Announcement of the development was made in a ment by President Truman released at the White h today. The bomb was dropped 16 hours ago on Hiroshima, important Japanese army base.

The President said that the bomb "has added a new and revolutionary increase in destruction" on the Japanese. He disclosed that more than 65,000 persons are now working in great secrecy in two principal atomic bomb plants and some lesser factories.

Truman said "we have spent two billion dollars on the greatest scientific gamble in history and have won."



Pietro Mascagni . . .

If the father of Pietro Mascagni, who is dead in Rome, had had his way, Italy would have had, perhaps, just another lawyer, but the world never would have heard "Cavalleria Rusticana."

The elder Mascagni, a baker, was willing to make sacrifice to educate his son for a legal career but discouraged the boy's attempts to learn the rudiments of music.

Pietro had manifested an inclination toward that art from childhood, but when his father's opposition became pronounced there was danger

of the son's musical career being ended abruptly until the intervention of an amiable uncle. The latter was permitted to adopt Pietro, who then pursued his musical studies diligently and unhampered.

It was in 1889, while thus engaged, that Mascagni composed his one-act opera "Cavalleria Rusticana" and entered it in a contest conducted by a music publisher.

Italy soon lost its head over "Cavalleria Rusticana" and Mascagni was hailed as the successor of Verdi-what Italy had longed for and looked for since days of that great composer.

"Cavalleria Rusticana" immediately spread beyond the confines of Italy. Operagoers in Berlin, London and Paris demanded it. Everywhere it was presented its success was instantaneous.

Italy may have been inglorious in many ways but, through such artists as Mascagni and his works, her culture shall still go down in history.
