Key of Highway Situation . . .

The question of the ownership of the Prince Rupert-Terrace Highway cannot be finally settled until the matter of the right-of-way has been permanently arranged with the Canadian National Railways, the provincial minister of public works, Mr. Ansbomb, has stated. Until such time as that is done the responsibility for maintenance of the road can be neither placed or assumed. So we know now that the matter which we must immediately press for is to get the question of the right-of-way settled with the railway company. Therefore, the responsibility for the upkeep can be bandied between the two governments either of which, if they choose to do so, could repudiate the responsibility. Meantime, we might consider ourselves fortunate that the provincial department is giving the road the attention that it is getting. A measure of credit is due in that regard.

Impeding Employment . . .

The war in Europe has been over more than six months; the Japanese war three. Hundreds of thousands of servicemen have returned from overseas stations and

been discharged to "civilian" life. There are more men looking for jobs today than there are immediately available vacancies, says the Financial Post.

And yet the Department of Labor is continuing an employment system born of wartime necessity and geared to an emergency economy, when jobs were plentiful and urgent, workers few and hard to find.

Employers of labor now have been granted the great privilege of publishing their names in advertisements for help wanted, but the applications must still be made through the cumbersome channels of National Employment Service.

The quickest way to get at the heart of the present unemployment problem would be to remove the extensive process of documentation and inquisition still in vogue. Let men and jobs come together in the most direct manner possible, and then let the department concern itself with the kernel of the problem—the men who are left unemployed.

National Employment Service should continue to function, but as a service, not as an executive authority. It should stand ready to provide workers for jobs that develop and cannot be filled through normal channels. It should be advised of employment vacancies as they occur and as they are filled, so it can help men who do not know where to look for work. But it should not be permitted to impede this country's normal business and industrial development by insisting on handling, individually, the placing of every one of Canada's 4,000,000 workers.

CHINA CAPITAL DANCES AGAIN

CHUNGKING — This wartime capital of China is dancing again, jamming the halls to the point of suffocation despite a cover charge of 1,400 Chinese dollars.

It was illegal to dance in Chungking during the war, but as concession to American forces authorities decided to allow about a half dozen dance halls to open.

They were built at great cost and were just about ready to open when the war ended and the exodus of the Americans began.

But the halls are prospering anyway, because the eager Chinese seem to be trying to make up for all the fun they missed during the long and sombre war years.

The orchestras on the whole are poor, but they play valiantly from opening to 11 p.m. closing time without rest, and the Chinese patrons do not seem to suffer from the discords. Besides the cover charge, Chungking's much-berated synthetic vodka or gin is on tap at 2,500 Chinese dollars the bottle. Hang-over comes for free.

Consequently, most Chinese patrons drink tea and eat oranges.

ROVER CAN READ TRAFFIC LIGHTS

VANCOUVER — Dogs can read traffic lights. A story describing how a certain dog observed and obeyed traffic lights appeared in a Vancouver newspaper and promptly brought a flood of letters from readers who maintained the story was impossible since dogs are color-blind. However, dogs can distinguish between degrees of brightness. And that's how they can tell the difference between the stop and go signal. All they have to do is remember whether the red light is at the top or bottom of the standard.

Taking for granted that last week's ration budgeting left you with a credit of two tokens, this week's first dinner might well feature a small roast. Parting with two coupons in one fell swoop is not ration rashness when you get in return three pounds rolled shoulder of lamb. It should nicely take care of three dinners, inclusive of a guest or two. Good companions for the roast are a savoury dressing and a rich brown gravy. For Monday it can be sliced cold and on Wednesday a lamb and vegetable pie is a tasty remake. Suggested Tuesday fare is an egg and noodle casserole—hard cooked eggs on a bed of noodles topped with a mellow cheese sauce and buttered crumbs, the whole given an oven heat treatment until bubbling and browned. Two-token value for Thursday is half a pound of hamburger for meat patties. Unrationed fish is a foregone conclusion for Friday. Being tokenless on Saturday is no cause for frenzy, for unrationed meats offer a variety of choice. A pickled tongue gently simmered and served hot with a taste-tantalizing and seasonable cranberry sauce can be a happy highlight in the week's eating. And it will also start you on another week by providing a Sunday meal.

BUSY PARLIAMENT IN HIGH GEAR

mittee was set up to choose a design for a distinctive Canadian flag and the speculation was that the Canadian Red Ensign, with the Union Jack in the upper lefthand corner and the coat of arms in the fly, likely would be chosen, possibly with minor alterations.

A bill to give Canadians the legal right to call themselves Canadian citizens was introduced but later the government announced it did not intend to proceed with the measure immediately.

Finance Minister Ilesley brought down a long-awaited budget and announced a 16 per cent decrease in personal income tax and reductions in the corporation tax field. Mr. Ilesley later served as acting prime minister while Mr. King went on a fact-finding tour to Britain and to Washington for discussions on the use of atomic energy and other matters.

The task of premiership was not made easier by the strength of the opposition in the Commons. John Bracken, appointed Progressive Conservative leader in 1942, was elected in the general election. J. M. Macdonnell, former president of the National Trust Co., was elected member for Muskoka-Ontario. Maj.-Gen. G. R. Pearkes, V.C., former officer commanding the Pacific Command, came in as member for Nanaimo to take a seat alongside Lt.-Col. Cecil Merritt, winner of the Victoria Cross at Dieppe. Col. Merritt was elected in Vancouver Burrard.

Mr. Bracken set up a cabinet within the party and selected men to criticize legislation the government brought down. This lightened his burdens as leader. Parliament and Canadians in general welcomed the appointment of Sir Harold Alexander, Supreme Allied commander in the Mediterranean area, as governor-general to succeed the Earl of Athlone, retiring after a five-year term.

Besides going to the polls in the federal general election, the people of Ontario, Manitoba, Nova Scotia and British Columbia voted in provincial elections and returned to power the administrations that had helped the reins at dissolution. Premier George Drew's Progressive Conservative party scored a sweeping victory in Ontario and the Liberals under Hon. Angus Macdonald won all but two seats in Nova Scotia. Coalition governments were returned in Manitoba and British Columbia.
