Messerschmidt Plant Is Heavily Hit

Plane Manufacturing City of Brunswick Is Buried In Bomb Debris

Royal Air Force Throwing Full Weight Into Pre-Invasion Assault—Thirty-eight Planes missing.

LONDON, Jan. 15 (CP) — The Royal Air Force threw its full weight last night into the pre-invasion campaign to exterminate the German Air Force, burying the central German city of Brunswick, site of the great Messerschmidt plant, under a heavy load of explosives as an afterstroke to the American daylight attack on Tuesday when heavy bombers fought one of the greatest air battles of the war. The heavy Royal Air Force bombers dropped two thousand tons of bombs on the plane manufacturing city in what the Air Ministry termed a "very heavy attack."

This and other operations cost thirty-eight aircraft, seven of them being Canadian. Great fires were left burning and, while the main force was over Brunswick, the Mosquitoes returned again to attack Berlin while other planes bombed Magdeburg, southwest of Berlin, and targets in Northern France.

Russians Drive On

Plunging Deep Into Heart of Priepet Marshes Towards Pinsk.

MOSCOW, Jan. 15 (CP) — The Red Army surged deep into the heart of the frozen Priepet Marshes today toward the industrial city of Pinsk, ninety-five miles to the west, following the capture of the neighboring cities of Mozyr and Kalinkovichi.

Soviet forces already have plunged to Skrigalov, twenty miles beyond Mozyr, on the south bank of the Priepet River. The fall of Mozyr was announced yesterday. The Russians have not confirmed a Berlin report that Red forces have launched a new offensive "north of Lake Ilmen," about 170 miles south of Leningrad on the long dormant northern front.

FRENCH MOVE FORWARD IN ITALY FIGHT

ALGIERS, Jan. 15 (CP) — French troops, staving off five German counter-attacks in fierce fighting on the right wing of the Fifth Army front in Italy, have pushed forward two more miles toward Cassino. It was announced today, capturing the village of Acquafondata and three important heights in its vicinity. Acquafondata is about seven miles northeast of Cassino. British and New Zealand troops of the Eighth Army have made some advances at the Adriatic end of the front.

POLAND IS REASONABLE

Asks Britain and United States To Sponsor Border Negotiations With Russia.

LONDON, Jan. 15 (CP) — The Polish government in London after four successive days of study of Russia's proposal that Poland accept the Curzon Line as its eastern boundary announced in a conciliatory statement Friday that it was asking Great Britain and the United States to bring Poland and Russia together to discuss all outstanding Russian-Polish problems through mediation. An early settlement is the general expectation in London.

Large Attack On Yugoslavia

ALGIERS, Jan. 15 — Allied planes based in Italy made a full scale bombing attack on air fields in Yugoslavia yesterday.

EVACUATING ALL SOFIA

Bulgarian Reported to Have Ordered All Civilians to Leave Capital.

ISTANBUL, Jan. 15 — It is reported here that the Bulgarian government has ordered total evacuation of the capital city of Sofia on account of Allied bombing attacks. The centre of the city has been already virtually destroyed.

Local Boy Is Air Force Postmaster

Voluntary Shifts at Night Speed Delivery of Airmen's Letters.

Combining many of the more commendable qualities of a missing persons bureau, a beagle and a friend from home, the Canadian section of the British Base Army Post Office in Algiers is doing one of the biggest of those "they-serve-without-glory" jobs, says "Wings Abroad," Canadian publication of the Royal Canadian Air Force. Anyone trying not to get his mail would have a hard time hiding from FL. Al Davies, of Prince Rupert, and his hard-working staff. They work on the principle that mail is important and should get to the boys immediately if not sooner. Their adherence to this principle is bringing them back at nights. "The boys come back of their own accord," said FL. Davies. "They say there isn't much for them to do in the evenings, anyway."

A personally conducted tour of the establishment showed new bag racks being constructed for the rush of Christmas mail. In one corner of the sorting room one of the voluntary night shift workers was grabbing a few hours' sleep. Silently and smoothly a new batch of mail was being sorted and despatched, and on the other side the outgoing mail was being parcelled and fired into bags by young men with throwing arms indicating potential Yankee material when the war is over. Through Davies' office, staffed by 25 men, goes all the mail for the men of the R.C.A.F. serving in North Africa, Gibraltar, Italy, Middle East, Iran, Iraq and far-off India. The same office handles army mail but not in such great quantities.

