LONDON, Feb. 19 ()-In a message to the troops to command Field Marshal Sir Bernard Montgomery say Germany will be finished off by a rain of blows coming several directions. The war, Montgomery said, has reac .ed the final phase on all fronts but the last round may be long and difficult.

"We shall work in close co-operation with our American allies on our right," said Montgomery, "and we shall have complete confidence in the successful outcome of the onslaught being delivered by our Russian allies."

* He told the Twenty-First Army group that it now is impossible for the allies to lose the war.

MOSCOW, Feb. 19 (CP)—Red Army forces have made several new gains on the eastern front. The Soviet forces have surged forward to within 16 miles of the industrial city of Goerlitz on the road to Dresden. They have taken the strategic rail centre of Sagan southeast of Berlin and have broken into the outskirts of the Vistula river stronghold of Grudziadz 57 miles from Danzig.

Furious fighting is in progress east and southeast of Berlin. Paris radio says the Russians are opening an offensive on this front aimed straight at Berlin.





Value of Highway Proven . . .

The use of the new Prince Rupert Highway in case of emergency was demonstrated at the end of the week when, with the railway line out of commission for ten days on account of a slide, trucks were pressed into service to carry meat around the blockade and alleviate a famine which was commencing to develop in Prince Rupert. Had it not been for the highway, there might have been little if any meat in Prince Rupert today since the normal route of supply is from Edmonton or the interior rather than from Vancouver.

It was with the object of ensuring security of transportation through from the East to the coast at Prince Rupert that the Prince Rupert Highway was conceived and built as a war emergency. Now its value in case of an emergency has been tangibly proven.

Local Purchasing Power . . .

Statistics which we publish elsewhere today in regard to Victory Bond purchases during the last four years or so have considerable significance on indicating the purchasing power which Prince Rupert has been having. Bad Weather Slows Herring Catch

Bad weather has been hampering herring fishermen in the Laredo Sound area for the last two weeks resulting in a reduction from the heavy catches earlier in the season. Latest available figures on production in that district show that to February 10 25,291 tons had been caught. The week's catch that date was about 5,000 tons. Quota for the district is 40,000 tons. Herring pack in coast canneries for the season to February 10 was 1,177,383 cases. The pack to comparable dates during the last three years was 1.195,896 in 1944; 1,261,666 in 1943; and 1,239,880 in 1942.






