London. The essence of his policy was that Canada's credit was vital and he worked indefatigably to that end. It so happened that his tenure of office in London coincided with period of great Canadian expansion, during which hundreds of millions of dollars of Canadian loans were placed in the London market, plus many millions of private means transferred to the dominions.

Later Sir Frederick's term of office as general manager of the Bank of Montreal included the difficult period of World War I, when unprecedented issues for every great bank cropped up daily. After the conflict, under his management, the bank had a greater expansion than in all its previous history.






