

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (CP)-Admiral Hussand Kimmel and Major General Walter Short have been cleared of responsibility for the Pearl Harbor disaster on December 7, 1941.

A United States government commission investigating the disaster, announced last night that there are no grounds for courtmartial proceedings against any American military personnel in connection with Pearl Harbor.

OTTAWA, Dec. 2 (CP)—The Canadian Army suffered 7,921 casualties in October compared with 9,338 in August and 8,445 in Septermber. In October there were 1,760 dead, 591 missing, prisoners and interned and 5,570 wounded. October figures for the Navy and Royal Canadian Air Force are not yet available.

Canadian Army fighting was concentrated in October on freeing the port of Antwerp by clearing the Schelde estuary.

Figures to date for all three armed services in this war are 77,661 casualties made up of 27,446 dead, 12,525 missing, prisoners and interned and 37,690 wounded.

In the First Great War Canadian casualties totalled 190,092 persons including 62,817 dead.

LONDON, Dec. 2 (P)-Britain's Home Guard of two million men has been disbanded and on Sunday the last parades will be staged throughout the country. King George will broadcast to the Home Guard men. All members are liable to recall in event of emergency but few expect the Sunday parades will be repeated until the final victory march.



The King government will no doubt be endorsed in a democratic way through the passage of a vote of confidence by the majority of the elected representatives of the people. There will be no election until, according to the Prime Minister's assurance, the normal expiry of the life of this Parliament on April 16 next unless perchance—and the chance does not seem very great—the war should be over in the meantime. Once we have settled the issue of conscription—and certainly every possible effort has been made to make the minority opposed to it as small as possible—it will be up to all good Canadians to prove that they are really democratic and bow to the will of the majority as democratically expressed and accept the verdict.







Fishing for dogfish (grayfish) ivers-most lucrative phase of the west coast fishing industry from the fisherman's standpoint -increased at such a pronounced rate this year that conservapossibility of exhaustion of this invaluable source of Vitamin A. Figures just to hand from Ottawa show the reason for their concern. In August of this year B. C. landings of greyfish livers were 434,000 pounds, nearly twice as great as in August of last year. This one month's take was valued at more than \$144,000 to the fishermen which total was roughly \$100,000 more than they received for their catch in August of 1943. Just 10 years ago the dogfish was reported as a menace to the fishing industry because of its eating habits and the damage done to gill-nets. This year the reduced salmon pack was attributable in part to the fact that fishermen in larger numbers than ever before lingered at the greyfish grounds beyond the time when customarily they would have moved on to the salmon streams. Because of the advisability of perpetuating this fisheries asset, the fisheries conservation experts of B. C. and the three states to the south are co-operating in a study which will be the basis of recommendations for future regulations or voluntary limitation. This may involve the sparing of live live-

greyfish feeding on salmon, halibut and other fish. Indications of herring in waters near Prince Rupert are still lacking fishermen report. Some small catches were made in the Bella Bella area early this week but the small fish failed to show up in appreciable numaers.
