**A Pattern Emerges . . .**

Germany has now lost the last of its great centres of war industry and seems unable to check the shearing apart and pocketing of its armies of the West, says the Christian Science Monitor. Encirclement of the Ruhr follows American occupation of the Saar and Russian capture of Silesia. Possibly 100,000 first-line enemy troops are cut off in the Ruhr, including the only tank army left to the Germans on what was the Western Front.

To the north, the lifting of the news blackout reveals why the Germans have been pulling out of the Netherlands. The British Second Army, headed toward Bremen and the North Sea coast, now threatens all enemy forces left in the Low Coun-

tries, and the Canadian First is cutting them in two. This should mean relief for England before long from the V-weapon scourge. That the Germans' departure is so headlong as to save the Netherlands from further willful inundation is something to be hoped for.

Meanwhile, the advances of the American Third Army toward Leipzig, of the Seventh toward Nuremberg, and of the French toward Stuttgart gain in significance when viewed in their relationship to the paths of the Russian drives. The First Ukrainian Army now has taken Glogau, German strong point in the path of any push toward Dresden, Leipzig, and the spearhead of the American Third. The Second and Third Ukrainian Armies move up the Danube, not alone to take Vienna, but complementing the advances of the American Seventh and French First to cut off any mass retreat of German northern forces to the "national redoubt" in the Austrian and Bavarian mountains.

Thus we are witnessing both the segmentation of German-held soil and the isolation of German armies from the west and from the east and from the south to the north.

Easily though, her most important accomplishment and the one that gave her the greatest thrill in Congress was when she successfully steered the bitterly fought Wage and Hours bill through its complicated ramifications in committee and on the House floor. As far as the House goes, she is certainly the "mother" of that vital legislation.

Probably the best way of describing her is that most friends and intimates call her "Aunt Mary." The inclination to follow suit comes a few minutes after you have met her.

She is plain, friendly and modest. At the moment she was being paid tribute on the floor of the House, she was having lunch with the members of her office staff. She is proud of the fact that she never takes the House floor to make a personal speech.
