Guns Bunker Cities As Allies Approach

Destruction Unmatched Since Thirty Years' War May Desolate Germany

Captured Officers Affirm "No Surrender"

PARIS, April 10 (CP)—Field dispatches from the western front all indicate that the Germans are ushering in a period of destruction unmatched since the Thirty Years War in the Seventeenth Century.

Mysterious fires are raging in the north German cities of Hamburg, Hanover and Brunswick. One explanation is that the Germans themselves are putting to the torch cities which they appear unable to defend in the path of the Allied tide.

VIENNA BATTLE IN FINAL STAGE

MOSCOW, April 10 (CP)—The battle for the Austrian capital of Vienna is entering its final stages. Red Army shock troops have overrun the heart of the big cultural centre, and its capture is expected at any moment. The Germans are reported to have fought to the death through more than three-quarters of the city behind street barricades and other impromptu fortifications.

Other Red Army troops have cleaned up the newly-captured East Prussian citadel of Koeningberg. This cradle of Prussian militarism capitulated little more than 36 hours after Marshal Vasilevsky's Third White Russian Army group began an all-out assault.

Hitler's Werewolves Are Poor Guerillas

LONDON, April 10 (CP)—There is some evidence today to bear out the belief that Hitler's new murder society—the Werewolves—is a flop so far as effective guerilla opposition to the Allies is concerned. The Nazi underground organization has terrorized some sections of the German civilian population which has co-operated with Allied armies. But there has been almost no sabotage of the Allied military efforts or assassinations of Allied soldiers.

WINTER HAS LAST FLING

Unseasonable Weather Is Experienced in Central Interior

PRINCE GEORGE, April 10—It is not April showers but December-like blizzards which this part of the country experienced during the week-end as Old Man Winter staged a counter-attack. Fresh snow fell all the way from the Bulkley Valley to the Alberta boundary. Between Prince George and Jasper there was a swirling wind. The lakes are all frozen over still and only the swiftest flowing parts of the river are open. All in all, it is quite unseasonable weather for April but it is undoubtedly only the last fling of winter.

ASK EXCLUSION OF JAPANESE

VANCOUVER, April 10 (CP)—Total exclusion of all Japanese from Canada and re-establishment of any who have claims on Canada "in some suitable part of the South Pacific area under international mandate or allied control" was demanded by the Native Sons of British Columbia in a resolution passed at their annual meeting here. The resolution recommended all persons of Japanese origin be barred from admittance to Canada to take up permanent residence at any time in the future.

ST. MICHAEL'S LEAD

MONTREAL, April 10 (CP)—Toronto St. Michael's won from Montreal Royals 4-3 last night giving Toronto a 3-2 lead in the best out of seven in the Sunbear 9 11 Eastern Canadian Junior hockey finals.

The Allied avalanche shows no sign of slowing up. Four Allied armies now are racing for the Elbe River in what some correspondents refer to as the Berlin Derby. The Elbe is the last big stream before the Nazi capital. Whether the Germans are capable of making a stand along the Elbe is a question that may find an answer in a few days. The nearest Allied spearhead is only 70 miles from the river after breaking into the province of Brunswick.

Word from the front this morning reveals the capture by Allied troops of the town of Breckenheim, some thirty miles to the northeast of Karlsruhe. At the north end of the line, the Canadian First Army has split in two a 150-mile front in Holland, thus forming two pockets in which approximately 80,000 German troops are trapped.

One unit of the Canadian Army made an overnight gain of ten miles. Advancing against only light opposition, a battle group of the Fourth Canadian Armored Division has reached a point twenty-five miles south of Emmen and the North Sea coast.

Netherlands underground leaders say starving Netherlanders are leaving the cities of Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and the Hague by the thousands. They are streaming hopefully towards the Canadian lines in East Holland. In Amsterdam alone, it is said, the civilians are dying from malnutrition at the rate of 400 a day.

