MUTRIE WILL RETURN WITH PARENTS, AND MRS. KERGIN

After five years of service with the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps behind her, Nursing Sister Mrs. Randolph Mutrie, who was shipped down a gangway from the C.N.R. wharf by her friends to a car to take her home. Home for her is the residence of her parents, Dr. and Mrs. L. W. Mutrie, as a girl, Edith Mutrie.

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ELECTION POSSIBLE THIS NOVEMBER

OTTAWA, Aug. 2 (CP)—Names of seven special returning officers to conduct overseas voting has been announced in the capital city as the first move to prepare for the forthcoming dominion general election.

Their appointment makes it possible for Prime Minister King to call an election in November because election officials made it known the election would be somewhat less than four months after these officers were appointed before the election could be held.

Chinese Halt Jap Hengyang Drive

CHUNGKING, Aug. 2 (CP)—Chinese leaders have announced that their forces have stopped the enemy's advance at encircled Hengyang.

Troops on the outer ridge of the city gained to the east and west, and fighting is still in progress in all other sectors of the Hunan province front.

Japanese made two strong attempts in Yunnan province to break out of the encirclement at Tengchun but were repulsed with heavy casualties.

ALLIES ESTABLISHED WITHIN 600 MILES OF PHILIPPINES

ALLIED HQ., NEW GUINEA, Aug. 2 (CP)—Sanson beachhead at the northwestern end of Dutch New Guinea was expanded to 10 miles and Sanspor village was taken without resistance.

Capture of the Sanspor beach places the United States forces within 600 miles of the Philippines.

Again Permitting Manufacture Of Potable Spirits

OTTAWA, Aug. 2 (CP)—Canadian distilleries will be permitted to revert to the manufacture of potable spirits from time to time between now and the end of the year, Munitions Minister Howe said here.

In line with action taken in the United States in allowing distilleries to make potable alcohol for one month beginning today.

Plan Help for Pro Athletes After War

LONDON, Aug. 2—Steps to help British professional football players of peacetime days, who will be too old for big league soccer when the war is over, are being taken by the Football Association, ruling body of the sport.

A committee has been set up to examine the post-war prospects of professionals and to plan means of obtaining positions for them.

Out to Popularize Distance Cycling

LONDON, Aug. 2—The British League of Racing Cyclists, a new body with ambitious designs, plans an immediate attempt to popularize long-distance cycling so that with the coming of peace British riders will be on an equal competitive basis with long-distance continental cyclists.

Three-day cycle races are scheduled for many parts of the country during the next few months. One of the first, over a 265-mile course, will start from Lewisham during the August Bank holiday and finish at the same point three days later. A post-war project involves a 1,400-mile race which experts consider should be covered in about 10 days.

Why Waste Shells?

WITH THE R.C.A.F. OVERSEAS, Aug. 2 (CP)—Before two members of an R.C.A.F. squadron took off from their forward airfield in France on a cannon firing test, they decided this could most effectively be carried out over enemy lines rather than over the sea. As a result they shot up five enemy vehicles south of Caen.

The two were Pilot Officer William Warfield, of New York City, and Flying Officer Harry LeBlond of Moose Jaw and Vancouver.

SHOES FOR DOGS

LONDON (CP)—Animal welfare organizations are planning to provide all dogs in the flying bomb areas of Southern England with home-made "shoes" to guard their feet from glass splinters.

Earlier End to War Is Seen By Prime Minister Churchill

Reich Sees Turkey as New Enemy

LONDON, Aug. 2 (CP)—Turkey broke off diplomatic and economic relations with Germany today and Berlin broadcasts said the action must be regarded as a prelude to war.

This setback for Germany swiftly followed a governmental shift in Finland with the moving of Marshal Baron Mannerheim to the presidency.

This is believed to be the first step toward taking Finland out of the war.

