British field headquarters officers said that about fifty German tanks were believed knocked out or destroyed in a two-day battle up to dusk Tuesday night and virtually one entire German panzer grenadier regiment was wiped out in bitter fighting that flamed around Hill 112, Maltot and Louvigney. Needed BIG FIGHT PROCEEDING **Heavy Invasion Losses**

OTTAWA, July 12-Canada is expected to participate in the urgent invasion demand for tanks. It is understood that Montreal Locomotive-Canada's big tank arsenal-has received a substantial initial order to modernize and rehabilitate a large number of U.S. tanks in order to speed the flow of this type of

armament to Europe. One of the most dramatic production changes in the entire war program has been the sudden imperative call from the invasion beachhead for more tanks.

THERE are three basic reasons why a real and critical shortage I of gasoline exists in Canada today:

- (1) The insatiable demands of modern war.
- (2) The inadequacy of existing supply for both military and civilian needs and the difficulty of discovering and developing new sources of supply - in time.
- (3) The grave shortage of oil transportation facilities.

Petroleum needs of the forces in this war are 80 times greater than in the last war. It is four or five times as difficult and costly to find new oil reserves today as it was in the pre-war period. And supplies have to be shipped vast distances, in ocean tankers compelled to travel slowly in convoy and by circuitous



pressed into service to satisfy demand. As much as 67 per cent. of the total tonnage of overseas shipping for war consists of petroleum products - more than twice the tonnage of all the men, food, planes, guns, tanks, ammunition and all such material combined!

Canada's gasoline needs add but an extra burden. We, in this country, produce only 15 per cent. of our own petroleum supplies. The rest must be shipped here from abroad. It must be taken from the common pool of the United Nations. More than 60 per cent. of it must be delivered by ocean-going tankers. Ships and men-needed to serve the fighting areas-must be risked to provide our home front gasoline.
