The British Second Army, aided by United States tanks, is penetrating the Reich north of Aachen and is now less than 25 miles from Duisburg. While the main United States Third Army is advancing into the Saar Basin 30 miles north of Metz, other Third Army units are engaged in house-to-house fighting with the Nazis within the fortress city. The French First Army, at the southern end of the front, has thrust to within one mile of Belfort as they head into the important gap leading into southeastern Germany. Just to the north the French-American Seventh Army has picked up to three miles along a thirtymile front in an offensive pointed at Strasbourg. The American First and Ninth Armies continue advancing in the Aachen area of Germany.

Certainly we are in need of the material and one of the principal difficulties in bringing it out seems to be that men of responsibility and conscientiousness are inclined to allow their prejudice against "the dirty business of politics" to overweigh their sense of personal and active responsibility toward the public welfare.

It is not helping any, as the minister suggested, to stand on the sidelines and talk about politics being a dirty business with which we will have nothing to do. Several hundred communities across Canada have formed volunteer committees to aid with the community problems of re-establishment, but there is need for

many of these. THE FUNCTIONS OF VOLUNTEER COMMITTEES

Volunteer Citizens Committees are set up under a government order in council. They are an official part of the Canadian reestablishment machinery. In a broad sense their function is to assist in the community re-establishment problems. These vary in different centres, but in a general sense the committees:

- 1. Organize home coming receptions for veterans.
- 2. Give local publicity to the re-establishment program.
- 3. Give advice and counsel to veterans on their re-establishment problems.
- 4. Assist in securing employment.
- 5. Advise the government on policies and on local problems.

These, however, are only highlights of the work which can be done, for the field is wide and the work is well worthwhile.

HOW TO ORGANIZE

In many communities where Volunteer Citizens' Committees have been formed, initial leadership has been provided by municipal authorities and veterans' organizations: Usually service clubs, business men and other community bodies have been invited to assist. The co-operation and aid of government authorities is available, for the problem of community re-establishment is regarded as a most important part of the work. If your community has not already formed a volunteer citizens' committee, full details voluntary assistance. Veterans' organizations, such as the Canadian and assistance may be secured by writing to the Department of Legion, the Canadian Corps Association, the War Amputations of Veterans' Affairs.