GERMANS BRUTALLY MURDER 19 CANADA'S SOLDIERS IN FRANCE

OTTAWA, Aug. 2 (CP)—Nineteen Canadian soldiers were brutally murdered by Nazi troops fighting in Normandy, Prime Minister Mackenzie King told the House of Commons today.

He said a court of inquiry had stated that one officer and 18 men taken prisoners were murdered by German units under the direction of their officers.

This action is in flagrant violation of international law.

German and Japanese Recoil On All Fronts

Prime Minister Pays Tribute to Russian Army for Doing the Most in "Tearing the Guts Out of the German Army"

LONDON, Aug. 2 (CP)—Prime Minister Churchill told the house of commons today he felt the end of the war would come much sooner than he once had expected.

On every battle front armies of Germany and Japan are recoiling, he pointed out.

"I am increasingly left to feel that the interval between the defeat of Hitler and the defeat of Japan will be shorter, perhaps much shorter, than I at one time supposed," Churchill said with enthusiasm.

Traffic Tie-Up As Whites and Negroes Clash

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 2 (CP)—Negroes clashed with white automobile and truck drivers in a flare up attendant upon a tie-up of the Philadelphia Public Transport system.

Two hundred and fifty traffic and motorcycle police and auxiliary police were sent out to restore order in a two-block area.

C.I.O. Union spokesmen claimed the tie-up was efforts of enemy agents to instigate race riots.

Shed Clothing On Anniversary Of Pacificism Pledge

BRILLIANT, B.C., Aug. 2 (CP)—Seven naked Doukhobors here celebrated the forty-ninth anniversary of their ancestors' burning of firearms as a token of pacifism in a ceremony in front of 300 co-religionists gathered around the tomb of Peter Lordy Irving I and Peter Verigin II that was blasted by dynamite last week.

Five middle aged women and two men participated in the strip demonstration. All were members of the radical Sons of Freedom sect.

WAR END BY SEPT. 15

LONDON—Anthony Eden said today there was a possibility of a German military collapse by September, but admitted surrender of the army could come before then.

ADMITS ROMMEL WOUNDED

BERLIN—German DNE news agency admitted Field Marshal Rommel had been injured while driving along the Normandy front but he was now out of danger. He suffered a brain concussion.

HONORABLE ARMISTICE STOCKHOLM

A report reaching here says Marshal Baron Mannerheim, new president of Finland, had received assurance from the Russians that an honorable armistice can be effected.

POLES RISING UP

LONDON—Strong Polish forces are understood to be clashing with the Germans in the streets of Warsaw, now besieged by heavy Russian forces.

HOSPITAL FOR VETERANS

OTTAWA—The minister of pensions announced today plans were being laid for a new hospital for war veterans to be built on the Jubilee hospital grounds at Victoria, B.C. He said no date for the construction had been set.

INSEPARABLE BUDDIES

Two almost inseparable flying officers in the R.C.A.F. are among the busiest ground crew operatives in the service of Britain. They are Flying Officer Walter Morris, Grimsby Ont., and Flying Officer W. J. Mackenzie, Sask. They joined the R.C.A.F. together, trained together, and crossed to Britain together in December, 1942. Here they were separated for six months, but came unexpectedly together again when both were posted to the same establishment in Bomber Group. They are radio officers.

Montreal Tramway Strike Hour Is Set

MONTREAL, Aug. 2—The Montreal tramway and bus strike is scheduled to start tomorrow at midnight.

READY FOR EMERGENCY

LONDON (CP)—The Home Office announced that arrangements have been completed for overseas flotillas of National Fire Service fireboats to be on call for fire fighting in continental ports and harbors in support of army fire boats.

King George Decorates B.C. Major

WITH CANADIANS IN ITALY, Aug. 2 (CP)—King George of Great Britain today personally decorated Major John Mahony of New Westminster with the Victoria Cross.

The ceremony took place before representative Canadian troops.

Major Paul Triquet, V.C. of Eastern Canada, also was in attendance.

