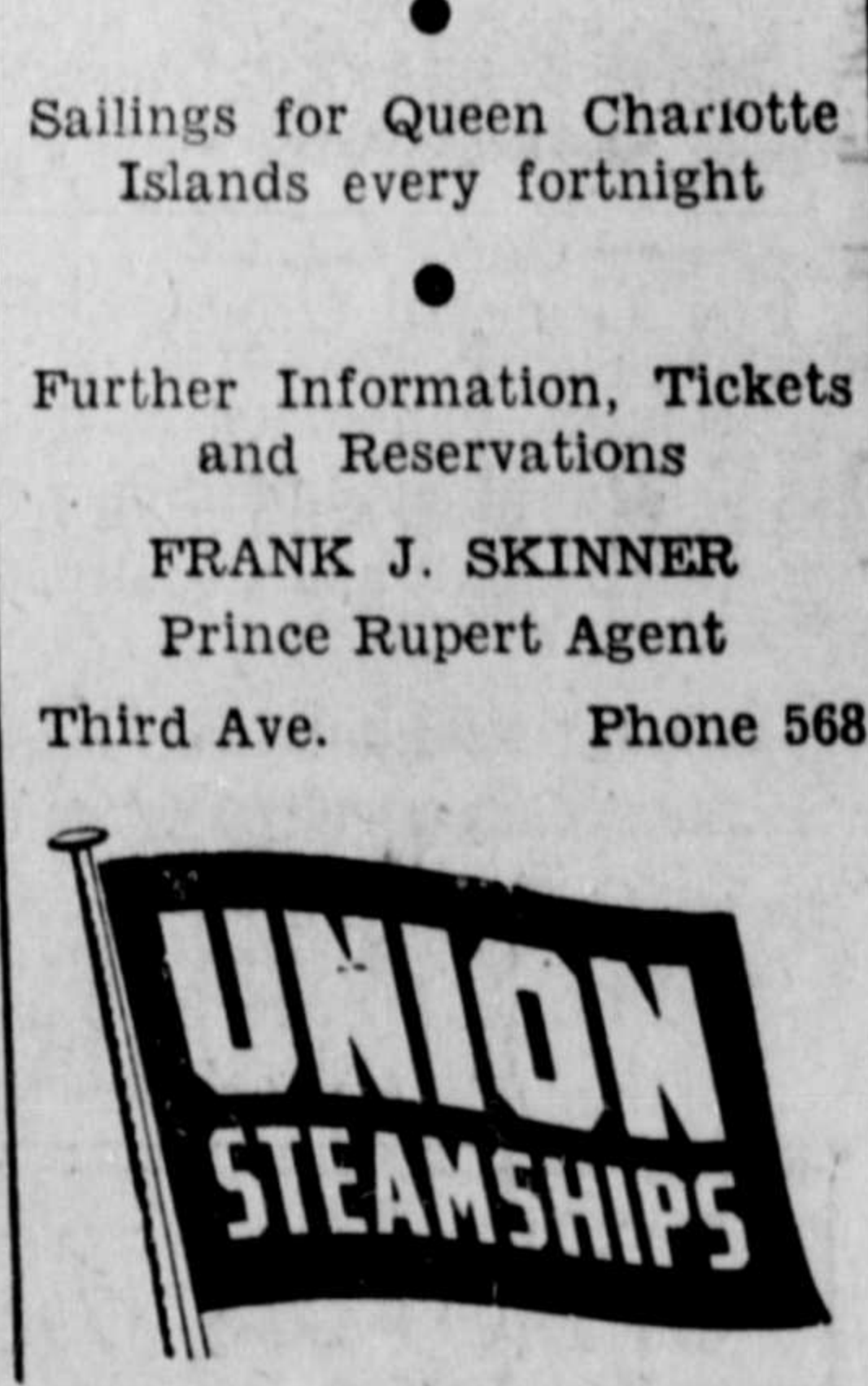

KINSMEN'S T. B. SEAL CAMPAIGN RESULTS GOOD

Prince Rupert ranked fourth last year in the total amount of money raised for the B. C. Tuberculosis Society through the sale of Christmas seals and first in per capita contributions.

