## Battle of Philippines

PEARL HARBOR-Allied aerial blows have been falling heavily on Japanese objectives on Luzon Island in the Philippines. General MacArthur is keeping quqiet on enemy claims that American invasion forces have attempted a landing at Lingayen Gulf, the invasion gateway to Manila. According to the enemy, Allied troops have been unable to secure a foothold on Luzon.

## Anzacs Help MacArthur

MELBOURNE-General MacArthur's command has been considerably strengthened by the arrival of Australian and New Zealand soldiers in southwest Pacific island. The Australians have taken over from the Americans in British New Guinea. New Zealanders and Australians have also replaced American garrisons in the Solomons. In addition, the soldiers from Down Under are fighting the Japanese on New Britain in the vicinity of Raboul. The change-overs occurred last November but were not disclosed until now for security reasons.

## German Stand In Italy

ROME-German forces in Italy are making a stand along the southern bank of the Reno River east of Lake Comacchio after withdrawing five miles from fallen St. Alberto during the last two days. The enemy withdrawal was made under pressure by Canadian troops of the British Eighth Army. Elsewhere in Italy, heavy snows have slowed the fighting down considerably.

# Greek Rebels Retreat

ATHENS-Insurgent Greek forces are continuing their retreat into the hills west and north of Athens. A number of left-wing guerrilla troops have been killed by British soldiers, who now control practically all of Athens and its port of Pireaus.

# The Eastern Front

MOSCOW-Russian troops have been gaining in their drive towards Komarom in southern CzechoSlovakia. Moscow announces that these Soviet units have driven to within fifty miles of the Austrian frontier. Other Russian forces are ughtening their hold on Budapest, where a trapped Nazi garrison has been putting up a stiff battle. The Nazis have been attempting to relieve their garrison in the Hungarian capital, but have been repulsed about fifteen miles northwest of the city.
