Twenty Big Nazi Cities Crippled

Unsurpassed Activity—
Year 1943 Brought Busi-
ness In This City to New Levels,
Industries Are Under Review

Our city has, in the past year, had an experience of unprecedented activity not likely to be surpassed," said the annual presidential report of R. M. Winslow at the meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night.

Our area was given an increased war loan quota in the spring and a still higher one in October. Yet subscriptions in each case exceeded the quota by substantial margins.

The great increase in population and the tremendous volume of construction and other operations threw a further overload on our city utilities and organization.

City revenues were, however, increased in several directions. The tax rate was raised from 47 1/2 to 50 mills; the tax on improvements was raised from 35 per cent of value to 50 per cent; sales of city property were very good, exceeding expectations and tax collections exceeded 95 per cent, making a new high record.

Some additional fire department equipment was purchased. Funds to clean up the balance of the Housing Scheme Loan were set aside. Sinking fund requirements were fully provided.

Apart from these purely financial aspects, our mayor and council for 1943 accomplished a great deal under very trying conditions and have built well for the future.

FISHING STILL MAJOR INDUSTRY

Fishing continues to be our major primary industry. The actual gross poundage of fish landed in Prince Rupert and other parts of the fisheries district was actually slightly lower than the year before but, the value to fishermen rose to \$7,900,000, a new high figure which compared with about \$4,000,000 in 1939.

Establishment of ceiling prices probably prevented a still higher range. Although higher operating costs and rigid collection of income taxes are important, there are indications that the halibut fleet will not be any smaller this coming season and may increase. With prices, both Cana-

Delegation Reports On Road Trip

While an encouraging reception was given and sympathetic consideration promised by influential organizations and persons in connection with north-ern highway development to a delegation which went south recently to visit Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle and Spokane in furtherance of the Hazelton-Telegraph Creek-Whitehorse route for a British Columbia link with the Alaska Highway, there is reason to believe that powerful interests are at work which are not favorable to this route.

V.D. RATE IN CITY IS HIGH

Reporting of All Venereal Cases To Public Health Authorities Boosts Local Rate Above Provincial Average, Dr. Knipe Says.

The incidence of venereal diseases reported to medical health authorities in Prince Rupert in 1943 was almost five times as high in proportion as the incidence in British Columbia in 1942, the latest year for which provincial statistics are available, it was revealed today by Dr. Roger Knipe, director of the Prince Rupert Public Health Unit.

Last year's venereal disease rate in the city was 14.9 cases per 1000 population. The provincial rate for 1942 was 3.21 cases per 1000 population. Local figures are based on a highly authoritative survey which sets the city's population at 13,300.

The wide hiatus between the record of local incidence and that published by the provincial Public Health Department does not mean that gonorrhoea and syphilis have taken a sudden upswing here during the past year, it was made clear by Dr. Knipe.

"While it is probably true that the occurrence of venereal disease in Prince Rupert is higher than the provincial average, the actual difference is not so great as the figures indicate," Dr. Knipe said. "The Prince Rupert Public Health Unit is advised of every case treated by a city doctor and its statistics are based on all the cases that have occurred. Cases in other parts of the province are not so scrupulously reported so naturally the provincial record is lower."

A ratio of almost three to one of gonorrhoea over syphilis is revealed by a break-down of the figures. Out of the city's venereal rate of 14.9 cases per 1000, 71 per cent, or 10.6 cases per 1000, suffered from gonorrhoea. The other 29 per cent, or 4.3 cases per 1000, had syphilis.

The Prince Rupert Public Health clinic treated 47 per cent of the cases which occurred in the city last year. The seven doctors in private practice treated the other 53 per cent.

Dr. Knipe was emphatic in his denial of the common assertion that military personnel are responsible for the high incidence of venereal disease in the city.

"The statistics on the venereal rate among service people are not available for publication," he said, but I can assure you that they are much lower than among the civilian population. Among the American soldiers the rate is extremely low."

The great majority of cases among the military had been contacted outside Prince Rupert. Last year only ten cases were reported as having been con-

tacted in the city, Dr. Knipe said.

The practice followed by local law enforcement authorities of remanding petty offenders who are suffering from venereal disease and holding them until they are cured either by the Public Health clinic or a private physician was commended by Dr. Knipe as a means of bringing to light cases which otherwise might continue indefinitely as a source of infection.

