In competition so fierce the final event decided the title, the hard-fighting Calgary Highlanders won the 2nd Canadian Division tabled sports championship, held in the Marine Stadium at bomb-blasted Wilhelmshaven before several hundred Canadian soldiers. The winners piled up 156 points, just two more than the second-place Essex Scottish Regiment, and qualified to represent the division in the Canadian Army finals later this month. The shuttle relay, last event on the card, provided the victory margin when the Calgary's amassed 19 of a possible 20 points.

Units of the division—only Canadian army group in Germany—came from miles around the northwestern section of Germany in jeeps and trucks to either compete or watch the events on a sun-bathed field where once Nazi naval parades held sway. Maj.-Gen. A. Bruce Matthews, C.B.E., D.S.O., E.D., took the salute at a march past following the meet and presented awards donated by the four auxiliary service organizations.

Third among the nine competing units was the Toronto Scottish Regiment with 149 points, five more than the fourth-place South Saskatchewan Regiment. The Royal Hamilton Light Infantry team was fifth with 136 points and the Fifth Field Regiment sixth with 127. Other teams, in order of finish, were Second Anti-Tank Regiment, Regiment de Malsonneuve and Royal Canadian Engineers.

Teams were made up of 16 men each and every member of every team competed in each event against minimum and maximum standards set up by the sports committee. For instance, the 100-yard dash minimum time was set at 12 1/4 seconds and the maximum 11 1/4 seconds. If a competitor made the maximum standard he was given two points, with one point awarded if the minimum standard was reached. No points were awarded for performances below the minimum standard.