SUPER FILE MAINTAINED

There is a file with the name of every R.C.A.F. man in the theatre. His address, which has been checked and re-checked from all available information, is kept up to date and all mail is checked against that file. FL. Davies pointed out that this is where R.C.A.F. men can help to get their mail without delay "if they would let us know through the redirection cards, so we can keep the file absolutely up to date." These changes amount to thousands each week.

After the mail has been checked and the address okayed or (continued on Page Four) altered, the letters are bundled, and if there is a letter for Umpteenth Squadron in Blank

Improving Navy Here

Reference Made to This Port by Hon. Angus Macdonald in General Announcement.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15 (CP) — Naval facilities at Prince Rupert are being improved, Minister of the Navy Angus Macdonald announced Friday.

The reference to Prince Rupert was made in the course of a general announcement by the minister in which he said that two Royal Navy escort carriers will be manned by Canadian officers and men but will have British air crews and aircraft carriers.

Canadian officers and seamen are in training for the taking over of two gift British medium cruisers of the latest advanced type.

ADMITTING REFUGEES

Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce Hesitates to Endorse Resolution.

A proposal from the Canadian Committee on Refugees seeking support for a move to admit anti-Nazi refugees was good health from Europe to Canada by waiving severe restrictions of an order-in-council of 1931 in connection with the admission of refugees was received at Thursday night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and referred to a committee for study and report. There was a feeling that this was a matter upon which considerable care should be exercised.

Under the proposal sanctuary in Canada would be offered to refugees from political or religious persecution without regard to race, creed or financial condition, necessary changes being made to the Immigration Act to facilitate their entry.

Evacuating Of Norway Coast

LONDON, Jan. 15 — The German radio says that four thousand persons have been evacuated from Tromsø, Norway, in fear of an Allied invasion thrust in that vicinity. Evacuation of Narvik and other Norwegian points is also said to be contemplated.

GOODWILL TOUR TO ALASKA IS CHAMBER PLAN

The desirability of establishing closer understanding and business relationship between Prince Rupert and the communities of southeastern Alaska was stressed in a discussion which took place at Thursday night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce when suggestions were made that a goodwill tour might be well organized of local businessmen to such points as Ketchikan, Petersburg, Juneau and Skagway or that a conference of representatives from those points might be held in Prince Rupert.

The idea was brought up by Frank Skinner who felt it would be well to promote a greater community interest by Prince Rupert not only with points in central and northern British Columbia but also with southeastern Alaska.

Arnold Flaten suggested that if it was possible to overcome the red tape which hampered travel to Alaska these days, Prince Rupert business men might well make a trip to get acquainted for mutual benefit.

W. M. Watts believed that southeastern Alaska towns were willing to realize the value of Prince Rupert to them. Even now plans were being made for a passenger car ferry service in order to connect up with the transprovincial highway along the Skeena River.

Bert Morgan offered the idea of a conference in Prince Rupert with delegates from Alaska and Northern British Columbia.

STATION ROADS AT TERRACE ARE NOT ADEQUATE

TERRACE, Jan. 15 — Terrace and District Board of Trade held its annual meeting in Terrace Hotel Wednesday evening when important matters came up for discussion particularly regarding needed improvements to roads leading to the railway station. Much has been done but part of the way is regarded as too narrow to carry the increased traffic that has come during the war.

Olof Hanson M. P. attended the meeting and joined in some of the discussions. Harry King was unanimously re-elected president and Duncan Kerr was re-elected secretary. Nigel Sherwood was elected to be treasurer.

C.C.F. LEADER—COLDWELL TALKS IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 — Speaking in New York at noon today, M. J. Coldwell, leader of the Co-operative Commonwealth of Canada, said that, after the next general election, the C.C.F. may be in power in Canada. The party was making plans to meet the challenge.

Mr. Coldwell said that the C.C.F. was gaining in strength with the forces overseas.

The Socialist leader expressed the opinion that the Canadian Pacific Railway should be brought under public ownership after the war.

Hear Stabbing Charge Monday

The preliminary hearing of William Samuel Cooper, charged with wounding in connection with the stabbing of Martin LaBelle in the Knox Hotel lobby on November 19, is scheduled to begin in police court before Magistrate W. D. Vance on Monday morning.

It expected that LeBelle, who has been in hospital since the stabbing occurred, will be in condition to be present in court. Cooper has already appeared for preliminary hearing in the stabbing of Paddy Keogh and elected in County Court to take speedy trial. The date set for the trial is January 27.

Both men were alleged to have been stabbed by Cooper in a fracas in the Knox Hotel lobby.

