Munro Cites McNaughton's Stand Against Slitting Army As Reason for Retirement By DOUGLAS AMARON

Conflict between General Mc Naughton and members of the Canadian cabinet over the question of splitting the Canadian Army is cited by Ross Munro in his book "Gauntlet to Overlord" as "the fundamental reason" for the general's retiremen from the Army command at the end of 1943.

NATIONALISTS WINNING CHINWANGTAO, China -Chinese Nationalist troops are reported to have captured Shanhaikwan in a flanking movement that forced the Chinese Communists Eighth Route Army to abandon the Great Wall gateway to Manchuria through which they are now plunging. One Chinese commander has predicted that the occupation of Shanhaikwan will make it unnecessary to attempt any amphibious operations along the coast of Manchuria. The city is about ten miles north of Chinwang. tao, where United States marines are guarding the railway

Beast and Beastess of Belsen Are Condemned

Extreme Justice to be Meted Out to Diabolical Nazis For Their Atrocities During Recent War

LUENEBURG, Germany, Nov. 17 (CP) - Josef Kramer, notorious "Beast of Belsen," convicted as a war criminal by a British military tribunal Friday, was sentenced today to be hanged. Death sentence was also imposed today on Irma Grese, 22-year-old woman SS guard, known as the "Beastess of Wo-

men," and Dr. Fritz Klein, 55-* year-old doctor who chose the victims to be killed in the gas chamber at Belsen concentration

Kramer, Klein and Grese and 26 others associated with the vicious camp administration were found guilty of killing or injuring prisoners at the camps. Kramer was commandant at Belsen camp and Grese was his

chief woman assistant. Seven others were sentenced to death and other sentences ranged from life imprisonment to ten years.

AND PRINCE GEORGE INTIMATED Most reassuring word to date in connection with the use of the Canadian National Railways own Prince Rupert dry dock for the construction of vessels to replace the coastal steamers Prince Rupert and Prince George was received today in a telegram from Ottawa addressed to W. M. Watts, secretary of the Prince Rupert Industrial Develop-

ment council, from H. G. Archibald, M.P. for

Skeena. Mr. Archibald's telegram read:

"While no definite decision reached, information is that two boats will be replaced. It is hoped that these will be built on the Pacific Coast—one at Prince Rupert and one at Vancouver. This can be released to the press."

On receipt of the message this morning, Mr. Watts and Mayor H. M. Daggett, who is president of the Prince Rupert Industrial Development Council, were speculating on the source which led to Mr. Archibald's hopeful message.

It had been the previous understanding that two such ships were to be built and the council was pressing to have the construction carried out here.



French Politics Again . . .

It is to be earnestly hoped that France is not to embark upon another era of political strife such as so often in the past has laid her wide open to international intrigue and resulted in kindling the flames of European and world warfare. Nevertheless, the same old danger signals are making themselves apparent again. We see the Communists on the one hand, evidently seeking to assume complete control of the nation's administration. On the other we see General DeGaulle, her military hero and saviour of the republic through the depth of her extremity, who, no doubt, sincerely enough hoped to be an effective and a happy coalition of the elemenes, stubbornly threatening to resign.

To have DeGaulle relinquish the presidency at this critical time would appear at this distance to be an almost calamitous eventuality. That, no doubt, is why desperate efforts are being made to have him carry on.

If DeGaulle does not remain to see France through this political crisis, the perplexing question which the world will ask, and which is evidently concerning many Frenchmen themselves, is who is going to do it?

When one thinks of France today, one thinks of DeGaulle. Since the dark days of 1940 he has been the epitome of Free France. Loss of his guidance at this time would appear to be tragic.


