### Russia Gets Three Seats

Harmony Being Achieved at 'Frisco—Chairman Question Settled

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28 (CP)—The United Nations achieved enough harmony at their San Francisco conference yesterday to start the real job of building a world peace organization. A compromise has been adopted under which foreign secretaries of Russia, Britain, China and the United States will serve as rotating chairmen of plenary sessions with United States Secretary of State Stettinius chairman of steering and executive committees.

The conference agreed to give Russia the three votes she asked for in the proposed world assembly but the question of an invitation to San Francisco for the Warsaw Polish government has been referred to the Big Four. The final speaker of the day was Prime Minister King. Mr. King said that, in his words, "Nations everywhere must unite to save and serve humanity." Mr. King pledged that the people of Canada are resolved to do all in their power to ensure that the world "will not be engulfed for a third time by a tidal wave of savagery and despotism."

Compromises were reached after Stettinius had conferred with some of the Russian delegates in an attempt to iron out differences.

Foreign Minister Soong of China, Foreign Commissar Molotov of Russia, Foreign Secretary Eden, and Secretary of State Stettinius had addressed the full conference session Thursday. Prime Minister Mackenzie King of Canada speaks today.

### Italy Escape Routes Severed

ROME, April 28 (CP)—American troops striking across the Po River valley and into the Alps reached the Swiss border today and cut off all of north-west Italy from exits to Germany, the Milan national liberation radio said today.

### MURDERERS ARE NAMED

LONDON, April 28 (CP)—Repatriated Royal Air Force prisoners of war have supplied the British government with the names of the commandant and others responsible for the shooting of 50 British air officers, including six Canadians, at the notorious German Stalag Luft No. 3 last year, it was reported yesterday. The Foreign Office said that the names of the guilty will be published by the War Crimes Commission when all the evidence against them has been collected.

### ARMY VICTORY LOAN BOARD IS VANDAL VICTIM

The Army's Victory Loan standing bulletin board on the Post Office grounds was the victim of vandalism during the night. It was ripped off its stakes but little damaged. The military authorities were notified this morning and started checking up with a view, if possible, to locating the vandals. The board was discovered lying on the post office lawn at 1 o'clock this morning by Corporal A. T. Lashmar of the city police and taken to police headquarters.

### Mussolini Is Seeking Refuge

BERNE, April 28 (CP)—Premier Benito Mussolini and the former Fascist secretary Farinacci arrived Thursday at the north Italian town of Como not far from the Swiss frontier. Mussolini was recognized despite a disguise. The former proud Duce was reported to have fled from Milan which is said to have been taken over by Italian partisans.

MONTREAL, April 28 (CP)—A veteran of Quebec politics, Mayor Camilien Houde of Montreal, has accepted the co-leadership of the Bloc Populaire in the June 11 federal election campaign. The mayor's acceptance was announced a few hours after P. J. A. Cardin in a radio address confirmed the formation of a new party under the name of National Front (Le Front National).

**MORE FRENCH REFUGEES**  
BERNE, Switzerland—Switzerland may soon have more visitors. The French press agency reports that ex-premiers Daladier and Renaud and General Gamelin have crossed from Germany into Switzerland.

**WASHINGTON CRASH**  
WASHINGTON, D.C.—Fourteen persons were killed at a Washington D.C. airport yesterday when a passenger plane overshot the runway and plunged into a ravine, bursting into flames.

**NEW STEAMSHIP SERVICE**  
VANCOUVER—Vancouver shipping interests are planning a new steamship service from British Columbia ports to South America.

**HALIBUT BOATS COMING**  
VANCOUVER—A number of Vancouver halibut boats have left to join the Prince Rupert fleet on the first trips of the season to the fishing grounds. The season starts next Tuesday.

**PETAINE'S REQUEST**  
PARIS—Marshal Petain's first request on entering the room where he is to be held prisoner pending trial for treason was for a picture of General DeGaulle which he placed upon the wall.

**MONTY VISITS CANUCKS**  
PARIS—Field Marshal Montgomery visited Canadian troops on the Holland front. He renewed acquaintances with officers and men who served under him in the Eighth Army in Sicily and Italy.

**NAMED TO COMMISSION**  
OTTAWA—Wing Commander E. R. Hopkins will represent Canada on the delegation of members of the United Nations War Crimes Commission which will go to Europe to inspect German horror camps. Wing Commander Hopkins is attached to the Department of External Affairs and is secretary of the Canadian War Crimes Advisory Committee. General Eisenhower requested that the Commission send twelve of its members to inspect the camps.

