British Ration Levels . . .

In view of the resumption of meat rationing in Canada, a summary of the ration situation in Great Britain is of interest.

In Great Britain, the ration level has been reduced to a point lower than that prevailing at any time during the war years and the maintenance of even these low levels will be extremely difficult in respect of meat, bacon and cheese.

The amount of food allocated to liberated countries by the Combined Food Board diminishes the supply in the world pool from which Great Britain may draw her requirements unless the exporting countries can still further increase their shipments.

United Kingdom officials estimate that, even if all their present contracts for meat from other countries are filled, they would still want from Canada during the last half of 1945, well over 400,000,000 pounds of meat in order to provide Armed Services, supplied from Great Britain, with their priority needs and to maintain present British ration levels.

A survey of the bacon position shows that even if the present bacon contract is completed it will still be about 34,000,000 pounds short of requirements and will be 16,000,000 pounds short of satisfying present British bacon rations which are now

The "Outbreak" of Peace . . .

With rumors, reports and events, pointing to the possibility of an end to the Japanese war earlier than most had dared hope, the nation finds itself none too well prepared for an "outbreak" of peace. Too many of the measures designed to cushion the shock and provide an orderly change-over from a war to a peace economy either await consideration or are stalled.

Some fear the men who would do the planning or would carry out the program. That was an under-, standable reaction of conservative thinking when there was a sharp turn to the left at the depths of the depression. But one does not have to approve everything that has been done to observe that the more frantic fears should be dispelled by now.

The same men who man the federal government, whether all of the nation likes all of them or not, are going to have to carry out either the haphazard product of diverse and often conflicting pressures, or some sort of considered and integrated policy. The economic dislocations of war are too great to permit expectation that all the pieces will fall neatly and automatically into their old accustomed places at the sudden coming of peace.





Research Work in South Africa CAPE TOWN, Aug. 2 (P-Abbe Henri Breuil, noted archaeologist, has returned to Paris after two - and - a - half years of research work in South Africa.

"I have dealt mainly with three questions," he told reporters, "the levels of the Vaal River and their paleolithic contents, the levels of the sea, and rock paintings of the Eastern Orange Free State and Bastoland. There was a time when the sea round Cape Town, up to Saldanha Bay and South West Africa was 400 feet higher than it is today, and men lived in these regions. That must have been, very roughly, about one million years ago. We cannot say what the man of that age was like, but he used stone implements which have been found washed up on the beach.





Apprentices Are Needed

Ontario's Re-establishment Institute Trains Servicemen in Numerous Trades with Emphasis On Young Veterans

TORONTO, Aug. 2 (9-To assist former members of the armed services to begin life anew with the best possible training, the Ontario government, working in close co-operation with the Dominion government, has established a huge training and re-establishment institute here with the present trickle of graduates soon expected to become a steady stream.

The institute, which is expected to act as a model for similar ventures by other provincial governments assisted by federal authorities is operated under the auspices of two departments in the Ontario government-education under Premier George Drew and planning and development under Hon. Dana Porter. The Dominion's interest in the scheme has been assigned to the training branch of the department of labor.

In operation only a few months the institute has been particularly designed to aid servicemen who enlisted directly from secondary schools and those who had no steady employment or knowledge of some trade. Veterans may obtain training in vocational, tutorial or commercial classes upon authorization by the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

To the delight of members of The institute has capacity for the Gyro Club and their guests, training approximately 2,000 persons but at present about 1,000 former servicemen and women have taken advantage of the school's opportunities. Of this group 650 have enrolled in classes to obtain commercial degrees or matriculation standing for entrance to university.

Elizabeth Goudge, Writer of "Green Dolphin Street," Leads Quiet Life

LONDON, Aug. 2 (P)-Elizabeth Goudge hardly ever goes to the movies yet she expects to make at least \$125,000 from a single film based on her best-selling novel, "Green Dolphin Street."

The daughter of a canon whose bounty far outran his income she lives quietly, almost shyly, with her mother in Devonshire. She receives many visitors these days, more than ever before, and among them are numerous ser-

Money that would represent a fortune to most people is hers now, but her head is so far from being turned that the measure of her desires is to see a little of the world that she knows chiefly through other eyes, and to fit out a special work-study which "I can have all to myself."