NOTICE TO EMPLOYERS OF TECHNICAL PERSONNEL**

Your attention is directed to: NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE REGULATIONS—Order in Council 246, Part III, Technical Personnel, Section 305, Subsection 1, reading as follows:

"All persons employing technical personnel from time to time, at the request of the Minister of Labour shall supply him with such information as he may specify with reference to their present and future requirements of technical persons for essential work."

Where such requirements include any engineering or science students who, through graduation from a recognized University during 1944, become technical personnel, it shall be the duty of the prospective employer to notify the Minister forthwith of such needs through the Wartime Bureau of Technical Personnel.

The information to accompany such notification of requirements shall include:

1. The anticipated number of prospective employees.
2. The nature of proposed occupation of each.
3. The type of training deemed best adapted to the occupation proposed.
4. Remuneration with respect of each position to be filled.

The filing of such requirements shall be no guarantee of their being filled. Each case will be considered on its merits and therefore such information should be submitted as will provide a basis for decision as to the labour priority of the work involved.

University courses which lead to graduates being classed as technical personnel include all branches of Engineering, Agricultural Science, Architecture, Forestry, Veterinary Science, Household Science courses which lead to a degree and various General Science and Honour Science courses (Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Geology and other natural science courses).

Prospective employers who fail to submit their requirements by February 15th, 1944, shall be deemed not to need the services of 1944 graduates in engineering and science courses and no provision can be made for requirements filed after that date.

Looks Like Favorable Deal . . .

It looks like a good deal has been made by the city in regard to the local civic centre project. The city turns over to the federal government property on McBride Street between First and Second Avenues to a depth of five lots or 135 feet as the site for a Y.M.C.A. war services building. The plans of the structure are being amended to meet the approval of the civic centre organization. Six months after the war the building will be turned over for civic centre purposes at a price settled upon by arbitration. Meanwhile the civic centre organization has no financial commitments and its funds are in no way jeopardized.

So far so good but the point has been raised lately that some sort of a civic centre should be brought into being without waiting for the war to end as the need is as great now as it may be at any time. Meantime, the civic centre has substantial funds available. Possibly something might be done about meeting the present needs in a manner which would be compatible with the postwar situation when it is to be assumed plenty of buildings will be available.

An Example From Us . . .

President Roosevelt goes so far as to admit that, in his proposed national service act plan, he is copying the pattern of Canada, Australia and certain other British Dominions. That may be encouraging to those responsible for Canada's selective service set-up in which President Roosevelt must see some good points although many of us in this country seem to have difficulty in seeing any virtue in it, particularly if it causes a little thought or bother.

The general principle of our selective service set-up is, no doubt, good enough although sometimes undesirable, unwieldy and seemingly pointless complications are appended to it.

These are difficult and changing times and measures that would meet a situation today might be entirely unsuitable for a condition six months hence that are entirely unpredictable.

It is often difficult to discern the difference between inexcusable bungling and earnest striving.

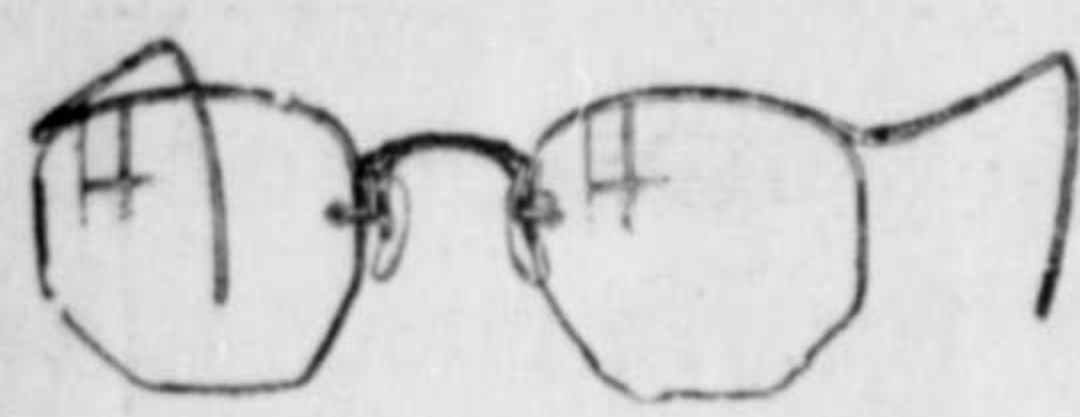

committee to continue prosecuting the matter fully. One of the first moves will be to enlist the support and co-operation in the campaign communities of south-eastern Alaska.