## PATRIOTS STOP FLEEING NAZIS

LONDON, April 28 (CP)—A force of German soldiers estimated at 1,500 battled Italian patriots near Switzerland's southern frontier throughout Friday night in an attempt to cross into that neutral country, the Swiss radio said today. The Swiss government evacuated residents of the border region when fighting broke out near Chiasso. The Italian patriots ambushed the fleeing Germans, and an all-night battle ensued.

## War News Highlights

### Nazi Disaster In Italy

ROME—The Germans are facing disaster in northern Italy as well as inside the battered Reich. American troops have entered Genoa and Italian partisans have driven the enemy from Milan and Turin. The Swiss radio told of a pitched battle during the night between patriots who ambushed 1500 Nazis. The Germans tried to creep across the border to the safety of Swiss internment.

### Japan Is Bombed Again

WASHINGTON—American warplanes have brought destruction to Japan's home islands once again. A fleet of about 150 B-29's bombed Japan today, the third attack on enemy airfields in two days. Allied planes have been hitting these southern airdromes regularly since April 16 because they are the take-off points for Japanese raiders who bomb Okinawa. In yesterday's raid, enemy fighter planes tried to break up the superfortress formation by dropping phosphorous bombs at some of the giant planes.

### Using "Foolish" Bombs

GUAM—The Japanese have been using pilot-guided rocket bombs in attempts to stem the American advance on Okinawa. The bombs are sixteen feet long and are generally launched from the underside of a bombing plane's fuselage. American forces have named them the "Baka Bomb." "Baka" is the Japanese word for "foolish."

## REICH IS CRACKING UP—TROOPS REVOLT IN MUNICH—ATTEMPT TO FORM NEW GOVERNMENT FAILURE

LONDON, April 28 (CP)—German soldiers revolted today in Munich, the birthplace of Nazism, and the scene in 1923 of Hitler's beer hall putsch. Anti-Nazi troops attempting to seize the Bavarian government won control of Munich's radio station long enough to broadcast a call to German troops to lay down their arms. The revolt apparently was stifled.

## DRY DOCK IN SECOND PLACE

One of the treasured trophies in the possession of the local Dry Dock is the Devenish Cup donated by W. R. Devenish, vice-president, western region, Canadian National Railways for the Seventh Victory Loan campaign.

Mr. Devenish has donated another trophy for the Eighth Victory Loan campaign and the Dry Dock is hopeful of putting this trophy beside the one won in the Seventh Victory Loan campaign.

In the first bulletin issued from Winnipeg the Dry Dock was fourth in the competition. In the second bulletin issued the Dry Dock was second.

The rules of the competition are that one point is awarded for each percentage of employees subscribing and two points for each percentage of money objective obtained.

Determined to make as good a showing on the home front as the forces are doing on the fighting fronts, the employees in the Dry Dock are throwing all their energies and organization into reaching their objective in the Eighth Victory Loan campaign.

## MAY LIQUOR RATION SAME

VANCOUVER, April 28 (CP)—The British Columbia liquor ration in May will remain the same as the April ration, W. F. Kennedy, Liquor Board chairman, announced Friday. The ration consists of 26 ounces of spirits or four dozen beer, or two bottles of imported wine or one gallon of domestic wine.

## GREAT ADVANCE IN NATIONAL LOAN TOTALS

OTTAWA, April 28 (CP)—A substantial increase in large purchases boosted Thursday's national Victory Loan sales to \$76,243,950 and lifted the cumulative total for the first four days of the drive to \$279,423,850. National Victory Loan headquarters announced yesterday. Thursday's total compared with \$67,650,050 on the fourth day of the seventh loan, and the cumulative total compared with \$283,668,600 at the same point in the last campaign.

At the end of the fourth day the B.C.-Yukon total stood at \$18,964,200, or 30 per cent of quota.

For the third consecutive time, Ladysmith, on Vancouver Island, was the first unit in B.C. to go over the top with 103 per cent of its \$175,000 quota.

In the first three days of the campaign, 29,204 Canadian National Railways employees invested \$3,365,500 in Victory Bonds.

Large purchases included \$15,000,000 by the Prudential Life Insurance Company.

## NEW MARK SET FOR VICTORY LOAN PURCHASES IN RUPERT

Prince Rupert Victory Loan purchases set up a new record yesterday. The day's volume of purchases was \$146,450—the largest for any single day in any loan to date. Incidentally, it brought Prince Rupert up to 52 per cent of its objective—\$393,450 on the quota of \$750,000. The local Victory Loan organization is hopeful that the city may go over the top before the end of the second week of the campaign. There is great satisfaction at the response which is being accorded the loan on this occasion.

