
The heaviest fire bomb raid in the history of warfare was made on Tokyo, the capital of Japan, by 550 American Superfortress. Five thousand tons of bombs were dropped. The industrial heart of the city and railway freight yards, through which one-third of Japanese railway traffic passes, were concentrated upon. Great fires could be seen two hundred miles away. They were still raging twenty-four hours later. There were two great raids-Wednesday and today.

Jap Air Power Failing . . .

The eclipse of the Luftwaffe was one of the most striking features in the decline and defeat of Nazi Germany. The failure of the Japanese air force is no less significant. Just as the threat or use of air power was an essential feature in the diplomatic and military subjugation of Europe to the Nazis, so it was the principal weapon in making possible the vast conquests achieved by the Japanese between the winter of 1941 and the spring of 1942. The Japanese air force is still large and still founded - on a considerable industrial machine but it is proving inadequate to defend the homeland against the devastating raids of superfortresses.

Nor is it only over industrial cities that the Japanese air force is failing in its task. The campaign in Burma, now moving to its end, owed much of its success to the Allied domination of the skies, and the failure fully to appreciate this led to

disaster for the Japanese. The Japanese invasion of India through Manipur was halted, and the enemy forces destroyed, largely by movement of several divisions by air from India and elsewhere, while during the advance to Mandalay and to Rangoon which followed this great enemy defeat, the speed of the British advances was maintained very largely by airborne supplies, just as their direction was often determined by almost exclusively Allied use of aerial reconnaissance. In China, the Japanese preponderance in ground forces enabled the enemy, during 1944 and the early months of this year, to drive against the American airfields with success, but their attempt to complete the process by the capture of the American bases in western Hunan has had no success.

In the Pacific and East Indian areas, the loss of airpower is proving equally serious for the enemy, for it is leading, and in some areas has already led, to so complete a loss of seapower as amounts to the loss of effective communications. The maintenance of great American and British fleets with their air units, by a complicated system of air fields for land - based aircraft in reconquered territory, has already gone far to isolate from one another the main Japanese conquests, and make their piecemeal reduction possible.

Major James T. Harvey

Progressive Conservative Candidate

SKEENA

Major James T. Harvey, now home on leave from overseas service with the Canadian Army, is the Progressive Conservative candidate in the British Columbia riding of Skeena.

Born in Cranbrook, January 25, 1907, Harvey was two when his parents moved to Vancouver. It was there that his father, J. A. Harvey, a member of the law firm of Taylor and Harvey, died in 1918.

After studying law for five years, first with the late Robert Smith, then at the Vancouver City Hall, Jim Harvey was called to the Bar of British Columbia. In October, 1929, he joined the law office of Alex Young in Prince George. He opened his own law office in Smithers in March, 1930, but the following year moved to Prince Rupert where he and T. W. Brown bought out the firm of Williams and Manson and started the law firm of Brown & Harvey.

A member of the militia, he was called for service on the outbreak of war. Following service with the Coast Defence for a year and a half, he was sent to Nanaimo as staff captain in the Fifth Infantry Brigade, then to Niagara Falls and Debert.

Then followed a term as Secretary of the Selection Board in Ottawa, after which Harvey was sent to Kingston for the Junior War Staff Course in which he ranked second. He went overseas in February, 1943.

Major Harvey was given a further staff course in London, then served on the staff of various units, and since September, 1944, has been on the Western Front.

His wife and three children, Peter, Gail and Christopher, live at Qualicum Beach, B.C.
