WAR NEWS

ALLIED POSITION BETTER
Allied troops have improved their positions on the beachhead after an artillery barrage. Two minor attacks in the Canadian-held Adriatic sector of the front were repulsed Wednesday.

JAPANESE ADVANCING
CHUNGKING—A Chinese communique last night indicated the Japanese had advanced in the direction of Tengfeng, 100 miles west of Chengshien, in the bitter north Honan campaign against Central China.

HIT AT KURILES AGAIN
HARBOR—American planes on the Aleutian Islands hit the Japanese far northern Kurile Islands, Paramushiro and Matsua, Monday for the second consecutive day and delivered a 36-ton bombing attack on the enemy's island fortress of Truk.

HEAVY JAPANESE LOSSES
The Japanese suffered heavy losses in attacks on Allied Chindit positions in Burma while British troops the Japanese back in the Imphal-Kohima sector.

NAVAL ENGAGEMENTS ON
While Canadian destroyers, teamed with British, sank a German destroyer in the English Channel, carrier-borne planes swooped down on a German battleship, Northern Norway, damaging four ships and an escort.

NAZI LOSSES IN BLACK SEA
The Russians sank five German and Rumanian ships and damaged two others off Sebastopol. It is presumed the ships were trying to evacuate trapped Germans. Sources report a new Russian land offensive in Besenar province of Rumania but this is not confirmed by the Russians.

READYING FOR INVASION
Nazi troops by the thousands are pouring into the Balkans. Recent acts of sabotage are alleged to have been committed by the Germans themselves to justify the invasion.

Regulating Stevedores
VANCOUVER, April 27—Under a new Selective Service regulation waterfront workers are required to have special permits to do longshoring and other waterfront jobs. The regulation is said to be designed to give a more even break to this important branch of work.



Great Bombing Raid On Essen

Tea and Coffee Rations In Canada Are Being Increased

OTTAWA, April 27, (Canadian Press)—Tea and coffee rations will be increased approximately forty percent on May 1, the Wartime Prices and Trade Board announces. Coupon values will be raised to four ounces for tea and sixteen ounces for coffee with two coupons valid each month on second and fourth Thursdays. Present coupon values for tea are two ounces and for coffee eight ounces. Improvement in the supply and shipping situation has made possible the increase in the ration.

OTTAWA, April 27, (Canadian Press)—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King arrived in Britain Thursday for a conference of Empire Prime Ministers. Mr. King will attend a conference of Dominion Prime Ministers and will address members of both Houses of British Parliament, Deputy Prime Minister Clement Atlee told the House of Commons Thursday.

British and Canadian Air Forces Out Again In Strength Last Night

LONDON, April 27, (Canadian Press)—Well over one thousand Royal Air Force and Royal Canadian Air Force bombers slammed block-busters on the Nazi industrial cities of Essen and Schweinfurt and railway yards near Paris early Thursday and fresh fleets of British and American daylight bombers struck across the Channel in the thirteenth day of relentless pre-invasion bombing. The night fleets dropped possibly 4500 tons of explosives and incendiaries. Twenty-nine bombers were lost in the night assault.

Two mosquito bombers were lost in raids on Hamburg. Carrier-based British aircraft pounced on a German convoy off the northern coast of Norway Wednesday and damaged four ships and an escort vessel, the Admiralty announced today. No details of the engagement were given.

Labor Delegate To Calgary Meet

Nicholas Bird to Represent Trades and Labor Council
At a special meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council held last evening in the Carpenters' Hall, Nicholas Bird was elected delegate to the convention of the building trades department of the American Federation of Labor, to be convened in the near future in either Calgary or Edmonton for the purpose of immediate and post-war planning and rehabilitation, having especially to do with the crafts engaged in the construction industry. It is the intention of the local Carpenters' Union to also send a delegate to the proposed convention and, in conjunction with Mr. Bird, they will harmonize their efforts on behalf of the A.F. of L. Unions of Prince Rupert.

Chenghsien Has Fallen

CHUNGKING, April 27 (Canadian Press)—The Japanese offensive in North Honan Province is believed to have overrun Chenghsien, rail junction in the campaign, which appears to be aimed at the heart of China.

SEATTLE, April 27 (Canadian Press)—Six labor unions and the Alaska Salmon Industry Inc., representing nearly all the far north canneries, have signed an agreement ending the labor dispute which threatened to hamper 1944 salmon production.

