excellent response of the public to the appeal.

### Doukhobors Demonstrate

No Violence or Disrobing, However, in Protest Gathering at Brilliant.

BRILLIANT, March 16 (CP) — The fanatic Sons of Freedom Doukhobors staged a demonstration at Brilliant on Wednesday but there was no violence or disrobing. The radicals charged and made speeches apparently in resumption of protests against call-up regulations.

### BUILD NEW PULP PLANT

VANCOUVER, March 16. — As part of their big construction program, which in the past three years has involved the expenditure of approximately \$500,000, Pacific Mills Limited, of Ocean Falls, have let a general contract for the erection of a new \$40,000 bleaching plant to be built in Vancouver. An equal sum has been allotted for the installation of equipment.

### SHOT DOWN OWN PLANES

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 16.—Secretary of War H. L. Stimson admitted today that there had been cases of where American gunners had shot down their own planes in "fury and confusion" of night operations, mistaking them for enemy aircraft.

### Thousands Of Teachers Are Canada's Need

OTTAWA, March 16 — Miss Trux of Montreal, president of the Canadian Teachers' Federation, told the reconstruction committee of Parliament yesterday that Canada was short 17,000 teachers now and that, after the war, 7,000 more teachers would be required for adult education.

## Nazis Endeavoring To Reach Evacuation Ports Of Nikolaev and Odessa

MOSCOW, March 16 (CP) — The whole central section of the German front in South Russia appears to be in a state of collapse as the Ukrainian army drives relentlessly toward Rumania and advance Russian units reach positions less than one hundred miles from the frontier. The Germans are falling back in confusion on Nikolaev and Odessa evacuation ports.

### CAMPAIGN CONTINUES

Second Anti-V.D. Public Meeting Held Last Night  
Members of the Parent-Teachers' Association, who had been scheduled to meet separately last night, joined with the senior high school students and the general public to fill the Navy Drill Hall at the second big anti-venereal disease public meeting sponsored by the anti-venereal disease committee of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Union Board of Health.

### BIG RAIDS IN PACIFIC

Wewak Principal Objective of Allied Bombing in South Pacific Area  
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC, March 16. (CP) — The Allies today announced raids in which almost five hundred tons of bombs were dropped on Japanese positions in Wewak, New Guinea, to Bougainville Island in the Solomons.

The heaviest hit target was Wewak, Japan's big air centre and supply base on the north New Guinea coast.

### BOUGAINVILLE FIGHT

WASHINGTON — The island of Bougainville has been the scene of the fiercest fighting so far in the Pacific war. American troops have killed more than 1200 Japs in sharp fighting in their latest beach occupation, repulsing a determined Jap counter attack yesterday.

**URGED TO QUIT**  
WASHINGTON — Finland has again been urged to get out of the war. Today President Roosevelt in a message to the Finns urged them to terminate their "hateful partnership with Germany."

**TRUK BOMBED**  
SOUTH PACIFIC HEADQUARTERS — American Army Liberator bombers attacked the Jap base at Truk on Wednesday. They dropped bombs on gun emplacements, oil storage tanks, naval installations on two islands of the group.

**FIGHT IN CASSINO**  
FIFTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS — The Allied Fifth Army is locked in bitter hand-to-hand combat with the Germans in the ruins of Cassino. Yesterday the Allies bombed the city where the Germans were fighting from house to house, and today, the enemy is still resisting stubbornly among the ruins.

**CLOSE COAL MINES**  
EDMONTON — Coal mine operators in this district say they will have to close down mines if the government discontinues the 50c per ton bonus.

### Fire Goes To Firemen

An instance of the mountain coming to Mohamet occurred last night when city firemen, instead of going to a fire, had a fire come to them.

**MINE SWEEP'S RESCUE**  
OTTAWA — The Navy Department reveals how the minesweeper Goderich, commanded by Lieut. Commander R. H. Kenny, more than a year ago, rescued 44 men who had drifted three days after a tanker was torpedoed. Eleven men were lost.

**HOSPITAL SHIP ARRIVES**  
LONDON — The Netherlands hospital ship Orange, formerly a passenger liner, has arrived in Britain with wounded from Italy. The vessel's capacity is seven hundred passengers.

**FREE TIME ON AIR**  
OTTAWA — Under new policy of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, as disclosed at a session of Parliamentary radio committee yesterday, free time on the air will be given the Liberal, Progressive and C.C.F. parties. The Liberals will get two hours and 34 minutes per year and the other parties one hour and 28 minutes. National Democracy and Bloc Populaire, not fulfilling requirements, do not get time. The board of governors recommend a full time chairman at \$15,000 a year and a general manager at \$15,000.

### Record Weight of Bombs Dropped on Stuttgart In Great Attack Last Night

LONDON, March 16 (CP) — A huge force of Royal Air Force bombers and fighters, which included many Canadian bombers, struck at the Germans last night, dropping a probable record weight of destruction—more than three thousand long tons of bombs—mainly on Stuttgart. More Royal Canadian Air Force bombers than ever took part in the assault.

### Goyette Elects Speedy Trial

Before Judge W. E. Fisher in county court Leo Goyette, charged with robbery with violence, elected to have a speedy trial when he appeared for election yesterday. The trial was set to begin at 10:30 Friday morning.

Also up for election, George Dewey Fales, charged with theft chose to be tried by judge and jury, which means that he will appear in Assize court, possibly at the next session. He will make application for bail Friday morning.

Election was reserved until March 24 in the case of Gunner John Monick, charged with uttering a forged document.