Reporting on the annual banquet of the B. C. Tuberculosis Society, which he attended in Vancouver recently, Mr. Irving said that returns on Christmas seal letters sent out by the Kinsmen's Club in Prince Rupert were \$1.84 per letter, the highest in the province.

Prince Rupert was followed by Vancouver, whose response per letter was about 30 cents less than this city.

In recognition of his work as chairman of the Kin Christmas Seal committee here, Mr. Irving was made a director of the B. C. Tuberculosis Society.

EGGS ABSORB ODORS

Since eggs absorb odors and flavors very easily, they should be stored in a cool place, away from onions and other highly scented foods. Eggs should never be washed before storing, as the unwashed shell carries a protective coating all its own—one which forms a natural seal for the pores of the shell.

2 tablespoons fat
1 cup chopped apple
Cook tomatoes for 5 minutes. Add raisins, salt and vinegar. Cook for 10 minutes. Stir constantly to prevent sticking. Add other ingredients except apple. Let stand overnight. Add apple just before using. Makes one 9-inch pie.

Orange Zabaglione

Beat egg yolks and sugar in top of enamel or glass double boiler until sugar is dissolved. Add lemon and orange juice. Place over barely simmering water (do not let water boil) and beat with a rotary egg beater for 8 to 10 minutes, until thickened and very light. Turn into sherbet glasses and serve warm or cold. Six servings.

Note: If an enamel or glass boiler is not available, a bowl placed in a pan of simmer water, may be used.

Silver Cake

This Silver Cake makes an ideal accompaniment to the Orange Zabaglione and makes use of the egg whites.

2 cups sifted pastry flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup mild-flavored fat
3/4 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
2-3 cup milk
3 egg whites

Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cream fat until soft and light. Gradually add 1/2 cup sugar, creaming until fluffy; add vanilla. Add flour mixture alternately with milk, beating until smooth after each addition. Beat egg whites until stiff, gradually beat in remaining 1/2 cup sugar. Fold thoroughly into cake batter. Turn into greased 8-inch cake pan and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for about 50 minutes. Turn cake out on a rack to cool. Makes 1 (8-inch) cake or 2 (8-inch) layers or 30 cup cakes.

Bake layers in moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F., for about 20 minutes.

Pastel Jelly Frosting

1/2 cup pure jelly (grape, crab-apple, red currant etc.)
1 egg white, unbeaten
pinch of salt

Melt jelly in bowl over hot water. Add egg white and salt and beat with rotary egg beater until stiff. Cool and spread on cake.

Home Recipe

Lemon Pie

2 egg yolks
Rind and juice of 1 lemon
1 cupful sugar
2 cupfuls boiling water
1 cooked pastry shell
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1/4 teaspoonful salt
2 egg whites
2 teaspoonfuls icing sugar

Mix together sugar, lemon rind, juice, egg yolks, cornstarch and salt. Add to boiling water in the top of double boiler. Cook until it thickens, stirring constantly. Remove from the fire and cool. Pour into cooked pastry shell. Cover with meringue made with whites of egg and icing sugar. Brown in oven.

Apple Butter Cookies

(3 dozen cookies)

1/4 cup shortening
2-3 cup brown sugar*
1 egg
1/2 cup apple butter
1 cup sifted enriched flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons milk
1 cup rolled oats

(quick or regular (uncooked) 1/2 cup chopped nuts, 1/4 cup raisins)

1. Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and cream well.
2. Add egg and beat until light and fluffy; blend in apple butter.
3. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; add to creamed mixture alternately with the milk.
4. Add rolled oats, nutmeats and raisins.
5. Drop from a teaspoon onto greased baking sheet and bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.), 12 to 15 minutes.