Civilian Defence Chemical Course

VANCOUVER, April 27—As part of the general program of civil defence on the Pacific Coast a chemical course on the identification of the war gases was held at the University of British Columbia recently. This course was conducted under the joint authority of the Director of Civil Defence for Canada and the Provincial Civil Defence Committee of British Columbia and brought together a representative group of twenty-five of the professional chemists of the province. In addition to representatives from the Greater Vancouver districts of Vancouver, North Vancouver, Burnaby, and New Westminster, chemists from Victoria, Trail, Prince Rupert, and Nanaimo were present. Personnel of the course was restricted to chemists of professional standing and all attending were required to take an oath of secrecy regarding the nature of the tests for war gases.

New Ship Contracts

VANCOUVER, April 27, (Canadian Press)—The Vancouver Province reported in a news page shortly that if men and materials are available, contracts for new type supply ships, twenty-one in number and possibly totalling \$31,000,000 in value will be awarded Vancouver yards following a survey now being carried out by the government departments.

Plugging the Leaks . . .

Diplomatic privilege has been too easy a screen for spying. Diplomatic travel and diplomatic pouches, immune from border searches, have been for years well-worn channels of secret information. The British Government, placing an embargo on travel or uncensored correspondence from London, is taking only a common-sense step to guard the lives and military plans of Allied forces crouched now on the invasion springboard.

Nothing like this has been done since the Congress of Vienna set up the convention of diplomatic immunity in 1815. Such action was not attempted in the last war. This move, denying traditional privileges to envoys of forty-three Allied and neutral governments—only those of Russia, America and the Dominions are exempted—will bring protests. But now from anyone whose primary concern is the safety and success of the men now preparing to free the Nazi-enslaved peoples of Europe.

This unprecedented effort to black-out spy reports from the great invasion base is not necessarily a signal for immediate invasion. But it is a measure no government would wish to prolong and is definitely a tension-tightener for friend and foe alike.

Against Wildcat Strikes . . .

Hasty headline readers can easily gather a false impression of the new British regulation to curb strikes. It is not a blow at unions, but a measure to help union leaders keep control of recalcitrant members. It carries a five-year jail term for inciting strikes—but only if the inciting is done outside regular union meetings.

It is designed to stop "unofficial" strikes, such as that which kept 80,000 Yorkshire miners out of the coal pits for weeks and caused Labor Minister Bevin to say "the situation is worse than if Hitler had bombed Sheffield and cut our communications." This plan recognizes the honest efforts of labor leaders to prevent strikes. But one effect, which may not be unintended, will be to make the failure of unions to control members hard to excuse.

Can. Army Overseas."

"Please thank the ladies of the Auxiliaries for me for sending the Christmas parcel which I received a couple of days ago. It took a long time in getting this far but did manage to eventually reach me."

"It is really swell of everybody concerned to think of us fellows, especially the ones who are in the front lines. Parcels and cig-

arettes are surely greatly appreciated and never a day goes by without most of the fellows asking "Any mail today?"

"I have changed my address, though, all the cigarettes you have sent were re-addressed. Am now back with my original Regiment, as you will notice by the address on the other side. Have been with them for about a year but thanks to the Postal Corps, they never failed me."

"Am at present in Italy, have been here quite some time. No need of me giving details."

One thing though, this country does not live up to its name of "Sunny Italy" during this part of the year. Lots of rain, then snow, which combines with a sea of mud. I think the heat and bugs would be more welcome but time will tell."

"Have run into a few of the boys who were with me in the 102nd Heavy Battery in this

country. Sure was glad to meet some of the fellows from home and revive old memories."

"Life in the field with not much space between the Germans and us is a lot different from Coast Defence. At this moment can hear shells bursting and they are none too far away."

"Would like to go on but I am such a poor letter writer and sure don't want to bore you all but, before I close, again I say—thanks a million to each and everyone and hope to be able to thank you personally some day."

"Thank you for the fags I sure needed them as I was completely out this time. Not much news over here but still waiting for something to happen. Keep cigarettes coming if you can."

"I'm writing this to thank you and the rest of the W.A. of the Coast Regt. for the cigarettes and parcel which I have received from you in the last two weeks. This is the first chance I've had as we have been pretty busy for the last month. I have received 900 cigarettes and parcel practically all together as I have moved around an awful lot since Xmas. I hope I'm now here for the duration of the war as when you go to hospital

it seems you never get your mail straight again for the next six months."

