British and Indian Troops Go Ashore at Batavia

SINGAPORE, Sept. 29 (CP) -British and Indian troops began landings at Batavia in Java today, it was officially announced here. The troops were sent to Java to rescue prisoners of war and internees and disarm the Japanese.

The British commander said the British and Indian troops will not become involved in internal politics. The Indonesian "republican government" will not be expelled but rather it will be expected to continue civil administration of areas not occupied by British forces.

Japanese troops will be used to maintain law and order until the administration can be handed back to the Dutch.



There is no doubt that there is little general sympathy with the dealers who have arbitrarily and petutantly chosen to close shop rather than be bothered with the ration coupons and tokens.

Fortunately, Prince Rupert butchers have been sensible in the matter so this city will not share in the unfavorable flavor that undoubtedly associates itself with the names of those communities whose butchers have so selfishly acted in the face of moral issue.

Certainly, none of us like being rationed. Certainly no businesses like to be burdened with the tasks involved in ration accounting. But most of us are sensible enough to realize that we are suffering little in comparison with the poor people of those countries whom our government is inspired in helping even if it may be a little awkward in going about it.

What Canada did in the war effort, sometimes in face of severe criticism, may be expected to be equalized in the new problems of peace. Any efforts to obstruct the government in these efforts cannot hope for success.

As for meat rationing, it is significant that the principal critics of the government on normal matters agree that meat rationing is justified and none are rising to the support of those who have acted so selfishly in resisting it.



> gestion which, if it were put into tween the International Fisheffect, might give this port all eries commission and west coast halibut fishermen will be held this fall in Seattle at a date not yet announced and it is likely that the subject of beam trawlers dragging on the halibut grounds will be introduced. Since the Commission has jurisdiction only over the halibut fisheries it is reasonable to assume that the fishermen may ask that the powers of the Commision be broadened to include beam trawlers.

Halibut men are almost unanimous in the opinion that beam trawlers damage the halibut grounds. They do it by indiscriminately dragging in young halibut and the smaller fish on which the halibut feed, the line fishermen say. In addition, black cod catches dwindle in areas worked by the trawlers. To prove it, they hold up an official report on beam trawl operations and their effect on black cod catches off the American mainland coast. This report says that in 1,500,000 pounds of black cod caught by beam trawlers in a recent season there were more individual fish than there were in 11,000,000 pounds of black cod caught by line fishermen in the same season. The implication is that there are destroyed millions of young fish which otherwise would grow large and end their careers on the hooks of the long line fishermen. What sort of compromise will eventually result from these claims remains to be seen.


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