Greatest Credit Is Due Russian Armies

The First American Army advancing down the Atlantic coast "might well be approaching the important railway centre of Rennes," Mr. Churchill suggested, expressing the hope that operations of utmost vigor would be continued in Italy. While things were going well there, he said, "it is the Russian Army who have done the most work in tearing the guts out of the German Army."

Mr. Churchill disclosed 4745 persons had been killed by rocket bombs, with 14,000 injured and 17,000 homes bombed since the attacks began June 15.

He said the Germans were warned that the indiscriminate use of rocket bombs would result in an appreciable increase in their punishment.

HELSINKI, Aug. 2—Baron Mannerheim accepted the premiership of beleaguered Finland as the Russian forces broke through to the Baltic.

North Carolina Is Hit by Hurricane

WILMINGTON, N.C., Aug. 2—A hurricane has swept the coast of North Carolina causing widespread property damage and injury to a number of persons. Huge waves crumpled summer resorts along the beaches.

VICTORIA, Aug. 2—Following a muster parade and medical inspection in the morning, Prince Rupert Machine Gun Regiment settled down to 10 days of intensive training in ack ack and machine gunnery this afternoon.

The personnel of the regiment are finding army life very comfortable in the huts of Gordon Head Camp which once was used as an officers' training establishment.

Thousands of Germans Trapped as Red Armies Plunge to Baltic Sea

Nazis Battling Fiercely as Their Position Becomes Desperate

MOSCOW, Aug. 2 (CP)—Thousands of Germans trapped in Latvia and Estonia by the swift Russian plunge to the Baltic Sea, 30 miles west of Riga, thrashed at the Red forces in the north today.

Other Nazis fought vigorously in defence of besieged Warsaw, Poland's capital.

The irresistible Russians opened a new drive on East Prussia on a 200-mile front.

They have now cut and are astride all railroads and highways leading from the Baltic states to East Prussia.

Germans are making a determined effort everywhere to stop the Reds.

GOVERNMENT MAY TAKE OVER HALIFAX YARDS

OTTAWA, Aug. 2 (CP)—Prime Minister W. D. Mackenzie King has announced that Canada will assume full costs of air line installations in the northern part of the dominion to the amount of \$120,000,000 in Canadian funds.

Labor Minister Mitchell said consideration will be given the suggestion that the government take over the strike-bound ship yards of Halifax.

To Award Prize For Radio Script

TORONTO, Aug. 2 (CP)—The Canadian Women's Press Club has announced that its annual memorial award will be made in 1944-45 in the field of radio writing. This is the first time in the 15 years' history of the award that radio writing has been considered.

The award, in the form of an engraved gold medal and a cheque for \$25, has been made in previous years for articles, short stories, biographical sketches or similar types of magazine or news writing. Winner of the 1943-44 award was Margaret Ecker of the London Bureau of The Canadian Press.

Kathleen McDowell, chairman of the C.W.P.C. award committee, said it was felt that as well as giving recognition to one classification of the club membership, the field was one in which a large number of journalists and other women writers were active.

Subject for the award is "The Post-War Woman," a radio talk setting forth some practical suggestions of what contribution Canadian women should make to help win the peace or build a better world. The script must be 1000 to 2500 words, broadcast in Canada in the year ending March 15, 1945.

The writer must be a woman, resident of Canada for one year. Judgment will be based on the general literary value of the broadcast speech, not on delivery, which need not be the writer. Scripts must be submitted with a certificate of date of broadcast signed by station manager.

Entries, up to March 20, 1945, will be accepted by Mrs. McDowell (320 Spadina Road, Toronto), from whom competition rules are obtainable.

Urges Protection Of Forest Assets

VANCOUVER, Aug. 2 — "The forests of Canada are the most valuable natural resource that we possess" declared Dr. Norman McKenzie, newly-appointed president of the University of British Columbia, who has just arrived at Vancouver from his recent post as president of the University of New Brunswick. His message was in response to a request from the Canadian Forestry Association.

