ONE END COLLAPSES PARIS, Jan. 11 (CP)-British patrols stabbed ten miles end of the Ardennes salient today and reached the vicinity of Champion on the northsouth road between Laroche -and Saint Hubert. The German radio said that the Canadians had launched an attack against German positions south of Nijmegen in Holland, the Germans claiming that the attacks were repulsed. The Nazis are still menacing Strasbourg and General DeGaulle has issued a warning to the Nazis to desist from mistreating the French people in Alsace.
