Tangier Agreement . . .

The Paris agreement for the reestablishment of the international status of Tangier is the first joint diplomatic act of the major Allies in the post-war era, apart from their relations with enemy countries. The agreement is the precursor of the application of the United Nations Charter in the spirit of which it is conceived. It is an example of the cooperation of the Great Powers which is a condition of the success of the United Nations Organization to maintain international peace and security.

The situation created by Spain under the cover of the Allies' war preoccupations is liquidated. The treaty rights violated by General Franco's unilateral action are restored. The powers which now recover the full evereige of these treats
