### INSIDE STORY Lies of Fuehrer Are Proven by His Own Documents at Nuernberg

SAVED BY WEATHER

NUERNBERG, Dec. 7 (CP)-Adolf Hitler's armies were poised for an invasion of the Low Countries and France November 7, 1939, but the attack was postponed week by week for six months because of bad weather, official German records disclosed at the war crimes trial today. Meanwhile Hitler deceitfully told Holland, **Pelgium and Luxembourg that** he had no plans to attack them. German parachute plans against the Low Countries fell into Allied hands January 10, 1940, when a Nazi plane was forced down.

The inside story of Hitler's activities just prior to the outbreak of war is being unveiled by documents produced by British prosecutors at the international war crimes trial.

Proving lies of the Fuehrer's diplomatic double talk with Hitler's own official records, the British prosecutors revealed a Wermacht directive dated April 3, 1939, ordering the army to be ready for a Polish invasion "at any time from September on- eral fisheries department offiwards." 

Evidently, unless something entirely unforeseen develops, the immediate future of the Prince Rupert dry dock and its activity depends upon how soon the Canadian National Railways decides upon the matter of building new ships for service on this coast. Mr. Chevrier, the minister of transport, has announced in Parliament at Ottawa that no statement can yet be made regarding building the new Canadian National ships because plans have not been sufficiently advanced. All of which is quite disappointing as it had been thought that, in the interest of maintaining its service on this coast which is now dependent on a single old ship, the company would have been rushing its

plans. As for the announcement that there will soon be considerable laying off of men at the yard, Prince Rupert is no worse off than other places on the coast as far as shipbuilding is concerned which, of course, is but empty comfort. The war industries are definitely folding up and how long the period of slack will be following their collapse depends upon the length of time it takes to get reconverted to the peacetime industries which, eventually, may be expected to be quite substantial. 



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
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### PUBLIC HEALTH PLACES STRESS ON PREVENTION

Public health services, which are concerned with the preventive side of medicine, are not in conflict with private medical practice, which has the primary mission of dealing with the curative side, Dr. J. M. Hershey, assistant provincial public health director, told the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at its luncheon meeting Thursday afternoon.

"Public health is a specialty like surgery, obstetrics or pediatrics, and is complimentary to the other branches of medical practice," he declared. "It has proven itself and, although many of its programs have not vet been fulfilled in all parts of the country, it is rendering invalu-

able preventive service. "Boiled down into its most simplified form, the aim of public health services is to give protection to the individual from before birth until death. It starts in the pre-natal period and throughout life complements the work of other medical specialties."

An important part of the program is the attention given to pyschological ailments in children, he declared, adding that it is easier to help a child with a physical defect than one with a mental defect.

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

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