Dissolution of Japan . . .

In estimating the probable effect of defeat on the temper and morale of the Japanese people, one does well to bear in mind two sets of considerations peculiar to Japan among the Axis Powers. The first is the continued presence throughout the country, hidden in the shadows but still potentially influential, of statesmen, politicians and leaders in the business and professional worlds who are experienced in the arts of government and leadership and who have opposed, and still abhor, the Army's control of their country's destinies.

The second consideration is the extent to which Japanese public opinion has for years been misled and bamboozled by military and reactionary propaganda. Great as has been the fooling of the Germans by the Nazis, it falls short of the fooling of the Japanese by their Army.

To disillusion the Japs, first and foremost, of course, is the administration to the armed forces of Japan of a series of defeats so decisive that their true nature and import can no longer be hidden from the Japanese people.

ACTIVITIES OF Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A.

I have in my possession a booklet brought out in commemoration of eighty years of Y.W.C.A. work in Great Britain from 1855 until 1935. It is most interesting and I think the pages dealing with the War Services of the Y.W.C.A. during the last war especially so.

"During the Great War the British Y.W.C.A. was able to perform two services: (a) During the first weeks to help the women and girls of other nationalities who were caught helpless by the outbreak of hostilities.

"Then the rush of Belgian refugees into this country (Great Britain) began. Large numbers were accommodated by the government at Earl's Court, where Y.W.C.A. was immediately opened and continued to flourish until the Armistice, when the camp was closed and the girls returned to Belgium.

"Another activity was the running of clubs in the neighborhood of the military training camps, where girls, excited as they were by the sight of so many uniforms, could bring their soldier friends. These clubs proved a great boon to both men and girls during those first restless and anxious months.

"Here we have the germ of the present war hostess house don't you think? More tomorrow."

V.D. TALK TO GYROS

Veneral Disease Has Most Tragical Results, Commercialized Prostitution Principal Source.

"Nothing results in more downright poverty, misery and expense than venereal disease. It fills the poor houses and hospitals. It is a problem that is not to be viewed in any light-hearted manner."

So declared Lieut.-Col. F. E. Coy, commanding officer of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps for this area, in speaking before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday, his address being appropriate to the current Social Hygiene Week campaign.

There had been 35,000 cases of venereal disease in the three armed services, Dr. Coy said, and the cost of treatment had been \$8,000,000. Venereal disease was no more extensive in the men of the services than in civilians, only the situation among the latter was not made public.

The army approached the venereal disease problem from two angles—social and personal.

It had been established that the principal source of infection of venereal disease was through commercialized prostitution, Col. Coy said. As a result of the efforts of Lieut. Col. D. H. Williams, all "red light" districts in Pacific Command had been closed. Today in Pacific Command the incidence of venereal disease in men of the services was only one out of 76, whereas in Montreal it was one out of sixteen.

Ninety-five per cent of prostitutes were affected with gonorrhoea or syphilis. The talk of the safety of a "red light" district with regular inspection of prostitutes was nonsense. No self-respecting doctor would ever give a certificate to a prostitute as being free from venereal disease. Commercialized prostitution had many ramifications and there were sometimes difficulties in combatting it owing to so many people making money out of it one way or another.

"Take the profit out of prostitution and you will go a long way towards controlling venereal disease," Col. Coy agreed.

As for the amateur prostitute, pressure had been brought to bear to keep unescorted women out of dance halls and beer parlors. The results of "pick-ups" in Vancouver dance halls had been appalling.

Col. Coy proceeded to tell of the army's personal approach in

the fight against venereal disease. The padre, talked to the boys in order to develop a higher standard of mortality. Medical officers gave lectures and showed films to impress the horrors of venereal disease. However, not too much faith was placed in the effectiveness of these personal efforts so there was a follow-up with early preventative treatment.

An interesting disclosure by Col. Coy during a discussion period following the address was that in Prince Rupert area there had been only two cases of syphilis and four cases of gonorrhoea per thousand men in the last six months which was an excellent record compared with other places.

Col. Coy was introduced by William Cruickshank, an old personal friend. President Frank Skinner was in the chair and there was a good attendance of Gyro members.

The Gyro Club decided to be represented by two delegates—to be named by the President—at the 1944 civic centre carnival organizing meeting to be held March 23.

At a meeting of the Boilermakers' Union the action of a local concern in displaying a notice that no Asiatic help was employed was condemned. It was felt that this was an illustration of race prejudice which was contrary to the principles for which the Allies were fighting today.

Major B. B. Moscovich of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps was the speaker today at the regular weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club. His address was appropriate to the Social Hygiene Week campaign which is now going on. President A. S. Nickerson was in the chair and there was a good attendance of members with a few guests.

The sense of the last clause of a letter from George Oakley referring to the suggestion that Indians be barred from the proposed swimming pool in Prince Rupert was marred by omission of a couple of words. The clause was "To discriminate against an entire racial group is not only showing a lack of faith in democratic institutions but also a resort to methods practised by enemies of this country." The words left out were "enemies of."

Lieut. Beatrice Berner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Al Berner, overseas as a nursing sister with the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, is now in Italy.

A short circuit in a fire alarm siren situated on the roof of the armories, on Sixth Avenue West, caused the siren to wail for several minutes at 7:30 this morning. The noise served as an alarm clock for residents of the central part of town.

Charged separately with public intoxication, Jack More, and Andrew Kowalchuk, were each fined \$25, or seven days by Magistrate W. D. Vance in city police court this morning.