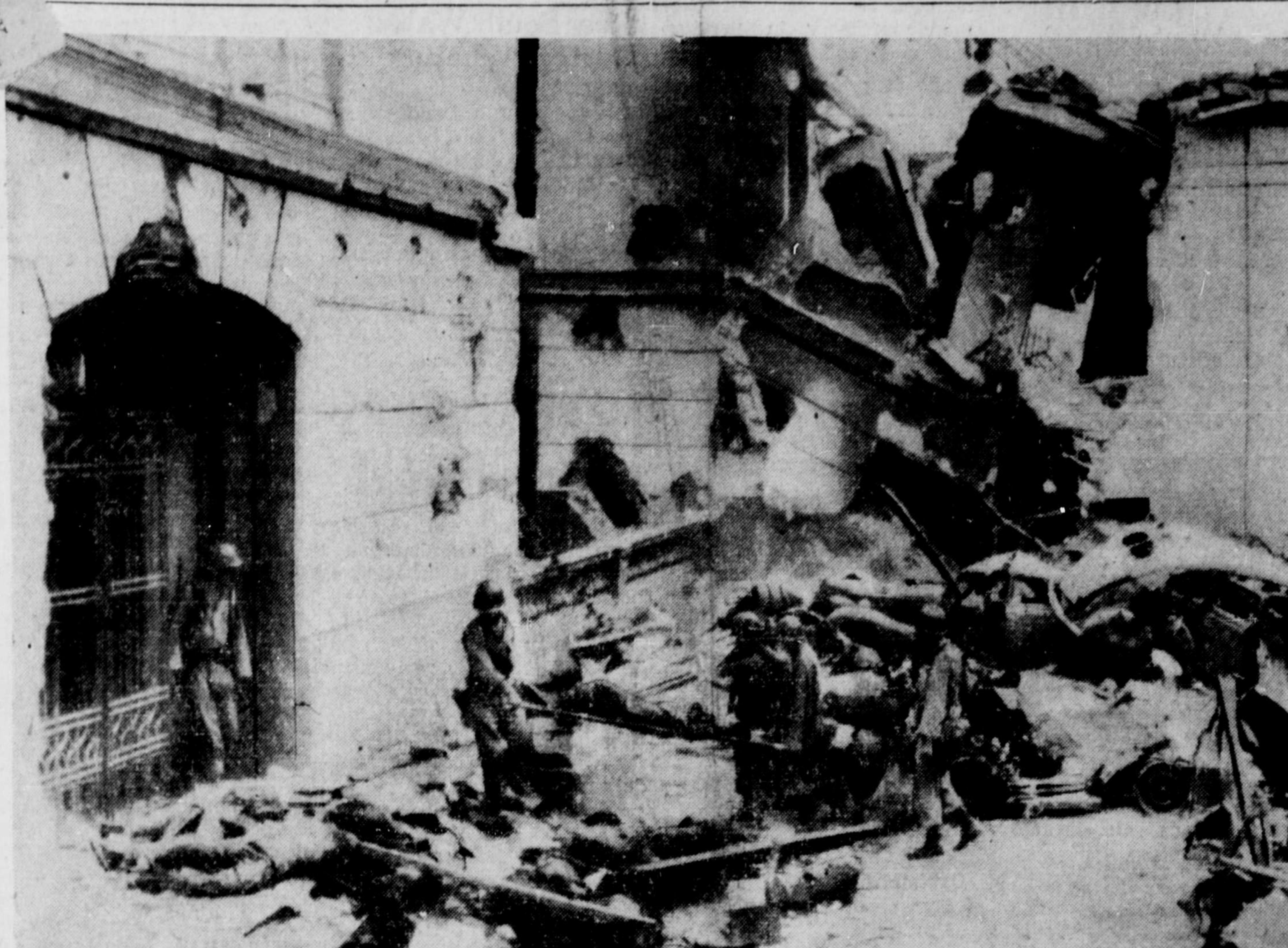
PARIS, April 10 (CP)—Captured Nazi officers have flabily stated there will be no formal surrender by the German High Command. These enemy officers concede that the German Army may give up piecemeal or disintegrate, but they point out that since the Wehrmacht is under the thumbs of fanatical Nazis, resistance can be expected to go on to the bitter end.

In a recent statement, General Eisenhower said such prolonged resistance was not only possible but might be expected. Nevertheless, there is a growing feeling that at some time during the process of enemy disintegration, the Allied supreme commander may declare all organized warfare with Germany at an end.

Associated Press correspondent Wes Gallagher says there is a possibility General Eisenhower may issue such a proclamation when the western and eastern front are merged. Such a declaration, says Gallagher, would give German soldiers one of two choices — they could either surrender and be treated as prisoners of war or continue fighting as guerrillas. If they choose the latter course, they have no legal status under international law.

Quebec Member Sees Propaganda

OTTAWA, April 10 (CP) — A prediction that total conscription will be applied in Canada for the Pacific war came last night from the Independent member of Parliament for La-val-Two Mountains — Ligouri Lacombe. Mr. Lacombe said the government statement that participation in the Pacific war will be on a voluntary basis is only election propaganda.