Hearing of the charge against Cooper of wounding LaBelle has been delayed while LaBelle recovered from his wounds. W. O. Fulton is acting in Cooper's defence.

Contempt Charge After Refusal To Testify in Trial

VANCOUVER, Jan. 15 — Victor Mayer, brother-in-law of the dead man and himself charged with robbery with violence, refused to give evidence yesterday at the preliminary hearing of Charles Hawken on a charge of murdering Frank A. Boland, former provincial policeman. Theraputic Police Magistrate H. S. Wood ordered a charge of contempt of court be laid.

MAN'S BODY IDENTIFIED

The body of the man reported yesterday morning as having been found dead in a cabin across the harbor was identified late yesterday afternoon as that of John Pollberg.

The body was brought to the city yesterday afternoon by British Columbia police of the marine patrol.

Knowledge of Pollberg's death was originally obtained by Valentine Fabro and Sam Passatel, who share a cabin near that in which Pollberg lived. They became apprehensive about him when they became conscious that they had seen no signs of life about his cabin for several days.

Going to Pollberg's cabin on Thursday night they found it locked from the inside. They shone a flashlight through the single small window of the cabin and saw what appeared to be the body of a man on the bed. To make certain, the two men took the window out of its casing and turned the light on the bed again. They then saw Pollberg's body plainly. Putting the window back in the frame, Fabro and Passatel left the cabin without entering it.

They communicated with the provincial police, who found it necessary to break into the cabin to obtain the body. Pollberg had been dead several days. Death was thought to have been due to pneumonia.

The deceased, who was born in Estonia, was 71 years old. He came to Canada in 1907, and had lived in British Columbia since 1909. He was a naturalized Canadian and had been a fisherman. He had been married, but had no children.

The death occurred in the Prince Rupert General Hospital this morning of Peter Czyz following a lengthy illness. He had been in hospital since December 23.

The deceased, who was a Ukrainian by birth, was 75 years old. He was a fisherman, and had lived in the community for a number of years.

SPORTS ON CONVENTION

Robert McCarthy Tells of "Friends of Russia" Gathering in Toronto.

An educational meeting of the Prince Rupert Labor Progressive Club this week Mrs. Robert McCarthy gave a very interesting report on the Congress of Canadian Soviet Friendship Society convention which convened recently in Toronto.

The convention was a huge affair, thousands being unable to gain entry on account of limited seating capacity. Every life was represented at this historic gathering designed to cement firmly the bonds of friendship between the two countries of Canada and

The various functions of the convention were held in the Royal York Hotel, Massey Hall and the Metropolitan Church of Toronto. The altar in Toronto's church was draped decorously with the Red Flag of the Soviet Union and the huge pipe organ pealed forth the strains of the "Internationale."

At Massey Hall, Colonel Zedeno of the world famous Red Army was introduced to the huge audience and was given tremendous ovation. Attired in the full dress uniform of a rank he was a very striking figure. Pictures of Roosevelt, Stalin and Churchill were flashed on the screen at Massey Hall and the applause was deafening for fully fifteen minutes.

Motion pictures of a Russian mechanic repairing a broken machine in a machine without dismantling it were also shown, showing what great progress has been made in Russia in the last few decades. Pictures of small children being taught the usefulness of bird life for the preservation of the orchards were shown too. These were called object lessons.

The city of Stalingrad was adopted by the City of Toronto and from the way this idea is progressing in Canada, should be very long until every Canadian City, town, village and hamlet will adopt a corresponding Russian city town etc. The Red Army is liberating hundreds of villages and towns and there will be a very urgent need for warm clothing, food and medical supplies for these heroic people who have fought the brutal terrific onslaught of the Nazi Hordes. It was unanimously agreed that steps should be taken immediately by the City of Prince Rupert to adopt a Russian seaport city of similar size.

Mrs. McCarthy was warmly thanked for address.

A Timely Topic . . .

The suggestion of E. T. Kenney, M.L.A. for Skeena, as made to the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce at its annual meeting, that a steamship service be established from Prince Rupert to the United Kingdom and Europe is not a new one. There was never a more timely occasion than the present, however, to renew the suggestion. The counsel that preparations should be made now so as to be ready for the time when world trade and commerce will be freely resumed under peace conditions and the natural products of Prince Rupert and district may be moved to the markets of the world is wise.

The idea, to be brought into ultimate consummation, will require a lot of development in the way of thought, planning and organization. Some enterprising interests, either local or otherwise, may see in it a good opportunity. Meanwhile it is one of the items of postwar re-establishment that the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce would do well to interest itself in and promote to the best of its talents and energy.