"I went nearly two months without a letter or parcel but when they did catch up I was flooded with them. They are nearly all caught up now I think and hope."

"I met Frank Comadina a month ago and we spent the evening together and had quite a talk about the old home town. I don't imagine that there are many of the old bunch left there. Harry Atree, Pascal and Tommy Flewin came down to Italy on the same boat as I did. Ernie Peters and Wilson and myself were all together in the First Medical then I met two of the brothers at the Canadian Replacement Centre and also some man from the Searchlights stopped me and asked me if I weren't from the 102nd. Most of the old bunch are here. It is too bad we couldn't have come over as a Battery."

"Well I must close and write a few more letters. Thanks again for the cigarettes and parcel."

The men were Sappers P. Polidinski and E. Yablonski of an engineer unit.



GARDEN NOTEBOOK

Fertilizing and Spraying.
Seldom do soils have available to the garden plants enough of material for their growth. If we look upon the soil as a store house of raw materials for the garden, then we will realize that when there is a shortage, our crop will suffer. However, there are several angles to the plant food question in the garden, as we will see further along in this article.

How Will I Know When My Garden Needs Fertilizer?

The vegetables you plant will soon tell you whether or not they are getting the right amount of plant food. If they are puny and weak, they are being starved. If they have a sickly yellow color, it is likely because they need feeding. If your garden vegetables have a bright, clean, healthy color and develop rapidly, you can know there is

plenty of plant food in the soil for them. When spreading fertilizer, however, keep it away from the seeds and plant roots, at least half an inch. Put your fertilizer within reaching distance for it by sending out their roots. Otherwise you will "burn" the young sprouts.

Does Fertilizing Your Garden Help Fight Weeds and Insects?

The answer we might say is "yes" and "no." When we fertilize the garden, it makes it possible for us to raise a good crop of vegetables with doubtless some weeds mingled, because there is plenty of plant food for both. However, there is no use wasting fertilizer on weeds. Keep them down. The same is true of insect damage. If there is heavy growth of leaves and stems on your plants, the insects can rob you of a little material, and you will still have a crop left; however, we don't believe in growing "garden sass" for bugs.

How Soon Should I Buy My Fertilizer and Spray Material?

We hope you have already bought it. A good share of your fertilizer should have been worked into the soil at planting time, although an application of fertilizer alongside the row during the growing season is also a good thing. However, the principal job of fertilizing should have

been done before seeding. Spray materials may be scarce before the season is over and you should have on hand a package of lead arsenate to spread on the vegetables for the benefit of worms and other chewing marauders.

When Should I Start Spraying?

If you really want to get maximum results from your work this year, you should start to spray the minute you see the first bug in the garden. Unless you are experienced, you will find that aphids will sneak up on you before you know it. They sit on the underside of plant leaves without moving. Being of the same green color as the vegetables, they are hard to see, and when you do see them, they look so small and harmless that you will almost think they are hardly worth bothering about. However, they are doing plenty of damage. Be sure to spray on the undersides of garden plants, as well as on top of the leaves. Most of the insects will be out of sight.

Matthews, dean of St. Paul's Cathedral, has appealed for fire watchers, his letter going to the high commissioners for each of the Dominions, because "St. Paul's is of such interest to visitors from the Dominions and Colonies that it is sometimes called the Parish Church of the Empire."

EAST ACTON, Eng., — Pte. Robert Buckingham and his wife have a special attachment for their wedding ring, Buckingham bought it months ago when he planned getting married and sent it home for safe-keeping. Then the Germans buried it when his house was hit by bombs. Buckingham came home and dug in the debris until he found it. Then he went out and got married.

LONDON — Somewhere in England a German town, complete with town hall and other municipal buildings, has been built in secret. There British and United States officers and men who will take over the municipal administration of German towns liberated from the Nazis are training for their work.

LONGTON, Eng., — When Sarah Topping was married in the little church here 58 years ago March 15 a friend gave her a Prayer Book at the wedding service. Mrs. Topping died recently, aged 87, and left \$225 to the church "to provide prayer books yearly for the six persons to be married after March 15 each year."

SYDENHAM, — Parents of Capt. P. Gardner, V. C. winner at Tobruk have heard that after escaping from a German prison camp he has been recaptured by the enemy. He spent some time in refuge in the Vatican and then left to try to rejoin his regiment.


