TECHNOCRACY'S CHALLENGE

Editor, Daily News:

Technocracy challenges you to acquaint yourselves with the trends now taking place on the North American continent before it is too late. We say the North American continent because the problem of Canada and the United States in the future destiny of the people is the same. We have the same price system, so intricately interwoven, the same fundamental behaviour pattern of our people and the same geographical area with its vast material and technological resources having produced the greatest abundance of goods and services ever known. Our problems are essentially the same.

Twenty-five years ago a group of scientists, engineers and economists formed a research organization to survey and analyze our potential resources and our social system. Many startling facts were discovered. One was that our price system could not operate much longer. As early as 1921 the collapse of 1929 was predicted. Later they predicted the bankruptcy of the private banks in the U.S.A. and other prophesies which have been fulfilled. The major prediction of the complete breakdown of our price system has been offset by the war. Only the physical events now taking place can determine the end.

Being predicted upon scarcity our price system cannot operate in an economy of abundance. We tried every conceivable means in the last decade before the war to make it operate—dumping surpluses, subsidizing producers not to produce, paying relief to keep men out of production, etc. We have had to curtail production because we did not know how to distribute an abundance at a price, thereby creating the worst unemployment problem ever known. Technocracy warns you that this condition will be very greatly aggravated in the postwar because of the fact that never before have we had the productive capacity that has been necessary for war production and which, when converted into production for civilian use, will accelerate the rate of reaching the saturation point of our ability to purchase in a shorter time than ever before. Trends indicate that a condition which may become socially intolerable may follow very shortly. We do not want to alarm anyone unnecessarily but you must be prepared to adjust yourselves to meet this condition. Even if it is desirable that we institute a new social order, it is also of grave necessity that we do so to prevent a chaotic condition in this country. Whether we like it or not we cannot ignore this fact.

Technocracy points out that when a price system is no longer possible on this continent a non-price system must be put into operation immediately. An abundance can be distributed only without value or price. Technocracy was organized by that research group, and is the only non-price system. It is preparing day by day to maintain the operation of the productive

and distributive equipment of this continent at the time now imminent when the pressure of abundance will have completely wrecked the price system.

The technologist examines our so-called standard of measurement—the monetary unit—the dollar. He notes that it is variable. That anyone should attempt to use a variable as a measuring rod is so utterly absurd that he dismisses any serious consideration of its use in his study of what should be done. To bring production and distribution into balance by such measurement is much the same as attempting to determine how many pounds of electrical current would come to balance on a scale with a constantly increasing magnitude of fluctuating density. Balanced load under a price system is a problem of that order of nonsense.

To modern civilized men, science has become the court of last resort. The explanations offered in the name of science are accepted under the new order of common sense within which we live and do our work. As our productive capacity has increased our problem of distribution has become more and more serious. And it becomes more and more apparent that we must turn to science for a solution.

Technocracy is science in the social field. The encyclopedia Americana says: Whatever the future of Technocracy one must fairly say that it is the only program of social and economic reconstruction which is in complete intellectual and technical accord with the age in which we live.

Meanwhile Technocracy must continue to urge the adoption of the program of total conscription of men, machines, material and money to bring this war to a successful conclusion and an orderly transition into the peace.

toms and onset, first of gonorrhoea and then, syphilis. The early stage of gonorrhoea was explosive, painful and with definite symptoms. If not caught early it might well have serious complications with permanent damage. Syphilis, at the outset, was quiet, insidious and often unrecognized. First there was the sore at point of contact, then the spread through the bloodstream, the copper-colored rash over the body and later, maybe years, the affection of heart or joints or nervous system or, so often, the brain.

The importance of submitting to medical examination so that cultures or blood tests might be made to establish diagnosis was emphasized by Dr. Kergin.

Syphilis might be completely cured if caught in time, the doctor said, but he was skeptical about the speedy, almost instant cures which one heard about. Systematic and thorough treatment was more to be relied upon. At least weeks and possibly months were required and the treatment must be persistently adhered to if it was to be successful.

Quite frankly Dr. Kergin admitted that he would not guarantee a sure cure of gonorrhoea although, by the use of penicillin and the sulfa drugs, the chances are excellent. However, it was possible to definitely establish cure of syphilis.

BOILERMAKERS MAY NOT BE CARRYING ON

Possibility that the athletic organization might collapse for want of leadership due to men leaving the city if the dry dock were to reduce operations was given as the reason for the Boilermakers' Union asking the Kinsmen's Club on Wednesday to co-operate with other organizations in taking over the Athletic Club now operating under Boilermakers' auspices at Seal Cove School. Kin members supported the idea of their club sharing responsibility in that field.

NOTICE TO EMPLOYERS OF TECHNICAL PERSONNEL

Your attention is directed to:

NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE REGULATIONS
Order in Council 246, Part III, Technical Personnel, Section 1, Subsection 1, reading as follows:

"All persons employing technical personnel from time to time, at the request of the Minister of Labour, shall supply him with such information as he may specify with reference to their present and future requirements of technical persons for essential work."

Where such requirements include any engineering or science student who, through graduation from a recognized University during his term of study, is to become technical personnel, it shall be the duty of the employer to notify the Minister forthwith of such needs under the Wartime Bureau of Technical Personnel.

The information to accompany such notification of requirements shall include:

1. The anticipated number of prospective employees.
2. The nature of proposed occupation of each.
3. The type of training deemed best adapted to the occupation proposed.
4. Remuneration with respect of each position to be filled.

The filing of such requirements shall be no guarantee of their being filled. Each case will be considered on its merits and therefore information should be submitted as to provide a basis for decisions as to the labour priority of the work involved.

University courses which lead to graduates being classified as technical personnel include all branches of Engineering, Agricultural Science, Architecture, Forestry, Veterinary Science, Household Science and courses which lead to a degree and various General Science and the Science courses (Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Geology and other natural science courses).

Prospective employers who fail to submit their requirements by February 19th, 1945, shall be deemed not to need the services of 1945 graduates in engineering and science courses and no provision can be made for requirements filed after that date.
