GREAT OFFENSIVE COMING Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox said last night that the Allies are about to start the greatest offensive in history both in Europe and the Pacific.

PREPARE FOR INVASION

Two thousand special trains are in readiness in Great Britain to handle forces for the opening of the western Europe fronts. Canals and shipping also are getting in readiness.

EVACUATE FRENCH COAST

Some parts of the Mediterranean coast of France have been ordered evacuated by Pierre Laval against the possibility of an Allied invasion.

BULGARIA IS WARNED

The Russian newspaper Pravda warned Bulgaria to overthrow the pro-Nazi government and get out of the war if the nation was not to share Germany's fate. A new Nazi police force is being organized in bomb-stricken Sofia, it is reported, and a six o'clock curfew has been imposed.

ARE GAINING IN BURMA

The Allies are gaining on both ends of the Burma front although their forces are comparatively light. There is hand to hand fighting in the advance on Akyab. Japanese patrols have been wiped out by Chinese in the north and strong positions taken.

EXTENDING NEW INVASION Allied forces, following their new landing on the west coast of Italy 28 miles south of Rome, have become strongly entrenched on their bridgeheads which have been both widened and deepened. Finding the landing beaches deserted and practically no enemy resistance, the going has been easy so far and they have been able to drive inland four miles toward the Appian Way and the road to Rome which is now under shellfire. The next 48 hours, it is thought, may decide the whole course of the campaign-whether it will be a swift march on Rome or a repetition of bloody Salerno. General Mark Clark is leading the campaign.

area of the beachfleads which British and American assault troops won in virtually unopposed landings at dawn Saturday. The Allies now hold the north and south of Nettuno, it was said.

It is not too much to say that Canon Scott was the most beloved figure in the Canadian Corps and, now that he is dead, Canadian soldiers of the last war mourn him. For thirty years Rev. Frederick George Scott led the well-ordered and quiet life of a clergyman of the Anglican church, for the most part ministering to the congregation which attended St. Matthew's Church, Quebec, first as curate and then as rector. He had two outside interests; he wrote poetry, which won him the title of "The Poet of the Laurentians," and became a student of military history through his connection with the Eighth Royal Rifles of Quebec as its chaplain. Then the war broke out and in a few months Canon Scott became one of the bestknown padres in the Canadian, indeed in the British, forces in France. He went overseas with his regiment and at the conclusion of the struggle was senior chaplain of the 1st Canadian Division with a brilli-