Comparison with the Seventh Victory Loan shows that on the corresponding day last October, bond purchases totalled \$103,300, and the cumulative five-day total was \$360,350.

## Complete Surrender Bid Is Made

Himmler Tells Western Allies But Not Russia He Wants to Quit

LONDON, April 28 (CP)—Heinrich Himmler was reported today to have offered unconditional surrender to Great Britain and the United States but Prime Minister Winston Churchill, in a special statement, declared that only unconditional surrender to all three big powers would be accepted by the Allies. The Prime Minister neither confirmed nor denied reports that surrender had been offered to the two western Allies but not to Russia. There was no tendency in London to discount the possible authenticity of such reports.

In San Francisco the move was taken as a last-minute attempt to split the unity of the Big Three. It is understood to have had the backing of the German High Command but not that of Adolf Hitler.

Himmler was authoritatively stated here to have informed the western Allies that he is in a position to arrange unconditional surrender and he himself is in favor of it.

## NAZI MARSHAL'S TRAIN CAPTURED

WITH THE U. S. THIRD ARMY IN AUSTRIA, April 28 (CP)—Field Marshal Kesselring's private train has been captured in Cham, near the Czechoslovak frontier and the commander of south Germany was reported today to be virtually surrounded at Regensburg under the guns of the Third Army.

An officer in charge of the marshal's 15-car train said that it was en route to Regensburg to bring out Kesselring but added that it was not certain if the marshal was still there.

The Americans captured 53 Messerschmitt planes on the big airport near Cham.

### Why a "V-E DAY?" . . .

As far as the war in Europe is concerned any official "V-E Day" can now be nothing more than an anti-climax. The war there is already won and there remains but the mopping up. That may take some time yet and it will probably cause us further grievous losses as the Nazi beasts, trapped in their lairs, fight back for their lives because there is no other recourse for them.

Quite possibly it may be considered advisable, since it can only be settled upon by some sort of proclamation, that there should be no formal declaration of a "V-E Day." There would seem to be more than a little wisdom in such a course.

A "V-E Day" celebration could only retard the job of mopping up in Europe. It would be just another day lost in the campaign against our Japanese enemies, the end of which may well be some considerable time removed as yet. There is much lost ground to be re-

gained and such battles as Iwo Jima and Okinawa have demonstrated to us the hard battle we must pursue to eradicate the Far Eastern foe. So why a "V-E Day" at all?

We would not be premature in giving forth our full thanks any time now for our great victories thus far in Europe but it is no time yet—and may not be for a long while—to recklessly celebrate in the full fruits of a secure victory and a lasting peace.

### The Case of General Franco . . .

General Franco has just broken off relations with Japan.

There is an official reason for this break in Spanish-Japanese relations. The Japanese are charged with murdering Spaniards and destroying Spanish property in the Philippines. But has General Franco also broken relations with his own followers who have been charged with murdering Spaniards and destroying Spanish property during the rebellion he led against the Republic?

Maybe that has nothing to do with the case.

Which is exactly what most people in the free world will say if General Franco tries to argue that his belated severance of relations with Japan or any other Axis nation entitles him to some sort of diploma from the United Nations. He is evidently learning—but too little and not fast enough.

## Set Forth Liberalism

Plans for Active Federal Election Campaign—to Appeal On Government's Record

Resolve to combat unfair and adverse propaganda which it was felt had been allowed to go too long unchallenged and to bring deserving attention to the fine record of the Mackenzie King government during the unprecedented stress and difficulties attendant upon the participation in global war, the Prince Rupert Liberal Association was in enthusiastic session last night to lay plans for an active federal campaign in support of Candidate E. T. Applewhaite.

"The record of this government in the way of price control and cost-of-living and anti-inflation measures is sufficient in itself to warrant its return to power," declared President A. D. Ritchie but, unfortunately, such red herrings as conscription had been allowed to becloud the main issues.

The Liberal party, the cradle of all progressive reform and the parent of practically all labor and social legislation, had nothing to be apologetic about, asserted S. E. Parker, its leader, William Lyon Mackenzie King, had proven himself to be a statesman.