It has been often and rightly said that the destiny of this city and district can never be achieved until Prince Rupert has been established as world port. Much has been done as a result of war necessity to develop and exploit the facilities here — facilities which, it is to be hoped, will not be left idle after the exigencies of the war have passed.

Home-Front Heroes . .

Among today's unsung, undecorated heroes and heroines are those who quietly but intrepidly are waging war against juvenile delinquency on the home front, says Christian Science Monitor. They lack the manpower for a quick, decisive victory. They lack the ammunition for an all-out offensive against the foe. Sometimes they even lack the co-operation of the communities in which they serve.

Yet hundreds of fine men and women are combating this wartime problem without thought of reward or public recognition. They seek results only.

Through the persistent uphill efforts of these workers, hundreds of teen-age clubs have been organized all over the country to provide entertainment, music for dancing, and bars where soft drinks, ice cream, and candy are served. Law enforcement agencies, churches, schools, and settlement houses are co-operating today in many enterprises to get the teen-agers off the street and out of trouble. Progress is attributable not only to the activities of the professional social worker but also to volunteer help.

This is truly war work of the most urgent kind, and there are still opportunities for service in these ranks.

Sport Chat

Canadian hockey representation in Britain reached its highest peak of the war with the revelation that twelve members of the Air Force team which won the Allan Cup in the season of 1941-42 are on active service there. Not all, however, have got around to the ice game again. "It would be quite an event if we could round up the old team and play a series of games against All-Star teams for war charities," said P.O. Porky Dumart, erstwhile Boston Bruin star now in his second winter over there.

One of the latest to arrive is P.O. Johnny Acheson of Montreal and Toronto. He was serving as a pilot in the Eastern Air Command before receiving overseas posting. P.O. Jud Miller, who stepped up to take Bobby Bauer's place on the R. C. A. F. Kraut line when Bauer fractured an arm late in the 1942 season, is a pilot in Britain. So is Big Jerry Philbin of Montreal and Valleyfield, Que., who played defence. A flying officer, he captains a bomber in a Canadian squadron.

Other Allan Cup members overseas are P.O. Milt Schmidt who was the top scorer of the National league as a member of Boston Bruins; his former teammate, Bauer, now engaged in radio work as a leading air-craftman; Sgt. Pickles McNicholl of St. Andrews N. B., who played much hockey in Eastern Canada; W.O. Ted Miller, L.A.C. Mike Miller and Sgt. Buddy Hellyer of Westmount, Que., who had a brief tour in professional hockey before joining the R. C. A. F. "We would need a goaler to round us out—if and when," said Dumart. "Young George Hainsworth, who is up in Bomber Group, would fill the bill. He's a chip off the old block, and the old block was good."

A team representing the combined Red Indian and Wolf Canadian Fighter squadrons dropped its first hockey game in three starts when a classy bunch from a Canadian Mosquito squadron stung them 5-3. Major factor in the victory was the performance of P.O. Mac McCormick of Edmonton, Alta., who shot three goals. L.A.C. Arnold Wood of Miami, Man., scored the others. The losers' tallies were scored by Sgt. Lloyd Bowles of St. Catharines, Ont., and P.O. Bob Pentland of Calgary. Pentland, on the brink of a professional career with New York Rangers when the war came along, fired the nearest goal of the game. It was an ankle-high shot to the corner

and it climaxed a rink-long solo dash in the final period. In that period, L.A.C. Carl Kerr of Transcona, Man., losing centre, fell to the ice after a collision, and fractured his collarbone.

Basketball Buzz

In the first quarter of Thursday night's Air Force vs. Navy Interservice League basketball game play was very keen, play going into the second quarter with a score of 16 to 15 in favor of the airmen. In the third quarter things picked up for the Air Force which threw everything it had into the play and gained an advantage of nine points. Carrying on into the fourth quarter the airmen were still going strong and gave the Navy a wild time by scoring another 29 points. The Navy fought hard to get control but was outmanoeuvred by the fast-moving Air Force.

The Navy line-up was almost similar to that of the previous game, having Martin, Kelly, Wallace, Carlisle, Humber, Prentice and McLeod. Air Force team consisted of Pato, Zok, Smithers, Biore, Gerrismoff, Baumer and Morrison. Air Force had nine fouls and gained three points out of these while Navy had eight fouls and converted only one.

