# Red Army Drives On Odessa

## German Armies Folding Up in Western Europe

Soviet Forces Sweeping Through Poland and Rumania to Objectives of Utmost Importance.

LONDON, March 29 (CP) — The Ukrainian Army, pushing across the steppes from captured Nikolayev toward Odessa on the Black Sea, has now smashed through the crumbling secondary defences of Odessa, only 60 miles away. Capture of Nikolaev, former Soviet Black Sea fleet base, took place yesterday. The Russians are advancing upon Odessa along a 175-mile front. To the west in Bessarabia the Ukrainian Army is within eight miles of the Odessa-Tiraspol-Isai railroad, principal escape artery from the port.

JAP MILITARY SHAKE-UP TOKYO—Four top Japanese generals are involved in another shake-up of the Japanese high command.

BOMBS ON NEW GUINEA ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC—Allied bombers raked New Guinea coast, including Wewak and Hansa Bay, yesterday with 158 tons of missiles in the twelfth straight day of attack.

HEAVY NAZI LOSSES LONDON — General James Doolittle said yesterday that 2100 German planes have been destroyed since February 1 and Allied planes have dropped 20,000 tons of bombs on targets in Germany and 11,000 tons in occupied countries.

## Confusion Over Leaving Train

Elderly and Ill Woman Had Unpleasant Experience at Hazelton.

SOUTH HAZELTON, March 29 — Much conflict is constantly occurring in regard to the point of debarkation of passengers bound for Hazelton. During the past week two passengers suffered great inconvenience by being put off the passenger trains at Hazelton station which necessitates a ten-mile trip by road around by New Hazelton as the bridge between Hazelton station and the town has been out for years.

One, an elderly woman in instant need of medical attention, disembarked from the train at 5 o'clock on a cold morning to find a fireless station. Fortunately Scotty McRae came to the rescue and rushed her to the hospital. A bus service meets all trains at New Hazelton and passengers bound for Hazelton should leave the train at that point.

## Trail Wins Over Regina

REGINA, March 29 — Trail defeated Regina seven to two last night in the Memorial Cup junior hockey playdowns. Regina now leads two wins to one in the best of seven series.

LONDON — Mrs. K. Somerville is said to be London's champion house-to-house collector for the Red Cross penny-a-week fund. In two years, Mrs. Somerville has collected the equivalent of \$15,000.

## 2500 RATION BOOKS ISSUED TUESDAY

City Hall and Parish Hall at Seal Cove Are Meccas.

More than 2500 people called at Prince Rupert's two ration book distribution centres Tuesday afternoon and evening to pick up their new No. 4 ration books. The city hall centre recorded the distribution of 2106 books during both sessions and the Seal Cove centre at St. Peter's parish hall gave out 463. Yesterday's total for both centres was 2574 books.

In the afternoon the city hall centre, which is in charge of Mrs. Doris Teng, issued 1716 ration books and in the evening 390 books were given out. The Seal Cove distributing centre, under Mrs. J. E. Boddie, issued 350 ration books in the afternoon, 118 in the evening.

## BIG YEAR FOR C.N.R.

Another Sharp Increase Recorded Over Record-Breaking Figures of 1943

OTTAWA, March 29 — Canadian National Railways operations so far in 1944 have recorded a sharp increase over record-breaking 1943 figures, R. C. Vaughan, president of the railway, said Tuesday in presenting the 1943 annual report to the railway committee of the House of Commons.

## Recommendation On Waterfront Water Hook-up

The recommendation of a special committee of the city council on the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative water connection on the waterfront was that the cost of the installation be borne by the applicants and the work be done under supervision of the city engineer, that the city be responsible for maintenance, that the city install the necessary fire hydrant, that if later connections are made by others the original applicant be reimbursed proportionately and that in future all such applications for water extensions from mains be submitted to the utilities committee.

During discussion, the view was expressed that this was an exceptional case since the fishing fleet would benefit from the water that would be made available to the new Co-operative premises. Ald. George Hills inquired if it was to be the city policy not to assist industry by concessions, particularly in the war rehabilitation period.

The recommendation was adopted with Ald. Hills and Ald. G. W. Rudderham dissenting.