As for the conscription matter, there need be no other answer to criticism than that Canada's policy of voluntary overseas service was the same policy as that of Australia, New Zealand and South Africa. Campaign Manager W. M. Watts asserted.



was a Vancouver boat which had come up to Prince Rupert to start with the local fleet. There were several newly-built vessels, looking slightly naked as their owners hurried to get them equipped in time for a reasonably early start in the season. The air of expectancy hanging over the waterfront was almost tinged with gaiety. Good luck, fishermen!

Out at Hunt's Inlet at Porcher Island, McFadden brothers have about 40 tons of live herring in their pound awaiting the halibut boats to call for bait, while at Myers Pass, 135 miles south J. H. Todd and sons of Klemtu have about 500 tons in two pounds.

## RETIREMENT OF RAIL VETERAN

Chief Engineer for Western Region Relinquishes Office

WINNIPEG, April 28 — John Porter, one of the veterans of railway service in the west and chief engineer of the Canadian National Railways, western region, retires to private life on April 30, according to an announcement by W. R. Devenish, vice-president. Mr. Porter has devoted more than 50 years of his life to railway engineering. Mr. Porter was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, and served his apprenticeship in the office of the chief engineer of the North of Scotland Railway, now known as the L. & M. E. Railway. In 1902 Mr. Porter came to Canada and started as draughtsman. In 1909 he joined the National Transcontinental as special engineer and in 1913 was appointed chief engineer of the Hudson Bay Railway.

In 1919 Mr. Porter was transferred to the Canadian National Railways as special engineer and since that time has been associated with various phases of engineering work in western Canada. He was appointed chief engineer of the western region in 1940.




oven or the children's meals.

**KEEPING HOUSE IN WARTIME**

**Timely Tips**

**Identification Disc**  
Alike as two bottles of milk in the refrigerator! When putting away the morning's fresh supply throw a used jar ring over the bottle left from the previous day so that you will know for sure which one to use first.

**Crystal Clear**  
For easy and satisfactory washing of windows, use ammonia, not soap. Soap's a must for most cleaning but it makes windows streaky and hard to polish. Use about 4 tablespoons of liquid ammonia to a gallon of warm water, wash the windows thoroughly, dry with clean, lintless cloth or chamois and give a final polish with newspaper.

**Ready for the Fall**  
When the preserves cupboard is being housecleaned is the logical time for checking over bottles and sealers for this year's canning. Match up tops, put aside sealers with chipped edges and see that all are clean and ready for big days ahead.

**HOW CAN I ???**  
By ANNE ASHLEY

Q. How can I prevent odors from fruit juices when they are burning?

A. There will be no odor of fruit juices when it runs out in an oven, or on top of the stove, if salt is thrown on it. It can be easily cleaned when burned to a crisp.

Q. How can I relieve coughing?

A. To relieve coughing at night, try mixing together equal parts of strained honey and glycerine and adding a few drops of lemon juice. Take a spoonful whenever troubled with coughing.

Q. How can I make an ash stain?

A. Mix one quart of boiling linseed oil, one quart of turpentine, one pint of whiting, and one level tablespoonful of raw sienna.

Refrigeration plays an important role in the preparation of meals at any time, but particularly in summer when appetites are apt to be picky.

"Serve hot things hot, and cold things cold." Cold foods should be thoroughly chilled to bring out the flavor. Salad greens and spinach should be washed, excess water shaken off, then stored in a loosely covered container to permit the cold air to circulate. Then an attractive salad can be produced in a few additional minutes.

Home economists suggest the following ways of getting the most out of the refrigerator.

Proper storage of food is important. Overcrowding keeps the cold air from circulating freely. Remove all outside wrappings from food before storing and cover loosely with waxed paper. Keep covered—butter, milk and any other foods which are readily tainted by the absorption of odors.

Place strong-flavored foods close to the top in a mechanical refrigerator. Fish may be placed in the tray directly below the freezing unit without contaminating other foods. Uncooked meats also may be kept in this tray, as the temperature there is slightly above freezing.

Do not store bananas in the refrigerator.

Cover left-overs, in order to retain their flavor and also eliminate food odors within the refrigerator as far as possible.

The refrigerator can be a real time-saver for the cook. Here, for instance, are a few foods which can be prepared in advance:

1. Light syrups for sweetening summer beverages.
2. Sauces—Chocolate sauce to serve with ice cream. Custard sauce to serve with chilled desserts. White sauce (medium) to serve with vegetables, in escalloped

dishes, and diluted in cream soups.

3. Chilled desserts — fruit whips, jelly sponges, Spanish cream, etc.

4. Refrigerator cookies, which require less flour and also are crisper. They save both time and fuel, as they may be baked when needed, or when the oven has been heated for other purposes.

