New Westminster . . .


The advocates of "sound" government will derive satisfaction from the result of the New Westminster provincial by-election on Thursday in which the coalition government's candidate, Byron Johnson, won an overwhelming and almost clear majority over three opposing candidates. By virtue of his success, Mr. Johnson became the first coalition candidate to be elected in this province. There had been coalition candidates in by-elections since the coalition government was formed but none had before been successful. Even though New Westminster might have been considered a "safe" seat, the size of the majority which Mr. Johnson was accorded will be of considerable encouragement to the Hart government which, before long, will have to go to the people.

There may not be a great deal of significance in the New Westminster by-election result in relation to the forthcoming federal election unless it might be taken as an indication of the waning fortunes of the over-trained C.C.F. The Labor-Progressive candidate, it is to be noted, took quite a substantial block of votes which the C.C.F., of course, will claim would have gone to them had he (the Labor-Progressive) not been in the field. On the other hand, it could be suggested that the growing strength of the Labor-Progressive movement might be taken as an indication of weakness of the C.C.F. which appears to be losing ground owing to its tendencies toward dictatorship and its stand on the Japanese question.

"Boss" Johnson, the new member for New Westminster, who succeeds the late Hon. A. Wells Gray, is no stranger to the Legislature. He was member for Victoria from 1933 to


