country, envisioned the opporunity for profitable investment in the establishment of a major fishing enterprise which would combine the catching, processing, refrigeration and shipping of the fish to be caught in the teeming waters contiguous to the new railway terminal port of Prince Rupert, Having monied friends, Collins organized the Atlin Construction Co. and built the original cold storage plant at Seal Cove, then and still the largest fish cold storage plant in the world.

As far as the Atlin Construction Co. a promotion project but British capital was convinced that it was a sound investment and became interested. Thus it was that the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. Ltd. came into being.

The soundness of the original conception has been, of course, proven over the period of thirty odd years that it has been in continuous and successful operation - in season and out through the good and through the lean years. Other industries might have come and gone but the "Cold Storage" went on without interruption, building up a fish handling organization extending all over the continent and abroad.

Under the management for many years of T. H. Johnson and more recently of Col. J. W. Nicholis, the relations of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. Ltd. with its own many employees personally and with the community in general have always been cordial and harmonious. The company has been agreeable and helpful on the one hand and the community has been appreciative and co-operative on the other.

One day about twenty-five years ago a young Englishman of effervescent, winning and immensely droll personality who had been a staff officer in the last war and who came to Canada to land finally at Usk where he went into business which folded up when a lumber and mining boom corlapsed, breezed into the Daily News office. He was able to convince the late H. F. Pollen that he was possessed of a measure of energy and enthusiasm for the newspaper business that could and Mr. Collins were concerned, it was he put to good use on the Daily News staff. The young man who thus joined us was Sid Webb who soon became very well and favorably known as an advertising salesman and general businessgetter. His crowning achievement, however, was the inauguration of the "Waterfront Whiffs" section of the paper which has been an institution with us ever since although it never subsequently had the wit and sparkle that Sid Webb used to inject in it with his Flossie Flirt and humorous writings about some of the old timers whose names he made a household word in Prince Rupert. We were all sorry when he left here for England on account of his father's illness and had hoped he might some day return. Yesterday the managing editor of this paper, incidently the only remaining member of the staff who was associated with Sid Webb in those days, received a letter from England telling that he had died in London about a month ago. Sid was such a fine fellow to work with-so cheerful, so funny, so energetic-that it was a pang indeed for us to get the news. The people around town who remember Sid Webl may not be so numerous now but all

# Public Announcement

The following extracts are taken from the Statute Law and Regulations in force relating to DESERTION and ABSENCE WITHOUT LEAVE from the Canadian Army and are published for the information of the public and personnel of the Army.

## Offences against Military Law which are dealt with by Military Tribunals

## ARMY ACT

#### Section 12

"(1) Every person subject to military law who commits any of the following offences; that is to say,

(a) Desents or attempts to desert His Majesty's DETVICE: OF

(b) Persuades, endeavours to persuade, procures or attempts to procure, any person subject to mulitary law to desert from His Majesty's service.

shall, on conviction by court-martial-

if he committed such offence when on active service or under orders for active service, he liable to suffer penal servitude or such less punishment as is in this Act mentioned."

shall, on conviction by court-martial, be liable to suffer imprisonment, or such less punishment as is in this Act mentioned."

Section 15

"Every person subject to military law who commits any of the following offences: that is to say,

(1) Absents himself without leave;

shall, on conviction by court-martial, be liable, if an officer, to be cashiered, or to suffer such less punishment as is in this Act mentioned, and if a soldier, to suffer imprisonment, or such less punishment as is in this Act mentioned."

#### Section 14

"Every person subject to military law who commits any of the following offences; that is to say,

(1) Assists any person subject to military law to desert His Majesty's service; or

(2) Being cognizant of any desertion or intended desertion of a person subject to military law, does not forthwith give notice to his commanding officer, or take any steps in his power to cause the deserter or intending deserter to be apprehended,

## MILITIA ACT

#### Section 71(3)

"3. Any officer or man of the Militia may be tried by court-mertial for the crime of desertion at any time, without reference to the length of time which has elapsed since his desertion."

#### Section 72

"72. Every member of the Militia called out for active service who absents himself without leave from his corps, for a longer period than seven days, may be tried by courtmartial as a deserter."

# Offences against the Criminal Law which are dealt with by the Criminal Courts

CRIMINAL CODE OF CANADA

#### Section 82

Inciting to desert.

"82. Every one is guilty of an offence punishable on indictment, or on summary conviction before two justices, who, not being a seaman in His Majesty's naval service, an enlisted soldier or airman in His Majesty's Service

(a) by words or with money, or by any other means whatsoever, directly or indirectly, persuades or procures, or goes about or endeavours to persuade, prevail on or procure, any such seaman, soldier or airman to desert from or leave His Majesty's naval, military or air service;

(b) conceals, receives or assists any deserter from His Majesty's naval, military or air service, knowing him to be such deserter;

and is liable, on conviction under indictment, to fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court, and on summary conviction before two justices, to a pennot exceeding two hundred dollars, and not less than eighty dollars and costs, and in default of payment to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months."

(a) persuades any man who has been enlisted to serve in any corps of militia, or who is a member of or has engaged to serve in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Force, to desert, or attempts to procure or persuade any such man to desert; or

(b) knowing that any such man is about to desert, aids or assists him in deserting; or

(c) knowing that any such man is a deserter, conceals him or aids or assists in his rescue."

#### DEFENCE OF CANADA REGULATIONS

"31A. (1) Any person who by any means whatsoever

(a) procures or persuades any member of His Majesty's forces to desert or absent himself without leave, or attempts to procure or persuade any such member to desert or absent himself without leave;

(b) knowing that such member is about to desert or absent himself without leave, aids or assists such member in deserting or absenting himself without leave; or

(c) knowing any such member to be a deserter or sbeentee without leave, conceals such member, or aids

#### Section 83

Resisting execution of search warrant.

"83. Every one who resists the execution of any warrant authorizing the breaking open of any building to search for any deserter from His Majesty's naval, military or air service is guilty of an offence and liable, on summary conviction before two justices, to a penalty of eighty dollars."

#### Section 84

Enticing militiamen or mounted police to desert.

"84. Every one is guilty of an offence and liable, on summary conviction, to six months' imprisonment, with or without hard labour, who

#### (2) Any person who

(b) with the intent of enabling a member of His Majesty's forces to render himself, or induce the belief that he is, permanently or temporarily unfit for service, supplies to or for such member any drug or preparation calculated or likely to render him or lead to the belief that he is permanently or temporarily unfit for service;

shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable upon summary conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months."