5. Frozen desserts—sherberts, water ices, etc., (made in a mechanical refrigerator).

6. Refrigerator rolls. As the temperature in a mechanical refrigerator can be kept below 40 degrees F., yeast doughs can be stored for one week and baked as required. In an ice-refrigerator the temperature is usually above 45 degrees F., which is sufficiently warm to permit the growth of the yeast. Therefore it is not practical to store yeast doughs for more than 24 hours in an ice-refrigerator.

**Refrigerator Rolls**

- 2 cups boiling water
- 1½ tablespoons salt
- ¼ to ½ cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons mild-flavored fat
- 2 yeast cakes
- ¼ cup lukewarm water
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 egg
- 6 cups flour

To the boiling water add the salt, sugar and mild-flavored fat. Cool to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast cakes in lukewarm water which has been mixed with 1 teaspoon sugar. Beat egg then add yeast mixture and beaten egg to first mixture. Add flour and knead until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl, cover, and allow to rise until double in bulk. Knead, and if dough is to be stored in refrigerator, brush surface with mild-flavored fat and cover tightly until required. Remove from refrigerator at least 1 hour before baking and shape into rolls.

If rolls are to be baked without storing in refrigerator, shape into rolls immediately and place on greased pan or muffin tins. Allow to rise until double in size. Bake in a hot oven, 400 degrees F., for 15-20 minutes. Makes 4 dozen rolls.

**More About Canning Sugar**

Spare "P" coupons will be used for the purchase of preserves or one half pound of sugar, when all the present "preserves" coupons have become valid. Spare "P" coupons 4-13, valid July 19, have been earmarked for the purchase of sugar for canning to be used along with preserves coupons 43 and 44, now valid and 49-56 coming due on May 17.

**Priority for Safety**

When authorized by police, in the interests of safety, Canadian motorists will be able to get urgent repairs or replacements for their automobiles at once regardless of their gasoline ration category.

**File Menus, Prices**

Within 30 days of purchasing a restaurant or opening a new establishment, proprietors must file lists of their menus and maximum prices with the Prices Board. Furthermore, full particulars must be filed on any item which is later added to the menu.

**Emergency Shelter Rules**

Persons now occupying family quarters, and this includes everything from one room with kitchen privileges to a 10-room house, are obliged to get either an authorization or a permit before they move into new quarters in any Emergency Shelter Area.

**CITY EMBARKS ON CHILD CARE, GUIDANCE PLAN**

ROCHESTER, Minn., April 28 (C)—A conception-to-maturity study combined with a program of child care and guidance, planned to cover an entire generation of Rochester's babies, is under way here.

One of the objectives of the project is to learn ways to foster emotional stability.

The program begins with babies born in 1944 and is sponsored by the Mayo Foundation of the University of Minnesota under direction of Dr. C. Anderson Aldrich, former head of the Chicago Children's Hospital, and president of the American Pediatric Society.

The Rochester health department and public schools and various departments of the university are co-operating.

"We live in a democracy which we are fighting to preserve," says Dr. Aldrich. "The children now growing up will be its leaders of the future. But we cannot expect to have successful leaders in a democracy unless they are emotionally stable enough to stand on their own feet and give and take freely with their fellow men."

"This required emotional stability must stem from a basic security and confidence, the kind that grows up from childhood. It does not seem impossible that human nature may have more co-operation aspects than we have hitherto thought possible. We can make a start at finding this out by applying the wholesome principles of growth to infant and child care."

**Five-Stage Program**

The program will be carried on in five stages—pre-natal care, hospital care at birth, babyhood, pre-school, and school age. All children will be given health supervision based on growth needs of the individual child.

At all stages, Dr. Anderson says, children will be given the benefit of latest developments in the field of pediatrics and child learning habits. He mentions specifically the observation that children can be taught certain subjects more easily when they reach an appropriate stage of mental development than at a specific age dictated by custom.

"Research has been started," he says, "to see if we can correlate the muscular tension of newborns with their emotional behavior."

"We expect to carry these observations on as the children grow up, to establish whether or not dynamic personalities are born that way and can be diagnosed at birth."

"Rochester," says Dr. Aldrich, "provides an unusual opportunity for this sort of program."

"Practically all of the children born in the city are under uniform medical supervision. Ninety-five per cent of them are born in one hospital under the care of clinic obstetricians, and are seen both in the neonatal and well baby stations by pediatricians."
