

Is Improved

The winter feed situation has materially improved and short crops are being mowed and stacked for livestock. About 30 per cent of the wheat is cut and barley cutting is well advanced. Wheat is running around 10 to 15 bushels per acre, oats 25 to 30 bushels and barley 15 to 20 bushels.

North of Edmonton, harvesting is making rapid progress and cutting is general in most dist-

Elevator deliveries are being made in Peace River with wheat grading No. 1 and 2 and coarse grains 2 and 3 hundredweight. Average returns show wheat yield around 17 bushels per

acre, oats 30 and barley 20. In the Okanagan weather has continued dry and fairly cool. Fruit movement has been very brisk and 75 per cent of the peach crop has been moved to markets. Pears are coming along fast and no damage from any cause appears.

INTO TOKYO

Three Mile Parade in Sight of Emperor's Palace

TOKYO, Sept. 7 (P)-Allied Headquarters moved into Tokyo today (Saturday) along with a three-mile long procession of Allied troops. 8,000 men took part in the parade which began in sight of the Emporor's palace.

What Ottawa Is Planning

Reconstruction and Maintenance of Peace Are Major Problems

OTTAWA, Sept. 7 (P)—The first session of the new parliament yesterday was told in the Speech from the Throne what it is being asked to accomplish during coming weeks. The Speech from the Throne read by the governor-general stressed the need of new programs for reconstruction and for the maintenance of

The address forecast the introduction of legislation dealing with international affairs and such domestic issues as the consolidation of rehabilitation legislation, the expansion of external trade and the definition of Canadian citizenship.

The bill defining Canadian citizenship would legalize the status of Canada as a nation. Additional measures to assist in the relief of the destitute people in Europe are being asked and the charter of the United Nations permanent peace organization will be up for ratification.

A select committee is to be set up to approve a design for a distinctive national flag for Can-

Measures to stimulate external trade will be introduced and approval is being asked of Canadian participation in the international monetary fund and bank for reconstruction and de-

Until a national flag has been selected, the speech said that the government has directed use of the Red Ensign as a distinctive Canadian flag. The ensign was earried into battle by Canadian troops.

One Million Japanese Troops Are Involved

CHUNGKING, Sept. 7 P -The main surrencer of Japanese troops in China is expected to take place in Nanking on Sunday. Other supplementary surrenders will be made in other Chinese cities. It is estimated that there are one million Japanese troops in China.





Labor Market in Reverse . . .

The labor market appears to be going into reverse. Employers, hard pressed these last few years to find men for jobs, are now going to have to find jobs for men. Many of them have commitments to their employees who joined the armed forces and who must be provided for after they are discharged from the services.

Even now, before many of the men of the forces are out of the services, laid-off men from the war industries, to say nothing of the women, are seeking other jobs.

There are going to be difficult and vexatious questions both for employers and employees. Patience and understanding will have to be xercised all around as the particular problems of war employment recede and those of normal times reappear.

New Educational Problem . . .

Appearance in the schools of the city of 18-year-old boys, who have been employed in the war industries for the past few years, poses a problem for the school authorities. Of course, there are only a few such cases in Prince Rupert so far but, doubtless, there will be more and the question will be general.

If the number of such "men" becomes very great, it will, of course, mean some sort of segregation, involving special instructional arrangements. It is obvious that complications would arise through having such older students co-mingling with the boys of normal school age. How the problem is to be met will, of course, depend to some extent on the "men" themselves.

Port Edward

Staging Area Another installation at Prince Rupert is the Staging Area, located at Port Edward about ten miles from the main port. Port Edward's chief purpose is to house and equip personnel moving to and from the North Parific and Alaska theatres.

Starting with a bare site, the camp was developed sufficiently to care for several thousand troops every month. It has all the usual facilities of a U.S. army camp, including barracks, mess halls, theatre, chapel, office buildings, warehouses, storage facilities, and recreation halls. These were all built by U. S. E. D. Engineers of the Northwest Division.

On March 15, 1943, nine officers, 244 enlisted men, and 387 civilian workers were brought to Port Edward from the shipwrecked Army transport Otsego. The necessity for housing, feeding and reclothing these men brought about the premature opening of the post.

Four officers, some cooks and bakers were assigned to Port Edward from Prince Rupert and companies were formed of the enlisted men. 



"The German treatment was not bad," he said, "but with the ter. The Italians couldn't seem to get organized. Their ill-treatment of prisoners was not so much caused by premeditation as a result of neglect."

Churchill's phrase "comic opera army" aptly described the Italian military, Capt. Gibson said. The gap between the Italian officers and men very great and, in addition to that. Italians from northern compatriots with contempt.

In "transient 55" camp at Bari, Capt. Gibson and other British officers were confined for sevthat the Red Cross and representatives of the protecting power were not allowed to inspect conditions in the camp. Later he was moved to two other camps in Italy and still later to Germany.

The clothing situation in the camp was particularly bad for officers. Enlisted men were supplied with clothing by the Italian government but officers were supposed to buy their own and none was made available to

"We went around in blanket kilts and blanket shawls," said Capt. Gibson, who was wearing desert clothing consisting of shorts and shirt at the time he was captured.

In Germany Capt. Gibson was placed in a prison camp where prisoners-of-war and civilians of many European nations were engaged in building a synthetic oil refinery.






