A Popular Budget . . .

The 1944 budget of Mr. Ilsley, the minister of finance, may prove a popular one with the ordinary person considering the circumstances of the day. The cynical will, of course, call it an election budget which it probably is since the majority of political observers F-8, F-9 and F-10 (from book 3) believe there will be a general election before the time comes for another budget.

The removal of the compulsory savings portion of the income tax reduces the present payroll deduc- expire on July 31, 1944-Nos. tion from wages and salaries, making immediately available some money which for the past two years has been held out of people's wages to be repaid after the war. As Mr. Ilsley remarked in his speech the most of people had regarded this as a tax anyway. There was, as far as that was concerned, no definite understanding as to when the money would be

returned and the most of people seemed to have assumed that they would never get it anyway. Nevertheless, there are many who will feel that the dropping of compulsory savings or insurance is not such a very good thing to do at this time.

Other popular features of the budget for ordinary folk are the liberalization of some of the exemptions and allowances.

The dropping of the farm machinery tariff will be welcomed by the agricultural community against which it had been a stiff impost.

Our dispatch yesterday did not particularize on the revision of the excess profits tax under which business generally has been unable to avail itself of the recent era of prosperity.

To the ordinary taxpayer this budget is a sugary document for it promises a measure of at least temporary relief all around.

Economists may not be so complacently happy about relief from enforced taxation in the face of a two billion dollar deficit even if such relief may not be so very extensive after everything is boiled down. Some people will be surprised at any endency by Mr. Ilsley away from the "pay as you go" policy.

The faith that Mr. Ilsley appears to have in the voluntary savings willingness of the people is interesting. It would be well if we justify that faith.


