REMEMBRANCE CHURCH PARADE

Obligation to Those Who Served Emphasized by Rev. A. F. MacSween

"They forgot self and thought of us. How shall we fulfil our obligation to them?" So asked Rev. A. F. MacSween in his sermon in First Presbyterian Church yesterday morning when members of the Canadian Legion and of the Women's Auxiliary of the Legion attended on the occasion of their annual Armistice Day church parade. The obligation to those who served in the war in support of their ideals could best be fulfilled by hopefully constructive attitude based in Christian philosophy. When one viewed the avarice, pleasure seeking and even political jockeying which motivated the actions of many people today, there might appear to be some justification for a spirit of pessimism on one hand or that of undue optimism on the other. The title of Mr. MacSween's sermon was "Not in Vain." During the service there was a period of silent prayer in respect to the memory of the war dead by the sounding of the "Last Post" by Bugler William Rance who is also president of the Legion and the singing of the National Anthem. The Junior Choir, appropriately sang "Lest We Forget."

Members of the Legion, marshalled by Vice-president H. A. Ponder, marched from the headquarters on Third ave. together with some members of the Women's Auxiliary. The pipe band of the Sea Cadets led the parade, playing enlivening selections.

Last evening Rev. G. L. Douglas, naval padre, who is about to be moved from Prince Rupert, was the speaker in First Presbyterian Church. The Senior Choir sang "Thy Will Be Done" and J. A. Teng rendered "In Flanders Fields" as a vocal solo. There was special Remembrance Day prayer by the pastor.

Boy Steals Locomotive

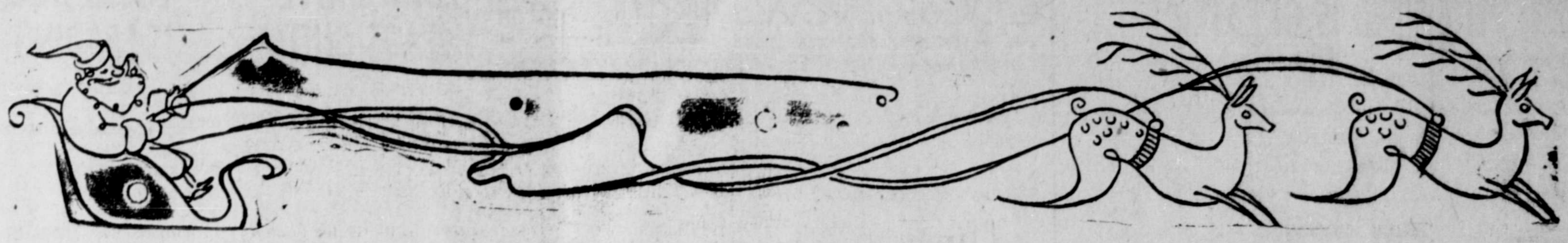
