## The British Election . . .

Results of the recent British general election, announced today, reveal a sweeping victory for the British Labor Party which will be called upon to form a new administration in succession to Winston Churchill's national government which may be expected to relinquish office with a minimum of delay.

There had been unmistakable signs of the swing of British public feeling, even in the heat and crisis of war, towards Labor and its espoused policies. With the tension of war to large extent ended from the

governmental policy since the British Labor Party is not a revolutionary party. It will probably move carefully and slowly.

In war policy, the leaders of all parties had been agreed even in the election campaign so the fight against Japan will probably carry on along the same lines as the national government had planned and as was being crystallized among the Big Three at Potsdam. We can hope that there will be no relaxation in the pursuit of the causes for which the war was fought and won.

There will be a pang at the political fate of the great Winston Churchill, the British war hero, but such are the fortunes of politics and war. His defeat is not a repudiation and will not tarnish the affection, esteem and admiration which he enjoys. The grand old war horse will now be able to retire, still glorious in victory in the greater sphere even
