# Russian Ship With Woman Skipper, In Port For Grain

Soviet Liberty Ship Jan Jores Arrived at Local Elevator to Take Full Cargo

Unique among deep sea ships in that she has a 1,000 woman skipper, the Russian Liberty ship Jan Jores, 500 third grain ship to arrive at Prince Rupert within a month, tied up at the grain elevator here at 10:30 this morning. The 10,000-ton vessel is to take on some 300,000 bushels of wheat for Russia.



# The Wage-Price Balance . . .

What Americans really want is to preserve a high standard of living, and then try to raise it even higher and spread it more widely, says the Christian Science Monitor. They can achieve this if wages go up and prices remain level or if prices go down and wages don't. But if both prices and wages go up together, not even labor benefits. Such a process is like the traditional fruitless pursuit of lifting oneself by one's own bootstraps.

The present situation contains some disturbing possibilities. If labor's current demands should gain higher wages only out of greater economies in production and distribution without affecting prices, the whole country would stand to gain. For this would swell and distribute purchasing power. And a good part of the problem of reconversion lies in keeping consumer buying up to the nation's greatly augmented capacity to produce.

But there is very real danger that the more powerful labor groups may be able to force pay increases regardless of whether the industry affected can absorb them without boosting prices. Less powerful unions and the vastly more numerous ranks of

unorganized workers may gain smaller increases or none at all. Then the majority of Americans would face a situation in which all must pay higher prices, but only a small minority have more money with which to pay them. And labor knows as well as any other group of consumers that a climbing price spiral, like an upward wage spiral, often only needs a start.

Labor spokesmen have long insisted that wage gains won for one sector of workers eventually improve the condition of all. This is doubtless true. But the postulate contains the same specious element as did the much-maligned doctrine associated with the Coolidge era: if banking and big business is prosperous, the abundance eventually trickles down to the little fellow. The speciousness is tied up in the word "eventually." What happens while "eventually" is travelling to "now"?

In the present situation, what happens if both prices and wages are thrown badly off balance? The question would not be so critical were the country not confronted with preserving a very delicate balance while compelled by events to embark on an enormous and a very difficult conversion to a peace economy.

Americans find it easier to think and act as wage earners, employers, or investors than as consumers. But here is a problem which can be seen more clearly and attacked more coolly from the consumer's angle. That angle is neither pro nor anti-capital or labor. It is concerned with both income and cost of living. It is a platform on which all can stand—in fact, do stand. But more need to realize that fact.

# EMBARKS ON NEW CAREER

Former U. S. Labor Secretary Becomes Writer, Lecturer, After 12 Years in Cabinet

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)-Frances Perkins at 63 is embarking on a new career as a writer and university lecturer.

After 12 such stormy years as she weathered in the cabinet, most people would be glad to rest. But less than three months after she resigned as secretary of labor, Miss Perkins sailed for from the stick of Hank Goldup. Paris to represent the United States at the convening of the International Labor Organiza-

- At the same time she began a weekly 500-word column to be distributed by the Institute for American Democracy. The Institute was founded two years ago to further unity among the American people.

Miss Perkins' column, called "Working It Out," and dealing with the relation of reconversion problems to unity, will be distributed to the labor press.

"The column will cover anything I think labor will be interested in, including such legislation as comes up," Miss Perkins said just before she sailed. "The labor press is becoming more and more important as a liason between labor unions and the

Soon after her return to the United States Miss Perkins will begin a lecture series on labor relations problems at Radcliffe University. She said that she also received invitations to lecture at other universities and probably would accept at least one. For the present she will continue to make her home in Washington, where she lives with her husband, Paul C. Wilson. financial statistician.

Miss Perkins gives evidence of embarking on a new life in more ways than one. She has shed her famous three-cornered hat and donned a black beret. Her frock, once as sober and severe as a judge's robe, is now trimmed with an open-work white collar backed with bright red. Her conriver, is less measured now and liberally seasoned with smiles and jokes.
