



#### Nobody's "Private Fight" . . .

A reading of much of the press releases and other material put out by both industry and organized labor leaves the impression that both management and unions view their disputes as "private fights." Each resents any outside interference, especially governmental, as unfair aid and comfort to the adversary. Both call for a return of direct and "unhampered" bargaining. But both seem alarmingly blind to the very large fact that the public's stake in a dispute may be as large as theirs.

Substitution of governmental adjudication for collective bargaining or other forms of direct employeremployee relationships would seem to be a dangerous departure from democratic fundamentals. Some machinery seems increasingly necessary, however, to see to it that the public's interest makes itself felt more effectively in labor-management controversies. —Christian Science Monitor.

Speaking a similar language need not be a bar to understanding. General Eisenhower and the Londoners have proved it again. When Piccadilly crowds greeted him on "his first night out since before the war" with shouts of "Good Old Ike," the Allied Commander - in - Chief knew he was being treated as one of Britain's own. And his response to a cheering theatre audience needed no translation.

He expressed the feeling many an American knows when returning to England from the Continent-"how much it means to be back among friends." Then he added that touch of humor which makes the whole world kin - "among people whose language I can almost speak." Ever since the General instructed the members of his British-American fighting team to "think Allied" he has proved that the barrier to understand is not language but a false sense of nationalism.

For he speaks with an accent that deserves imitation, the language our post-war world must cultivate—a sincere, tactful, self-respecting but undiscourageable friendliness.







#### U.S. NAMES ON VOTERS' LISTS

American civilians whose names inadvertently appear on the Canadian federal voters lists need not fear that they will lose their American citizenship for that reason, according to an opinion sought by the Daily News this morning from the Judge Advocate's department of the American Army here.

However, if an American citizen takes advantage of the fact that his name is on a Canadian voters' list, and casts a vote his U.S. citizenship would likely be jeopardized.

Names of some American citizens residing in the city are understood to have been placed mistakenly on the voters' list by enumerators.

One such person wrote Returning Officer T. W. Brown requesting that his name be stricken from the list because he feared that he would lose his American citizenship.


