MOTHER AND FIVE CHILDREN ARE KILLED BY JAPANESE FLYING BOMB

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 31 (P)-Robert Patterson, United States Under Secretary of War, disclosed today that a mother and five of her children were killed by a bomb from one of the long-range Japanese balloons sporadically attacking the west-

ern part of North America. Patterson said he was citing the incident of the woman and children to emphasize the need for precautions. He said that six were killed and the incident occurred in a western state but gave no names or other details except that the tragedy occurred when one of the children began playing with an unexploded bomb dropped by one of 100 unnamed paper balloons.

However, in spite of the intervention order, efforts of London and Washington to end the strife have not yet become effective. A Cairo dispatch says that French and Arabs are clashing all over the country. One account from Jerusalem says that the Arabs have captured the town of Darra, 60 miles south of Damascus, and have taken 500 French prisoners.

The Paris radio said today that there has been no fighting in Labanon but that the situation in Syria remains unchanged.

The two Levant states, both members of the United Nations, resent French troops in their countries. Both Britain and the United States are supporting the independence of the two countries. The French claim that they need bases in the Levant for their own security and for the war against Japan.

Today at Washington President Truman approved Great Britain's intervention in Syria and the United States Department of State has sent a note to France requesting that the stand toward Syria and Lebanon be reviewed.



the government acted wisely in instituting such controls and while we may not always have agreed on the means by which they were maintained, many of them stand out in their effectiveness as a pattern to other countries.

However, with the feelings of relief we watch for the removal of these regimented regulations and the return of our former freedom. Already, there are signs of this. No longer does a women require official permission to secure or change her employment. She may select her sphere of service, instead of being directed by officialdom. While men are not yet allowed such freedom of action, we hope the day is not far off when equal freedom of choice will once more be the privilege of the individual.

People have learned much from the experience of the last five years. For example, they know the merit and inconvenience of "cash and carry" as against an accumulation of unpaid bills, or the folly of fifty miles an hour when thirty is suffi-

We believe that in future many citizens will be found exercising a wise, personal control over wastage of effort, or materials, or idle extravagance. Such self-imposed discipline will prove of far greater worth to the country, than the coldly impersonal and therefore often unfair result of government control.
