Steel Workers of United States Being Polled After \$2 Day Wage Increase Refused

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 - The largest strike vote ever taken in the United States is in progress today. Members of the United States Steel Workers (C.I.O.) numbering 650,000 are being polled on the question of strike action to enforce demands for a wage increase of \$2 per day which the companies have denied. Workers in 766 plants are voting and there are special warnings against unofficial strike action. First returns indicate a strike is favored.

John Amery Condemned

Son of Former British Cabinet Minister Pleaded Guilty to High Treason

LONDON, Nov. 28 - John Amery, son of L. S. Amery, former Secretary of State for India, was sentenced to death today after he pleaded guilty to charges of high treason and treachery. The entire proceedings took only six miuntes.

Amery, who was 33 years of age, was the second former German propaganda broadcaster to receive the death sentence. William Joyce, "Lord Haw Haw." has been sentenced to hang for high treason.

Amery was accused of broadcasting anti-semitic and anti-Russian propaganda.





ALLIED FORCES EXEMPTION ACT, 1939

(Department of Mines)

NOTICE

THE Allied Forces Exemption Act, 1939, provides that the assessment work on all mineral claims held under the provisions of the Mineral Act by any member of the Allied Forces at the time of his joining such Forces for service in the present War shall be deemed to have been done. This protection extends for the duration of the War and for a period of six months thereafter. Attention is drawn to the fact that the protection shall not apply in respect of assessment work required to be done subsequent to the transfer by a member of the Allied Forces, or by his personal representatives, of his interest in the mineral claim. In other words the new owner immediately comes under the provisions of the Mineral Act and must perform and record assessment work as required by that Act.

Example: Anniversary date of mineral claim May 10th, 1946.

Bill of sale drawn and dated April 1st, 1946. New owner must perform and record work as required by the Mineral Act on or before May 10th, 1946.

These provisions also apply in respect of leases held under the Placer-mining Act. The War, insofar as the Allied Forces Exemption Act, 1939, is concerned, will not be over until Peace is formally proclaimed by the Federal Government at Ottawa.
