HOW CAN I??? By ANNE ASHLEY

Q. How can I wash a feather

A. Dissolve 1 lb. sal-soda and water. Put about 5 buckets of tepid water in a tub and pour in the above solution. Then dissolve 1/2 lb. of chloride of lime in 1 qt. boiling water, let it settle, then stir in tub. Beat pillows well and then put in tub, pressing down. Let soak for an hour stirring and pressing constantly with a stick. Rinse in several changes of water, wring, press out all water possible and hang on line to dry, turning and shaking them often. Choose a windy day for quick drying.

Q. What is the best way of dampening clothes before iron-

A. The longer the clothes lay damp before ironing, the better is the result. Sprinkle' starched clothes with hot water, half an hour before ironing.
