The Jones Act, bane of Prince Rupert so far as Alaska shipping trade is concerned, is to be slapped into force again May 31 after having been suspended for the past three years or so during the war emergency in the Pacific when it was vital to take advantage of the strategic location of this port and facilities to speed shipments to Alaska and war outposts in that area and be-

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night decided to take immediate action, the Alaska committee being instructed to obtain the support of Alaska communities with a view to obtaining further suspension of the act.

The Jones Act prevents Canadian ships from handling American freight to or from Alaska. Thus Canadian ships are unable to bring commodities from Alaska to Prince Rupert. The reaction is in favor of Seattle as against Prince

Canadian National to Do More Than Merely Carrying Out Law

MONTREAL, May 15 - Something more than merely carrying out the letter of the law will be practised by the Canadian National Railways in reinstating employees returned from war service, according to a letter sent by R. C. Vaughan, chairman and president, to vicepresidents and heads of depart-

More than 1,800 Canadian National employees have reported back to work on their discharge from the armed forces and have been re-established. Mr. Vaughan pointed out that they represented only about eight percent of the employees who had been granted leave of absence to serve with the forces. "It is obvious," he said, "that the satisfactory re-establishment of those who wish to return to the railway will demand our best attention for a long time to come."

In common with all employers in Canada, the Canadian National, he said, "has certain very definitely legal obligations to its employees returning from war service. These are contained in the re-instatement to Civil Employment Act, 1943, and in the re-instatement regulations set forth in Order-in-Council PO 77 of January 11, 1945."

Made up of representatives and experienced officers, a Civil Re-establishment Committee has been set up at System Headquarters to give guidance and, in some cases, official direction with respect to procedure.

The majority of Canadian National employees, it is pointed out, are covered by labor agreements and their reinstatement will be in accordance with established processes. With regard to them, the committee's functions will be purely consultative. It will have administrative powers in the settlementi of any problem which cannot otherwise be resolved in determining the proper procedure for the re-established of nonschedule employees.

Special attention will be given to employees physically unfit to resume their former occupations. On the advice of the chief medical officer of the railway, they may be given other work, or they may be granted leave of absence for a prescribed period. Mr. Vaughan appealed to all officers to "take a keen personal interest in the matterto the end that the reputation of the Canadian National, in connection with this vital aspect of Canada's war effort, shall be sacond to none.




While Canada's losses in the war at sea were comparatively light, thousands of homes across the country were saddened by such losses as occurred. Even more were made glad by the fact that their loved one had survived the loss of their ships. Much of the credit for the great number of men saved must be given to the life jacket developed by the Royal Navy which is seen here worn by survivors of the minesweeper, H.M.C.S. Clayoquot, torpedoed in the North Atlantic.



Little but tough were the corvettes which formed the mainstay of the Royal Canadian Navy during the Battle of the Atlantic. Above is pictured one of the early corvettes. Armament, endurance and size of complement have been steadily increased throughout the war.



When Canada entered the war her only effective fighting ships, other than four small trawlertype minesweepers, were six River class destroyers. One of these was lost by collision in the first year of the war and the others went on to play a strenuous role in the North Atlantic campaign. Shown here is the H.M.C.S. 

dian (Active) Army August 2. 1941 with the rank of Second Lieutenant. He was promoted to the rank of lieutenant December 6, 1941 and proceeded overseas June 2, 1942.