*For sweeter cookies increase the sugar to one cup.

How Can I ???

Q. How can I make a moth paper?

A. Melt together 4 ounces of naphthalene and 8 ounces of paraffin wax. Get some unsized paper and while the solution is still warm, paint the paper. Then pack paper away with the goods to be stored.

Q. How can I make a cleaner for nickel?

A. Use equal parts of liquid ammonia and alcohol and stir in whitening to the consistency of a paste. Apply with a soft cloth and leave covered until the cream dries. When dry, polish with a clean cloth.

Q. How can I sharpen orange sticks?

A. The points can be renewed on blunted orange sticks by holding them in the pencil sharpener.

HEARS SON'S VOICE FROM OVERSEAS

A voice speaking over 6,000 miles of undersea cable, telephone wire and radio-telephone gave Mrs. William Brass one of the greatest thrills of her life at 7:30 this morning. It was the voice of her son, Gunner Martin Van Cooten, speaking over long distance telephone from London.

Mrs. Brass had been standing by for the call ever since 2:30 yesterday afternoon. It finally came through this morning. She told the Daily News that her son's voice was "as clear as if he were in Canada."

"I think it was the most wonderful thing that has ever happened to me," she said. "I couldn't get over hearing his voice and knowing that he was so far away."

Gunner Van Cooten, who has been overseas for three years, told his mother and Mr. Brass that he was "feeling fine" and that he is hoping to get back next month.

A member of the Canadian Army of Occupation, attached to the 14th Field Regiment R.C.A., Gunner Van Cooten is spending three weeks leave in London. At the conclusion of his leave he will return to his duties in regimental paymaster's office in Holland.

Mrs. Brass believes the call was the first made from overseas to anyone in Prince Rupert since the end of the war.

Nazis' Files Reveal British Gallantry

LONDON, Oct. 4 (A)—A picture, taken from the files of the Germans, illustrates how the Victoria Cross was won by the captain of the destroyer Glowworm, nearly five years ago. It shows the gallant but hopeless fight against a ship immensely superior in arms, the German heavy cruiser Hipper.

The photograph, taken from the bridge of the Hipper just before the destroyer sank, reveals the Glowworm laying a smoke screen 400 yards ahead of the bow of the German cruiser, and in the process of firing two torpedoes. Both missed, passing down each side of the Hipper.

The captain of the Glowworm, Lt. Cdr. Gerald Roope, died in the action. There were only 31 survivors from the destroyer.



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MAJOR MEETS ENEMY

Ex-Politician Now Counsel For Prosecution of Axis War Criminals

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Catherine E. Falvey of the United States Women's Army Corps has her pretty blue eyes on a pair of high-heeled, toed sandals and a hat that's the color of a sunset.

She also wants to climb a mountain.

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RIPE CUCUMBER SOUP—Brown two tablespoons of chopped onion in two tablespoons of hot fat. Add three cups of peeled, diced ripe cucumber, 1 1/2 cups chopped ripe tomatoes and 1 1/2 teaspoons of salt. Cook gently until tomatoes and cucumbers are soft. Meanwhile make 2 1/2 cups of thin cream sauce. Rub the vegetables through a sieve, adding the pulp to the hot cream sauce. Serve very hot with toasted croutons. This makes six servings.

ONION SOUP—This gourmet's delight is not at all hard to prepare and is guaranteed to become a family favorite. You will require six medium onions, sliced; two tablespoons of mild-flavored fat, two tablespoons of flour, 2/3 cup of milk, one quart of well-seasoned bouillon, six slices of toast and 1/2 cup of grated cheese. Cook the onions in boiling water to cover for 30 minutes; then rub through a sieve. Melt fat, blend in flour and gradually add the milk, stirring until thickened. Add sieved onions and bouillon, blending well. Simmer 30 minutes. Place a slice of toast in each soup plate, add soup and sprinkle with grated cheese. This makes about a quart of soup, sufficient for six servings.