RESERVES WIN OUT

In a double header at Port Edward Thursday evening the Reserves defeated Ontario Regiment with a score of 70 to 38. The star of the Reserves was Shorty Santerbane. The Ontarians' leading man was Sgt. Hunt. This game was a fast moving one with only two fouls.

In the second game Coast Battery defeated Fortress with a score of 31 to 24. Kefham made 10 points and Fredachuk 9 points of the 31 points. The top scorers of Fortress were McKorked 9, and McMurchie 8 points.

In games at Seal Cove Port Edward defeated High School 72 to 36. In the other game the Yanks who still hold the no lost games, defeated Ack-Acks 87 to 23.

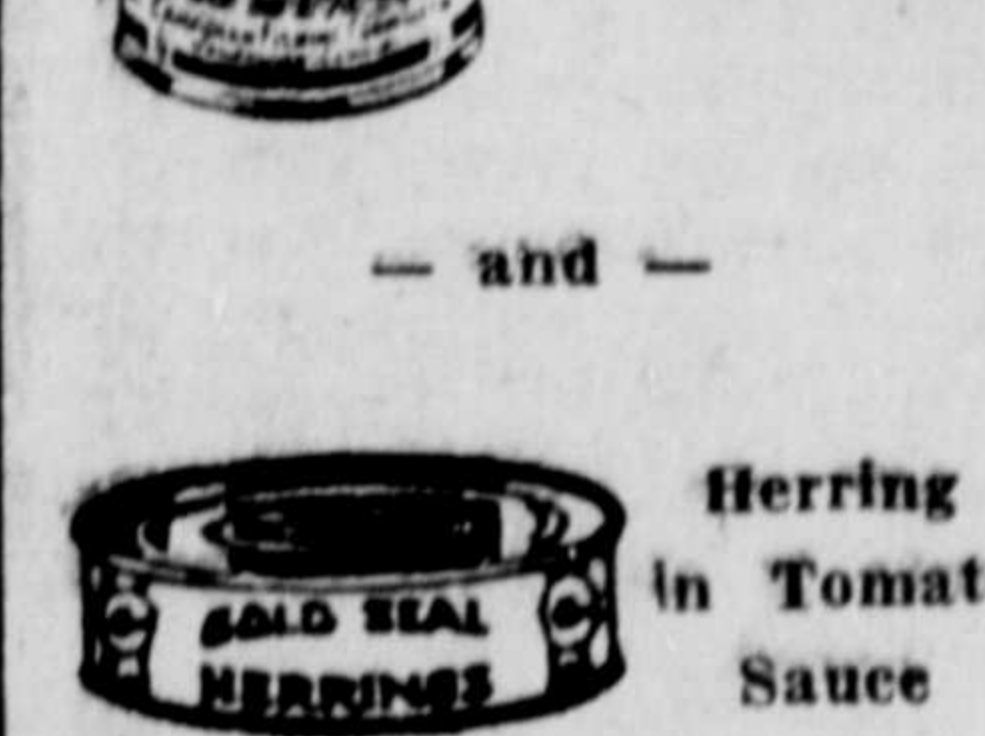

Squadron's bag someone will hear about it in the R.C.A.F. post office.

"We don't fool about it," said Davies. "We just cannot have mis-sorts. It's too important."

Airmail carries the highest priority in handling and is on its way as soon as the bags can be cleared and the addresses checked.

In charge of the "floor" is a former postal employee from Toronto, F.S. W. J. Compton. He used to be at Terminal "A" in Toronto, and with him, looking after the Canadian Army side of the service, is Cpl. C. W. Rogers, of Toronto, another former Terminal "A" man before the war.

In the registration room parcels were being handled in quantity, but they represented just a trickle compared to the flood that is expected when the Christmas bundles from home hit the area. Registration provides the same protection here as it does from home. The R.C.A.F. postal section often registers a parcel that has not been protected by the sender just to make sure it gets there.

HANDLING HARD ONES

In spite of their efforts there are bound to be some letters turn up that foil the systematic and painstaking efforts of the post office boys. These "no record" letters are held for 90 days and then are returned to the sender. To give you an idea how reluctantly they admit defeat in the "no record" branch, the flight lieutenant explained that lists of no record letters and parcels are exchanged by the various sections in the hope that a clue may be obtained from the pooling of information.

Cpl. J. V. Jones, Winnipeg, looks after these postal mavericks. He said that a letter addressed to LAC. Joe Doakes, R.C.A.F., North Africa, would get to him eventually, but he didn't advise that carefree attitude in addressing mail. But "we'd see that he got it all right," said the corporal a bit grimly.