It was also decided to communicate with Premier John Hart for a clarification of his stand which has become somewhat confused. Mr. Hart recently gave assurance that no decision would be made in regard to the route to be followed for the northward link until after survey had been made of the Hazelton - Telegraph Creek Whitehorse route. However, at a recent convention in Spokane of the Pacific Northwest Trade Association, Mr. Hart was purported to have promised to allocate \$6,000,000 on behalf of the province for the building of such a road northward from Prince George providing the federal government and the United States put up similar sums.

In his report to the Chamber of Commerce last night, Mr. Wilson declared that the northward highway project was a "huge thing with which the whole destiny of the portland is wrapped up." It meant a matter of millions of dollars to Prince Rupert and was a matter of life and death to the interior which was now suffering from lack of population and markets. The Prince George route, Mr. Wilson asserted, was based on "misstatement and wrong information."

POWERFUL INTERESTS BEING LINED UP

Mr. Wilson told of meetings during the recent trip south with Premier Hart, President S. S. McKeen of the Vancouver Board of Trade, Hon. Heibert Ansecomb, minister of public works, the highway committee

at the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, Representative Warren Magnuson and others. A resolution of the Pacific Northwest Trade Association at Spokane supporting the Prince George route had come as something of a bolt out of the blue, indicating that powerful interests were at work. The Standard Oil Co. of California was mentioned.

Speaking to the same matter, R. M. Winslow said that it looked like deliberate effort was being made to bludgeon or compel Premier Hart into adopting the Prince George route. Seattle appeared desirous of having a link as close to the coast as possible. It seemed that the most important and influential persons had not yet been identified or met. It was a big sub-

ject and there would be a big fight. There was heavy competition from the Prince George route, and all possible backing for the Hazelton route would have to be developed including that of southeastern Alaska.

Theo Collart believed the support of the Canadian National Railways should be enlisted. G. W. Nickerson pressed for a definite statement from Premier Hart as to his stand in the light of the statement purported to have been made at Spokane that he was prepared to allocate \$6,000,000 for the Prince George route.

A vote of thanks was tendered to Walter Wilson, R. M. Winslow, E. T. Kenney and Verne Taylor for the representations that they had so capably made.

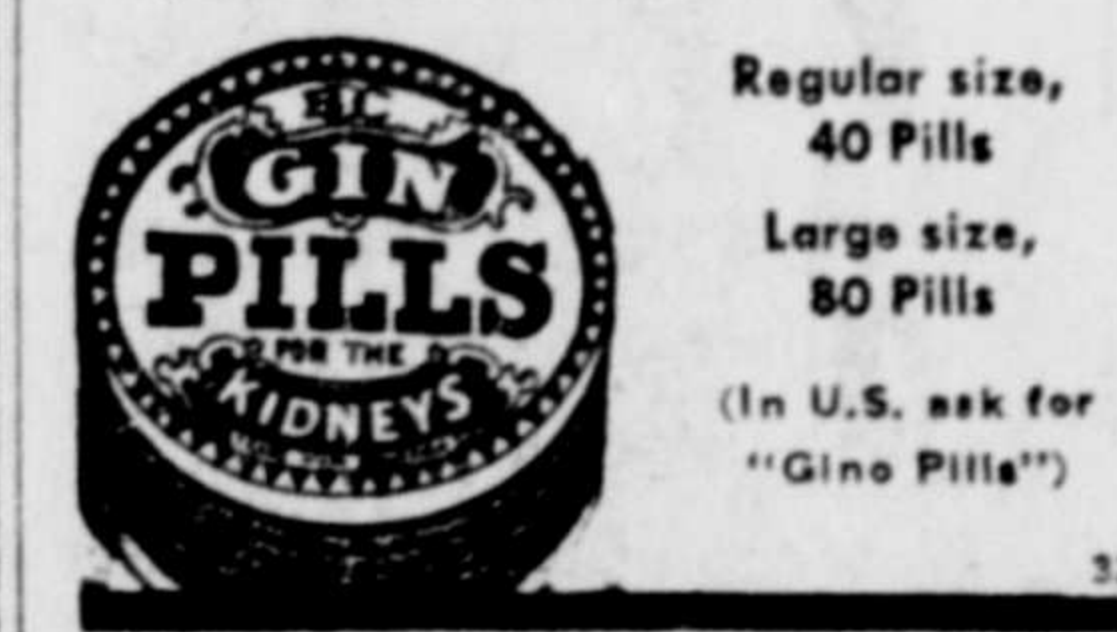