3 KILLED IN PLANE CRASH

SAINT HYACINTHE, Quebec, April 10 (CP)—Three lives were lost and 16 were injured in the crash of a Liberator bomber near Sainte Hyacinthe, Quebec, late yesterday. One of those killed was a civilian on the ground. He was electrocuted when he tried to reach the plane which burned after hitting the ground. There were 11 passengers and seven crew members. The bomber was on a routine flight when the accident occurred. It was based at Dorval airport, near Montreal.

Bulletins

TO ANNOUNCE ELECTION DATE

OTTAWA—Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced in the House of Commons Monday he will be prepared to announce the date of the next federal election within 48 hours after the present session is finished.

MAY START PINE PASS HIGHWAY

VICTORIA—Hon. Herbert Anscomb, Minister of Public Works, announced Monday that if the costs were reasonable the government would make a start on the Pine Pass highway to the Peace River block this summer. The job is expected to cost about \$6,000,000. It will include 234 miles of road from Summit Lake to Dawson Creek.

VANCOUVER YARD TO CLOSE

VANCOUVER—The Burrard South Shipyards will close at the end of this year, John Dalrymple, superintendent of the yard, announced Monday. The yard is now building two maintenance ships. Two transport ferries also are to be built as well as six China coaster type freighters before the shutdown. The yard employs about 1,800 men.

FORESEE EARLY CRISIS

LONDON—Informed political observers in London freely forecast an early break-up of Britain's coalition government. They say a general election will be precipitated before the end of July.

END OF HOSTILITIES

DAMASCUS—The Syrian Prime Minister, Fayez el Khoury, said in the Chamber of Deputies today that he has received information from high allied sources that news of the cessation of hostilities in Europe is imminent. The announcement was greeted with great excitement by the Syrian people.

JAPS TAKE CHINESE BASE

CHUNGKING—The Chinese high command has acknowledged that Japanese troops have entered Low-Ho Kow, an advanced base to the north formerly used by the American air force.

MILITARY VEHICLES TO BE SOLD

VANCOUVER—Officials of the War Assets corporation have announced that 150 army vehicles will be placed on the civilian markets next week.

POST-WAR AVIATION

NASSAU, Bahamas, (CP)—Large scale post-war aviation plans for the Bahamas have recently been revealed by the Hon. Sidney Farrington, chairman of the Bahamas' development board. Six airlines proposed to include Nassau in their itineraries. The time tables will include New York in five hours and Montreal in six hours.

SET UP FUTURE OF CANADA NOW

SEIGNIORY CLUB, Quebec, April 10 (CP)—The chairman of the Canadian Legion's committee of education, Wilfred Bovey, says "Now is the time for us to set up the Canada of the next 500 years." Mr. Bovey was addressing the opening session of the re-assimilation conference. The conference is meeting at the Seignior Club in Quebec City to consider problems of re-establishing exservicemen in industry. The 125 delegates attending are executives of large Canadian industries and representatives of government departments.

KING NAMES CONFERENCE DELEGATES

OTTAWA, April 10 (CP)—Prime Minister King has announced the composition of the Canadian delegation to the San Francisco security conference.

PEARKES MAY ENTER POLITICS

VANCOUVER, April 10 (CP)—There is a possibility that Major General A. G. Pearkes, V.C., former general officer commanding the Pacific command is to enter federal politics. He said that he had been approached with a view to contesting the Nanaimo constituency but has not yet given a definite answer. Progressive-Conservatives are to hold a nominating convention at Duncan on Saturday to choose a candidate for the Nanaimo riding.

CHILDREN BURNED

PORT McNEIL, April 10 (CP)—Two children, Earl Ramey, aged 3, and his infant sister, Rae, were burned to death on Monday when a fire destroyed their home here. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Y. L. Ramey suffered burns.

War News Highlights

New Landing In Ryukyu Chain

SAN FRANCISCO—The Japanese radio said today that American forces have made another landing in the Ryukyu Island chain, just five miles from Okinawa Island. The Americans are reported by Tokyo to have landed on Tsukata Island. The desperate Japanese defenders of southern Okinawa are giving ground slowly amidst the heaviest artillery duel of the Pacific War.

Argentina Back In Fold of Friendly Nations

WASHINGTON, April 10 (CP)—The American family of nations has welcomed home Argentina after 13 months of exclusion. The South American nation was placed outside the pale of friendly relations on the ground that her government co-operated with the Axis.

British Military Casualties 500,000

LONDON, April 10 (CP)—The British armed forces suffered 502,396 casualties, including 216,287 dead, up to the end of February, Prime Minister Churchill told the House of Commons Tuesday.