## Wrens Man Lone Coastal Posts

LONDON, March 29 — Hardy British Wrens man storm-swept emergency landing fields around the coastline of Britain. These tiny green patches in isolated districts often look like heaven to Allied bomber pilots driven off their courses after a raid on Germany.

About two dozen girls of the Fleet Air Arm usually live in bleak wooden huts on these fields. Most of their work is secret. Some of them do the "plotting" work that enables rescue crews to locate both planes and ships in distress.

When there is flying in the district the girls must always be ready at their posts in a crash-lander which puts out to find a plane that has been forced down. One girl of this crew always wears an asbestos suit, in preparation for any needed fire-fighting. There's always a Wren on duty in a spotting chair checking all aircraft that pass the base.

## Challenge Taken Up

Prime Minister Churchill Not Accepting Parliament Reverse on Minor Issue

LONDON, March 29 — Prime Minister Winston Churchill today took up a challenge posed by a one-vote defeat of government policy yesterday and demanded a vote of confidence in the government.

It was last night that Mr. Churchill's government suffered its first defeat in the House of Commons since its formation but, since the issue was not pressed as a vote of government in the government, it did not require resignation. The defeat of the administration was received when it sought to reject an amendment to the Education bill to provide an equal pay scale for men and women teachers. It caused a sensation at Westminster.

## Men at Kiska Exempt From Income Tax

OTTAWA, March 29 — Canadians who served at Kiska in the Aleutians will not be liable for income tax, it was announced yesterday.

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## Women Scientists Aloft With R.A.F.

Form One-sixth of Large Body of Research Group

LONDON, March 29 — Women workers form one-sixth of the large body of scientists which is the research group attached to bomber, fighter and coastal commands of the R.A.F. as well as to the Admiralty and the War Office.

Their work includes tests, observation and research problems connected with tanks, guns, aircraft, explosives, radio and radio-location. If the problems they are tackling can be solved only by flying in operational aircraft, then they are taken on flights. Women have accompanied bomber and coastal reconnaissance craft to study the operation of radio installations for the detection of u-boats as well as to make ballistic tests.

## Will Build Many Homes

OTTAWA, March 29 — Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King tabled in the House of Commons yesterday a report recommending the construction of 606,000 houses in Canada in the postwar period.

## Attack on Bristol

Attack Makes Its Heaviest in Two Years on Great Town

LONDON, March 29 — The Luftwaffe made one of its heaviest attacks in two years on Bristol today. The attack was concentrated on the west coast town where casualties and damage were heavy. It identified the town as Bristol but this was not definitely confirmed here.

## BOMBS FOR LUFTWAFFE

LONDON, March 29 — American bombers hit central Germany today and other Allied bombers pounded the Pas de Calais coast area of France in a campaign described officially as "aimed primarily against the Luftwaffe on the ground and in the air."

Yesterday American bombers were claimed to have destroyed 300 German planes in the air and on the ground.

## TRIAL IS ADJOURNED

Preliminary Hearing of Indian, Charged With Murdering Trappers at Finlay Forks, Deferred.

PRINCE GEORGE, March 29 — Preliminary hearing of Alex Prince, Fort St. James Indian, on charges of murdering two trappers in the country north of here, was adjourned Tuesday for eight days pending appointment of counsel.

## Headway of One Column

But Otherwise Japanese Are Being Held Back in the Indian Campaign

NEW DELHI, March 29 — One Japanese column has advanced to within twelve miles of Imphal, capital of Manipur Province in India, but it is the only one that has made any progress. Fierce battling continues in all sectors of the new front in India.

**The Nutrition Campaign . . .**

Until the beginning of the present war Canadians displayed little interest in nutrition. However, when figures were released revealing the fact that about 40 per cent. of the men volunteering for military service were rejected because they were below the health standard there was a sudden awakening. It was found that a great many of these rejections were not due to any physical disability but to poor health which could have been prevented by good eating habits.

At the same time a survey disclosed that every day 200,000 Canadians are sick. In 1941 the Department of Pensions and National Health set up a branch called Nutrition Services to improve the nutrition in Canadian homes.

To undertake the program a Provincial Nutrition committee was set up in each province under the provincial departments of health. Each committee was provided with a paid nutritionist. Miss Mary Baldwin is the nutritionist for British Columbia. The air of the Provincial Nutrition committee is to establish a local committee in every city and town in the province. The local committee will endeavour to educate the citizens to choose and eat the foods necessary for good health.

