NOTICE RE VOTERS LIST

Householders and Licenseholders may register for inclusion in the 1944-45 Voters List during the months of September and October.

HOUSEHOLDER includes any person 21 years of age who has resided in Prince Rupert City continuously since January, 1st, 1944 and (a) who has paid Poll Tax to the City for the year 1944 (b) who is not eligible to pay Toll Tax or Road Tax, but has paid \$2.00 for the use of the municipality.

NOTE-Any householder whose name appears on the 1943-44 Voters List and who has paid 1944 Poll Tax will not need to register.

LICENSE HOLDER means any male or female 21 years of age carrying on a business in the city who is the holder of a subsisting trades license, or is a member of a partnership carrying on business in the city and holding a subsisting license the annual fee for which is not less than five dollars for each partner.

NOTE-Any licenseholder who has previously registered as such and has continuously paid his license fee will not need to re-register.

CORPORATIONS whose names are on the Voters List may appoint a duly authorized agent to vote on their behalf. Such authorization must be in the hands of the City Clerk before 5 p.m. October 31st.




