# Berchtesgaden, Fuehrers Mountain Hide - Out, Is Target of Allied Bombing

Rockets Pumped Into Railway Yards in Spite of Intense Flak and Small Arms Fire

ROME, Feb. 21 (CP)—American fighter-bombers yesterday made the war's first air attack on tarto gets in and near Adolf Hitler's fortress city of Berchtesgaden, it was announced today. The attackers swept in through intense flak and small arms fire, Allied air headquarters said, and pumped rockets into

railway yards. In an attark in the immediate vicinity of Hitler's mountain hide-out, they knocked out a locomotive and eight railway cars. At other towns near Berchtesgaden they set fire to two passenger trains, destroyed a troop train estimated to have had 150 soldiers on board and destroyed or damaged nearly fifty railway cars.

Direct hits on the fortress of Berchtesgaden are claimed.

MORE JAP LOSSES WASHINGTON — American submarines have sunk 25 more Japanese ships — an escort carrier, cruiser, destroyer and 22 merchant vessels, bringing the total sinkings by United States submarines since the first of the war to 1025.

the circuit championship. McKail of Mussallem's was high scorer last night with seven points, while Drinkwater topped the winners with six.