The Department of Education in Victoria is also interested in the matter. Last year a survey of the school lunch situation was undertaken by each inspector of schools in the province. In many areas hot school lunches were introduced for the first time. This year the work is again being emphasized, paralleling the work being done by nutrition committees.

**Importance of Vitamins . . .**

When Junior arrives home from school and yells: "Hey, Mom, I'm hungry!" you know at once what to do about it. Junior has "hollow hunger" and to remedy the situation all you need to do is fill him up.

But when Junior comes home irritable, listless and over-tired, you have a much more serious problem. This is known as "hidden hunger" and is not so easily recognized. But it is more important than "hollow hunger."

"Hidden hunger" means a lack of foodstuffs which the body needs for building strong bones and teeth, for maintaining a supply of rich blood, for steady nerves, and for that alert, wide-awake feeling.

A survey taken recently of the foods eaten by Prince Rupert school children indicates that many of them must be suffering from "hidden hunger." Other surveys show that the same condition exists all over Canada.

What is the cause of "hidden hunger"? Nutritionists say simply this: lack of sufficient vitamins and minerals in the diet. And by knowing the foods that contain vitamins and minerals in the largest quantities we are ready to tackle the problem.

The most commonly deficient vitamins are A, B, B2, C, and D, and the minerals calcium and iron.

Milk and cheese are excellent sources of calcium and vitamins A, B1 and B2. Milk is a good source of iron. Citrus fruits have a high content of vitamin C, and the whole grain cereals are a good source of vitamin B1.

By serving these foods every day in liberal amounts food scientists say there would be happier, healthier and better-looking families.

**ACTIVITIES OF Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A.**

The people I met! And the things I did yesterday! You'd never believe it! First of all there was Lieutenant B. H. Langdon, who is executive officer to the Navy show which is in town. Don Adams brought him up to the "Y" in the morning—he would do just that when Mrs. Woodside and I were smothered in paint and looked like we had been dragged through a mangle backwards. However, for lack of outward charm, we summoned all the poise we had in stock and hope we got away with it. Lieut. Langdon is a Londoner but has been in this country for six or seven years. While in London he was manager for the huge cinema palace-cum-variety hall, the Trocadero, at the Elephant and Castle. Now the Elephant and Castle is a big bus, tram and underground centre which takes its name from a very well known public house (pub) on that spot. The Trocadero is one of, if not the, largest movie house in London and, besides holding over five thousand persons, it has a magnificent organ for English people are passionately fond of organ music. Here at this organ Quentín MacLean, B.C. organist and incidentally, cousin to Lieut. Langdon, gives regular

recitals of popular and classical music. Very often too, the children's morning shows were broadcast and it was a treat to hear the hundreds of children's voices singing all the popular songs with great gusto and remarkably good tune for the Londoner is born to song. But all this gets me away from Lieutenant Langdon who is a most personable gentleman with very blue English eyes and—but here, this is getting out of hand. A little later in the day I met Lieutenant Eric Wilde who is the musical director for the entire show. Eric is a Toronto boy but took his Bachelor of Music degree at the University of Michigan. Just before the war he spent four years working with the B.B.C. television department. I remember that just before I left some neighbors bought a television set and so proud were they of it that they never again drew their lounge curtains, but left it to the full view of all the neighbors. I confess to having taken the odd peek at it myself—the newsreels were the most interesting part of it). Returning to Canada Lieutenant Wilde was musical director for the Allan Young-Buckingham and Wristley shows over the C.B.C. as well as doing what he called "sustaining programs." These, he explained, are the non-commercial programs, those with no sponsors. Talking about his twenty-eight piece orchestra he grew most enthusiastic, saying that New York critics had told him it was the best pit orchestra they had ever heard. The orchestra is composed mostly of professional musicians and is adapted to all types of music. The drummer, C.P.O. Harry Nicholson, has had vast experience and is an exceptional man in his line. Then there is the oboe player, C.P.O. Goodman, who was with the C.B.C. for a number of years on the Percy Faith programs. Both of these boys are Torontonians. The concert master is Petty Officer Joe Sera from Winnipeg—good old Winnipeg. He is a violin artist of remarkable talent and he too was in radio work in the C.B.C. studios—so you see this Navy show, called "Meet the Navy," is of a very high grade. Each performer has been selected for merit and experience and that they have to offer is nothing but the best. I do hope arrangements may be made so that everyone in Prince Rupert, and I do mean everyone, will be given the opportunity to "Meet the Navy."

