WOMEN M.D.'S BEING USED

Canada Has Three FMO's At Work in Army Hospital in Britain and They Are Anxious to Go to France

WITH A CANADIAN GENERAL HOSPITAL IN ENGLAND, July 22 (CP) — Canada may send some of the first FMO's—women army doctors—across to serve in Normandy.

With a Canadian General Hospital that has already done a considerable amount of moving about England since its arrival in May are three Canadian women medical officers, as well as a bacteriologist. All four want to go overseas.

Meanwhile, in this large unit, they are privileged women. When the nursing sisters eat in their own mess, the four who wear khaki instead of blue use the spacious medical officers' mess and have other rights accorded previously only to men of the medical corps.

"The fact that the army has accepted women doctors on equal terms should be a big help to the future of women in the medical profession," Maj. Violet Rae commented as she bent over a microscope in the hospital's pathology lab.

Major Rae, who can claim Hamilton, Ont., Toronto and Calgary as past homes, is in charge of the lab and under her the biochemical testing is carried out, blood tests are made as well as tissue examinations and the occasional post-mortem.

"A lab in a military hospital is never dull," said the kindly, variety woman doctor.

VARIEETY OF WORK "We don't see many patients, but we have a wide variety of work."

Major Rae majored in pathology at the University of Toronto after she completed her medical training at the University of Alberta in Edmonton. Later, she worked in the lab at the Mount-ain Sanatorium, Hamilton, Ont.

Working with the major was Lieut. Jean Arnot who before her marriage to Capt. Fred Arnot of the dental corps, was Jean Bonnell of Victoria. Being one of the first women bacteriologists from Canada to serve overseas gave Mrs. Arnot a chance to see her husband for the first time in more than a year. Mrs. Arnot was getting ready to move with her hospital unit but she would be followed in the lab by Lieut. Mary Gibson of Vancouver, who also attended U.B.C. at the same time.

Very little salmon is reported to be coming into Prince Rupert for fresh sale or freezing from the Skeena this week. The fact that the spring salmon run has begun to slow down and coho run has not yet fully begun as the reason.

Up to yesterday no halibut has arrived in port since July 14 when the last of the boats fishing in Area Two brought in their catches.

An absence of large American halibut boats, which have gone south by government order for seine fishing, may extend the season somewhat.

Between 25 and 30 halibut boats are said to be preparing to fish for dogfish and shark.



TIMELY RECIPES

MEAT AND CARROT LOAF OR PATTIES

1½ lbs. ground beef (shoulder neck, shank, brisket)
1¼ teaspoons salt
½ teaspoon pepper
1 medium onion, chopped
1 cup shredded or grated raw carrot
1 egg
3 tablespoons gravy, or other liquid
1½ cups soft bread crumbs

Combine ground beef, salt and pepper; add onion and carrot. Add beaten egg and gravy or other liquid. Mix well and add bread crumbs. Pack into a greased pan and bake in a moderate oven, 350 deg. F. for 1¼ hours. Mixture may be shaped into patties and sauteed in a heavy frying pan. Six to eight servings.

RED CROSS

The "biggest little" branch of the B.C. Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society is at Alert Bay, a small hamlet on Queen Charlotte Straits off the coast of Vancouver Island. This centre serves some 3,000 miles of coast and D. S. Cameron, formerly of the Alert Bay branch, reports that there are 1,700 members of the Red Cross in this district. It was this scattered community that raised \$7,000 for the recent campaign, lonely settlers, in out of the way places, making large cash donations. Logging camps, fishing villages, lighthouses . . . all contribute their bit towards making life easier for the men who are fighting.

Better conditions for prisoners of war in the far East are being sought by British, American and Canadian Red Cross Societies in respect to personal parcels. Officials are still waiting a reply from the Japanese Red Cross to their cable sent last December from the Washington conference. However, it is known that Red Cross relief supplies have been delivered in safety at many Japanese Red Cross camps.

B.C. gardeners should be interested in the news that phenomenal vegetable crops are being harvested by prisoners in some of the German camps. At an officers camp, near the border of Switzerland, the garden this year is expected to be better than the previous season when 3,080 tomatoes, 4,000 lettuce, 1,000 carrots and 2,080 radishes were supplied the prison kitchen. Kitchen waste is used as compost enabling them to maintain and improve fertility in spite of very heavy cropping.

Nearly 1,000,000 Red Cross food parcel acknowledgment cards have been received from Geneva by the Red Cross Enquiry Bureau in Ottawa. This means that the weekly food parcels are going through to German camps in good order and that the prisoners are being well looked after by the Red Cross. Twenty-three carloads of Red Cross parcels for prisoners of war left Montreal early in July, the shipment consisting of 100,000 parcels, the weekly quota for the Canadian Red Cross Society.