"This is not only because of their present importance" added President McKenzie, "but because with the minimum of care they are constantly reproducing themselves in a way that an. Scientific knowledge suggests that we are only now beginning to understand how valuable this resource is and how many things we can do with it and make of it. I predict that in the not very distant future the bulk of our forest products will be processed and put to a wide variety of uses and that the forests will continue to be one of our greatest wealth producers. All of which is of course based on the assumption that we have the intelligence to manage and conserve our forests wisely and the intelligence and industry too to preserve them from three great enemies—fire, forest insects and ruthless exploitation."

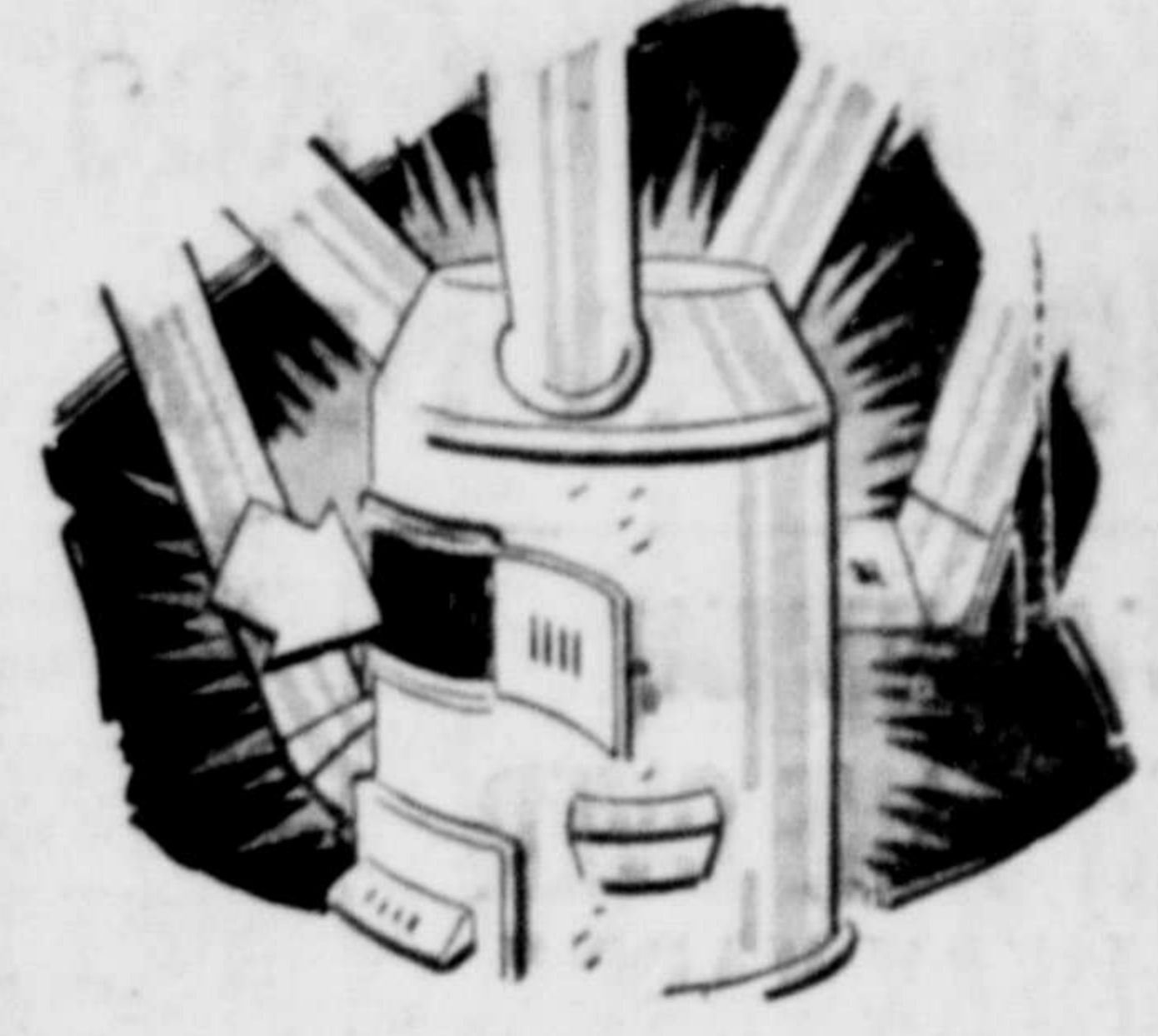

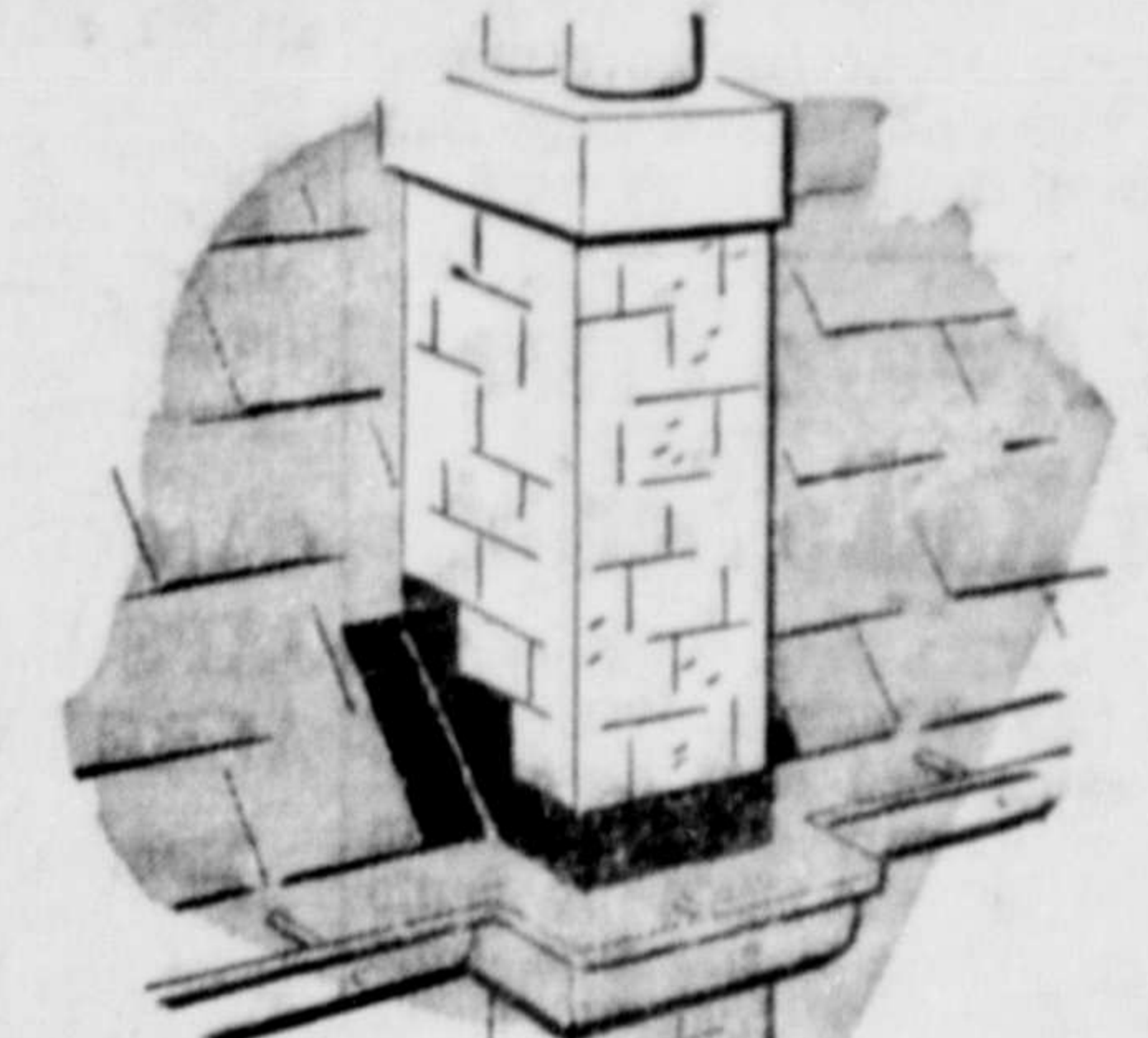

Retiring Civic Treasurer and His Wife Are Presented with Wristwatch and Handbag at Testimonial Dinner

Present and past mayor and aldermen of Prince Rupert paid honor to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Vickers at a testimonial dinner last evening in the Commodore Cafe when speakers referred to the couple, leaving shortly to make their home in England, as "two outstanding citizens of this community."

Mayor H. M. Daggett, on behalf of the gathering of 30, presented Mr. Vickers with a wristwatch in recognition of his faithful and efficient service to the city since 1919. Mr. Vickers is retiring as city treasurer.

