### Canada and Mr. King . . .

Wartime elections are always difficult and the task of choosing a new Parliament in Canada will not be made any easier by the divisions disclosed in the recent North Grey by-election.

But the general election which Prime Minister Mackenzie King is pledged to call in the ensuing months will face deeper issues than the clash over how far conscription should be enforced. It will determine the core of the political alignments under which Canada will face the peace. So far the opposition to Mr. King's Liberals has been more of protest than of program, and it remains to be seen whether the Progressive Conservatives and the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation will be able to raise a challenge that does more than criticize the Administration's conduct of the war in one particular.

Mr. King, who probably hopes to have a hand in charting the Dominion's course in the days which follow victory, can be expected to bring the full weight of Canada's advancing international position to bear upon the Nation's choice of a new legislature.

### Value of Highway Proven . . .

The use of the new Prince Rupert Highway in case of emergency was demonstrated at the end of the week when, with the railway line out of commission for ten days on account of a slide, trucks were pressed into service to carry meat around the blockade and alleviate a famine which was commencing to develop in Prince Rupert. Had it not been for the highway, there might have been little if any meat in Prince Rupert today since the normal route of supply is from Edmonton or the interior rather than from Vancouver.

It was with the object of ensuring security of transportation through from the East to the coast at Prince Rupert that the Prince Rupert Highway was conceived and built as a war emergency. Now its value in case of an emergency has been tangibly proven.

### Local Purchasing Power . . .

Statistics which we publish elsewhere today in regard to Victory Bond purchases during the last four years or so have considerable significance on indicating the purchasing power which Prince Rupert has been having. It is shown that almost ten million dollars worth of bonds were purchased here during the seven loans of which \$6,575,750 was from individual purchasers of other than "special names" category. Ten million dollars is a lot of money to be put aside even in gilt edge securities and indicates that Prince Rupert is far from being a poverty-stricken community.

### Bad Weather Slows Herring Catch

Bad weather has been hampering herring fishermen in the Laredo Sound area for the last two weeks resulting in a reduction from the heavy catches earlier in the season. Latest available figures on production in that district show that to February 10 25,291 tons had been caught. The week's catch to that date was about 5,000 tons. Quota for the district is 40,000 tons. Herring pack in coast canneries for the season to February 10 was 1,177,383 cases. The pack to comparable dates during the last three years was 1,195,896 in 1944; 1,261,666 in 1943; and 1,239,880 in 1942.