NAZI GOLD TO BE IMPOUNDED

WASHINGTON, April 10 (CP)—Officials in Washington have commented on the find of untold treasure in the German salt mine at Merkers. American officials say the treasures will be impounded. All the gold bullion as well as currency will be turned over to the United Commission to decide what should be done with it. Such identifiable loot, as paintings, will be returned to the countries from which they were stolen by the Nazis.

Grim German Humor . . .

There is still some humor left in Germany. Consider, for instance, the German prisoner of 52 years who, asked by an American officer what a man of his age was doing in the army, replied: "I'm a member of the Hitler Youth." He was a blood brother of the Volksturm troopers recently reported by this newspaper as having posted a sign on their fortification

reading, Wir alten Affen sind die Wunderwaffen (We old monkeys are the wonder weapon).

But it is not the jolly, carefree wit of the now almost legendary Germany of the days before the World Wars. For some time it has been sardonic, the best jokes being pointed at the Nazi Party leaders, not excluding Der Fuhrer. Now it has a bitter tone — the humor of desperation. If it indicates disillusionment, an understanding of how the German people let themselves be duped, it is a good sign.

An example of Nazi contrariness is the fact that while orthodox criminals are recorded as having "salted" gold mines, none have even been caught hiding their gold in a salt mine.

REDS FIGHT IN VIENNA

MOSCOW, April 10 — Red Army troops fighting in the streets of Vienna are only one mile from the heart of the Austrian capital. The Moscow radio has broadcast an appeal to the Austrian people to cease resistance. The Moscow broadcast declared that Russia regards the Austrian people as friends, and stated that the Soviet Union has no designs on Austrian territory.

The Russians also have announced the capture of 15,000 more prisoners in operations against Koenigsberg, the capital of East Prussia.

C.N.R. Employees Contribute \$5000 To Red Cross

VANCOUVER, April 10 — Employees in the British Columbia district of the Canadian National Railways made a good showing in the Red Cross campaign with total subscriptions of \$5,258 comparing with \$5,066 in the previous campaign, it is announced by W. T. Moodie, general superintendent.

The railway's western region as a whole registered an increase of 11 percent with a total of \$42,545.

New South Wales Revives Whaling

SYDNEY, Australia, April 10 — Revival of the whaling industry off the New South Wales coast has been recommended to the federal government by the Australian agricultural council. The council envisages the production of 4,000 tons of dehydrated whale meat, 1,000 tons of meat meal and 1,000 tons of organic fertilizer a year.

CHURCH CLEARS INDEBTEDNESS

The pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church announced to his congregation Sunday that through the special Easter offering an amount sufficient to completely liquidate the indebtedness of the Church building had been received. He also announced to all present that a mortgage burning service is being planned for the 22nd of April.

Plans for a new House of Worship for St. Paul's congregation had been in the minds of many of its members for several years, while definite steps were not taken before the latter part of 1940. Solicitation for funds was begun in the first months of 1941 and actual construction got under way in June of the same year. The building was completed in March, 1943, and Dedication took place on March 28, 1943. The first service was held at Christmas, 1942.

The new church came into use at a time when Prince Rupert experienced a great influx of people, both civilians and service personnel. Because of its ready location many strangers availed themselves of worshiping in the church of their choice. St. Paul's church earned the name of "The Service Men's Church" as it maintained an all around average attendance of more than 50 service personnel a Sunday for over two years. On Festival days this figure would go over 100.

As soon as the downstairs was made available it was converted into a Service Centre which is still in operation daily. Actual cost of operation is made possible through the National Lutheran Council with headquarters in New York. The local Centre is one of 85 other Centres throughout Canada, United States, Great Britain, China, Alaska and Hawaii. In as much as it is supported by Lutherans throughout Canada and United States these Centres are open to all Faiths.

The church structure was built at a cost of more than \$19,000. Except for a gift of \$2000, the entire amount has been raised locally by members and friends of the congregation. It is significant to note that just two years, almost to the day after the church was dedicated the building was entirely free of debt.

Rev. J. H. Myrskog, former pastor, who took an active part in the initial plans of building and financing the new church has been invited to be present at the Mortgage burning service April 22. Rev. Roy E. Olson of Ketchikan is also expected to attend.

Although the congregation and pastor are well pleased with the progress made in paying off all obligations incurred in the building program, they feel that much more should be done. A considerable amount towards a new organ has been set aside, as well as two lots for a parsonage. The congregation is also planning on new chancel fixtures to include altar, altar rail, pulpit and baptismal font. Light fixtures through the church auditorium as well as a decorating job are included in the plans for the future.