Ald. Mrs. N. E. Arnold presented Mrs. Vickers with a fine leather handbag.

The couple will join their married daughter in England and intend to live in Sherwood Forest, Nottingham.

Pioneer Leaders Esteem Mr. Vickers

Most of the men who gathered to honor Mr. and Mrs. Vickers came to Prince Rupert 30 years ago and in civic affairs had come to know Mr. Vickers well for his conscientiousness and helpfulness.

P. H. Linzey, former alderman, remarked with a laugh that this was the first occasion in his knowledge that a tax collector had ever been feted and buffeted.

Presiding at the dinner, Mayor Daggett remarked on the esteem with which the couple were regarded and the fine reputation of Mr. Vickers. His Worship suggested they might decide to return here and if they did the people of Prince Rupert would be glad to welcome them back.

Waterfront Whiffs

Spring Salmon Run Best Since 1925

—22 Cents a Pound, Dressed—70-Pounder Caught on Skeena

While no outstanding catches were landed during the spring salmon season just closed, Skeena river fishermen consider it the best season since the huge runs stopped about 1925. However, catches were generally better than in recent years, and with prices at 22 cents a pound for dressed fish, even small catches were profitable.

General opinion was that the springs were a bit bigger than usual. At least three of outstanding size were taken during the season. Even bigger than the publicized 66-pounder caught by Henry Reid of Port Essington was a red spring landed by O. Ness of Sunnyside. This monster weighed out at 70 pounds. Nelson Brew of Haysport caught a 62½ pound spring.

Sockeye fishing on the Skeena continues so good that many of the Naas River fishermen have deserted the northern river to get in on a good thing. The average last week was 250 fish per boat.

Gardiner Canal had a two weeks run of sockeye. The fish caught there averaged about two pounds heavier than those on the Skeena, and brought about a dollar a fish. Sockeye caught on the Skeena averaged in the neighborhood of 75 cents a fish.

Humpback, or pink salmon have begun to run on the Skeena and last week's average was about 200 to the boat.

Because pilchard fishing on the west coast of Vancouver Island is so poor, Vancouver fishermen are taking a holiday. Several big seiners and tenders have headed for Vancouver to wait for the fish to appear. They claim the holiday will be justified because it is likely that there will be no lay up between the delayed pilchard season and the herring season which follows.

The canned sockeye pack in District 2 for the week ending July 22 totalled 99,380 cases, of which 63,673 cases were packed in canneries along the Naas and Skeena rivers. Total sockeye pack for the coast was 107,492 cases.

The Naas and Skeena canneries landed 1,844 cases of spring salmon, 8,252 cases of pink, 4,771 cases of chums, and 3,965 cases of coho.

Total pack, all types, for the coast was 144,048 cases.
