United States Navy, Air-Craft Combine in Gigantic Assault on Jap Homeland

GUAM, July 10 (CP)—Yesterday's great air attack by land and carrier-based planes upon Honshu, the main island of Japan on which Tokyo is located, has been variously described as a "terrific success" and as an "Airmen's spree." With an estimated 1800 planes—Mustangs from Iwo, Bill Mitchells from Okinawa and Superforts from Guamtaking part, it was the greatest air and naval assault yet undertaken against the Japanese home- ' land. The attacking machines roved almost unopposed and at will, remarkably little fight being put up by the Japanese. The targets included from 70 to 80 airfields. The attack was sustained for many hours.

It was a daring operation too for the American Third Fleet, which was still standing off Honshu today, broke radio silence and sent out a challenge to the Japanese navy and air fleet to come out and fight which it failed to do.

War News Highlights

Block Jap Harbors

SAN FRANCISCO-Tokyo radio reported yesterday that a "considerable number" of Allied submarines and mine-laying superforts attempted to block Japanese harbors while raiding planes swept widely over the home islands. Domei claims that at least seven Allied submarines were sunk in Japanese waters since the beginning of June and Nipponese planes are continuing assaults on "enemy" submarines.

GUAM-The largest force yet of carrier-based planes and superfortresses was over Japan yesterday. Five cities on Honshu Island were picked out for the day's targets. More than 1000 planes took part in the raid which lasted more than six hours. Japanese resistance was feeble and great damage was done. Official announcement of the huge attack was made by Admiral Chester W. Nimitz. It was described as the greatest mass naval and air attack in history. The Japanese home islands were ablaze over an area of 2,400 square miles after the one thousand planes of the vast Third Fleet kept up an unrelenting attack on the enemy. The American fleet is lying unmolested close to Tokyo harbor. Tokyo broadcast admits that 800 or more planes had been razing uninterruptedly for eight hours.



With the battle for Okinawa now over, Japan is directing the attention of her people more and more towards the probability of the invasion of the Homeland. One means of concentrating Japanese public attention upon the likelihood of an invasion is the publicity now being given to the transfer of Japanese industry to the mainland of Asia; what in fact is happening in this sphere is probably mainly the acceleration

of a process which has been noticed for some time, namely the development of finishing plants near the sources of raw material in Manchuria and Korea. In addition, some heavy plants are already feeling the shortage of supplies being moved from Japan to the mainland. There is certainly every incentive for such acceleration both in the heavy bombing attacks upon the Home Islands, which have suffered more severely than ever in the last week and in the growing difficulties of transport between the mainland and Japan.

There is certainly no alternative scene of hope and success to offer the Japanese people in the news from the Netherlands East Indies. There the Australian landing at the great oil town of Balikpapan opens a new scene of operations in the southeast of the great island. The Japanese, who had long expected this attack, made a powerful effort to contain the bridgehead but failed. Meanwhile, far to the north operations in British Borneo progress well. Captures of oil centres there, together with those which must soon fall into Allied hands in the Balikpapan area, won't give us all the oil in Borneo. But they will leave only those of less importance in Japanese hands.

In Burma, the monsoon still dominates the operations, and aided by it the enemy is trying to establish a coherent defence line covering approaches to Siam and Indo-China in the Sittang Valley and the Shan Hills. Japan's territories in Southeast Asia must now be defended with resources already there. The last big reinforcement in men was pushed through the corridor in southwest China early in the year, and shipping from Canton must now be difficult. The corridor through China has now been given up west of Liuchow and only in the area of the main north-south railway, giving highly important communications with Canton, are the Japanese still extending their holdings.
