Prime Minister Drops Hint-Session of Parliament Called For March 19

OTTAWA, March 3 (P)-A special session of Parliament will be called on March 19, Prime winister W. L. Mackenzie King announced last night when he adadressed the nation by radio and gave answers to questions which have been prominent in Canadian politics lately. There would be no general election before June at the earliest, the Prime Minister said.

Mr. King declared that a general election date has not yet been set, he added that it could not possibly take place before June. He said that if possible no election will be held while fighting still goes on in Europe.

Answering his critics, Mr. King declared that the Canadian Army overseas is receiving the fullest support in arms, munitions and reinforcements.

War News Highlights

Gap Only Five Miles PARIS-A gap of only five miles now separates the Can-

adian First and American Ninth armies on the western front. When the two forces join a steel wall will be forged that may trap thousands of German troops and prevent them from ever retreating across the Rhine. An American division moving northward from captured Krefeld spurted ahead five miles yesterday to within five miles of the Canadian forces driving southward.

Bombing Jap Islands

SAN FRANCISCO-The Tokyo radio says that American warships have followed up a carrier plane raid on the Ryukyu Islands. This group lies just south of the enemy's home chain. The Japanese say Allied warships shelled Okinawa and surrounding islands. There is no confirmation either of the carrier plane assault or of the naval bombardment.

Yanks Occupy Island

MANILA - American amphibious forces have occupied Lubang Island thirty-five miles southwest of Manila Bay. This is the fourth American landing on islands guarding the sea lanes to the north American continent. It completes the campaign for all key positions in the San Bernardino Straits, thus securing the main navigational channel in the islands. On Iwo, American troops have six hundred yards to go to split the enemy garrison,

Bridges Blasted-Juncture Made

PARIS-The retreating Germans have blasted all Rhine River bridges in the Duesseldorf area including one which was financed in 1939 by loans from Allied sources. Meanwhile the Canadian First and Ninth Armies have joined forces north of captured Krefeld. American artillery is pounding both Duesseldorf and Cologne. The Germans are retreating so rapidly that the Canadians have lost contact with them.

Robots For Britain Again

LONDON-German robot bombs dropped by day-light in southern England today for the first time since last fall, are believed to have been launched from planes. Some damage was done.

PARIS, March 3 (P-"Progress has been eminently satisfactory and casualties gratifyingly light," declared General Dwight D. Eisenhower, Allied commander-inchief, following a visit to the front lines where he narrowly escaped personal injury from an enemy strafing attack of a con-

The American Ninth Army fought to the Rhine yesterday and there were reports that it was already beginning to cross the river. Neuss, suburb of Duesseldorf, was captured in 15-mile advances overrunning the western edge of the Ruhr. The American Third Army captured Trier, oldest city in Germany and key to the whole Moselle valley leading to Coblenz and the middle Rhine. All organized resistance at Trier ceased.

Several miles north of Duesseldorf other Ninth Army troops plunged into the Ruhr steel and rail centre of Krefeld. The great Rhine port of Duesseldorf was only seven miles distant. Winth Army troops fought swiftly through the bomb-blasted city of Neuss which lies on the west bank of the Rhine river just opposite Duesseldorf, administrative centre of the Ruhr. Many shalls were poured into Duesseldorf, thick with thimneys o furnaces, oil factories, munition works and coking






