**Alvin Bieter was Machine Gunned** in Normandy After D-Day

An American Joe, paratrooper cteran of "D" Day and wounded in action in Normandy, now receiving treatment for his injuries at military hospital in Vancouver, Washington, Private Alvin W. Bieter, is in Prince Rupert visiting his sister, Mrs. E. Lattery, 1820 Sixth Ave. E.

After being only two weeks in action following a parachute landing, Private Bieter wa machine-gunned in Normandy and suffered serious lower arm injuries. Before going to France,

he spent two years in England. He is on a 30-day furlough from military hospital.

Front in First Few Hours-American Armies to South Keeping Pace -**Great Air Support Given** 

#### FURTHER ADVANCE TODAY

PARIS, Feb. 9 (CP) — The First Canadian Army's front southeast of Nijmegen today had been widened to more than six miles and maximum gains of five miles had been made by first light Friday morning. Associated Press reported that the Canadian Army had penetrated at least 41/2 miles into Germany and well into the Siegfried Line forming the northern jaw of the Allied pincer drive against the Ruhr. The American First Army, 85 miles to the south, has advanced to within a mile of the vast dam controlling the flood waters of the Roer River, barrier to the Ruhr and Cologne Plain

PARIS, Feb. 9 (CP) - General Crere Canadian Army has set the northern hinge of the western front aflame in an offensive launched from the Nijmegen salient in Holland. # Of Reich Developing; Reds Reported Only Eight Miles Off

All-Out Defence By Nazis Certain-Soviets Are Expanding Crossing of **Oder River** 

MOSCOW, Feb. 9 (CP)—It now is clear that a showdown battle is shaping up on the eastern front before Berlin and it is equally clear that the Germans will go all-out in defence of their capital.

The Nazi sadio says that Russian units already have expanded no less than six bridgeheads across the Oder at points 30 to 45 miles from Berlin. There were reports last night that Russian tanks had reached the "outskirts" of Berlin and that Red units were only eight miles away from the Nazi capital.

Possibility of more importance is the fact that the Russians are reported to have ferried many heavy tanks across the river in the Kuestrin area under cover of a tremendous artillery barrage.

A Reuters dispatch from the western front says Allied parachute troops have landed in the Reichwald Forest into which the Canadian Army is fighting its way. This dispatch, which is unconfirmed, gives no details. The new First Army offensive apparently signals the start of an Allied drive to the Rhine and beyond, perhaps into the vital industrial Ruhr.

At the western edge of the Reichswald Forest, British and Canadian forces are less than eight miles from Kleve and about an equal distance from the point where the Rhine curves into Hol-

Mr. Gurney reports that it is the habit of the railway dining car staffs to throw their garbage onto the highway, from trains. Empty bottles and beer cans are also thrown out by the troops. If the practice continues, it is the intention to make a formal protest to the railway company. Meanwhile Mr. Gurney has suggested to the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce that the matter might be taken up with the divisional superintendent.
