#### Germans to Leave Italy Chairman Thorsteinsson favor-

ROME-General Mark Clark, Allied commander in Italy, declared today that a German retreat northwards was inevitable sooner or later and ordered patriots to stand by to strike at a moment's notice to hamper withdrawal.

#### Berlin and Hanover Today

LONDON-A fleet of approximately 950 heavy bombers and 350 fighters in escort attacked Berlin and Hanover today. Berlin had undergone its thirty-sixth consecutive raid Tuesday night. Armament plants in Berlin and Hanover were the targets for today's raids.

MANILA — The war against Japan moves ahead with a new invasion in the Philippines. This time it is relentlessly Cebu, one of the two large islands still held by the Japanese in the Philippine chain. General MacArthur's troops are moving towards Cebu city, which is burning from Japanese demolitions. Japanese broadcasts continue to speak of ground operations in the Ryukyu islands. No Allied source has mentioned a landing in the islands. Other Tokyo broadcasts tell of a B-29 attack on southern Japan.

Evacuate Berlin As Allies Near

LONDON, March 28 (CP)—A DNB broadcast said today that Berlin will be evacuated of all persons not needed in the capital. This announcement was made as the German High Command said that United States Third Army tanks had crashed into Gemenden and five miles farther to the northeast toward Grawfendorf, 213 miles southwest of Berlin. The United States First Army has reached the Giessen area, 225 miles from the capital. Four American armies have linked up on the western front. The British Second Army is running wild and has reached Dortmund Canal. Canadians have entered Emmerich on the north.



#### No Time to Modify . . .

. Some experts in the field of international affairs are saying that the forthcoming San Francisco parley of the United Nations may want to urge a modification of the unconditional surrender terms agreed on by the Big Three for Germany and presumably to be applied likewise to the Japanese.

One war should have taught us the folly of pampering the militaristic nations and letting them off without learning what war really means. No major battles were fought on German soil in 1918, German homes and facteries escaped undamaged and, even when reparations payments were forced, readjustments and moratoria were allowed. As for the extra lives it is costing us to whip Germany this time, the only reply is that this cost probably will be much less, in both lives and men, than fighting Germany again 25 or 30 years from now if she escapes punishment this time.




