Sum of \$1.753 Has Been Raised -Operator Being Sought.

The ambulance committee reported to the city council last night that total collections to date for the Ambulance Fund amounted to \$1,753. The ultimate cost of the ambulance is expected to be about \$5,000.

A group of ladies, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Alexander McKenzie, has volunteered to stage a tag day for the fund and Saturday, February 5, has

been set aside for this purpose.

The council adopted a recommendation that the city advertise for a man to assume responsibility for the operation of an ambulance on a twentyfour hour basis and that the successful applicant be given living quarters in the public rest room building, including heat. light and water in return for supervision and adequate care of the rest room. Applicants are to state salary required and to assume duties on February 1.


Customs and Excise Collections At Prince Rupert for 1943 Totalled \$723,535.21.