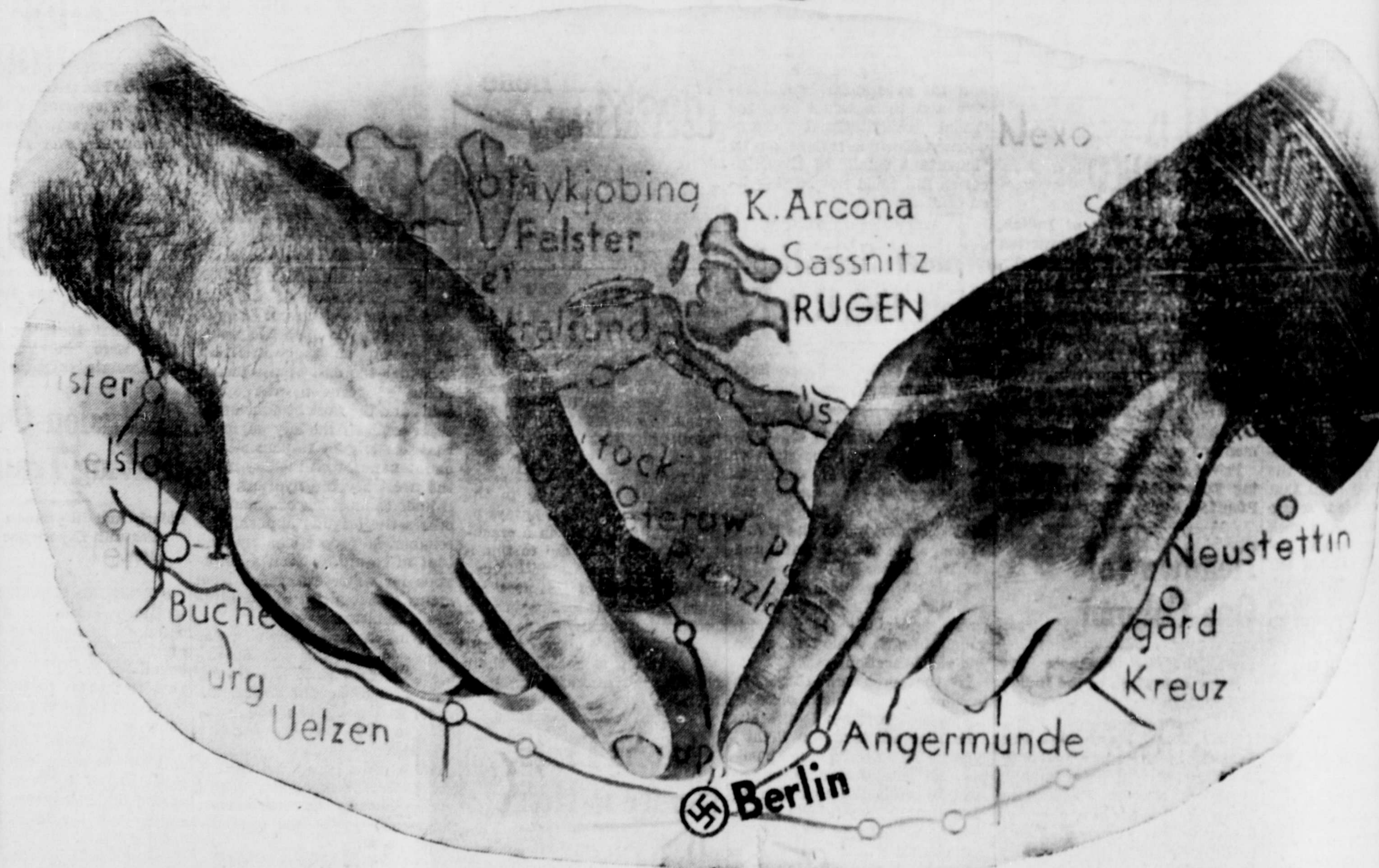
